European Delegates Want a Hand.

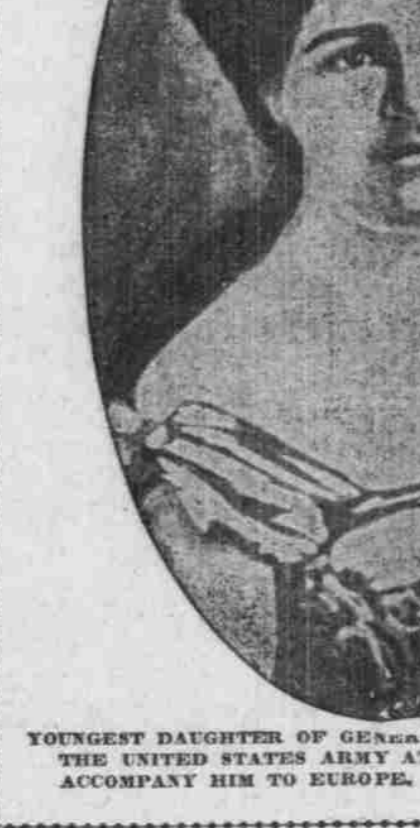
