

WON THE LATONIA DERBY

ELLISON'S HARRY NEW FIRST IN EASY FASHION.

South Trimbale Is Second, Martin Burke Third—Results on Eastern Tracks.

CINCINNATI, O., May 26.—Harry New, from the stable of C. R. Ellison, won the Latonia Derby today in easy fashion before a crowd of 10,000 people. South Trimbale, favorite in the betting, coupled with Martin Burke as an entry, finished second, with his stable companion third. Abe Frank, the only other starter, finished a poor last. The closing price on the winner was 5 to 1, although at one time during the betting he was as good as 9 to 1. There was a big play on Harry New, and all the books quit lower to the race. The Derby was devoid of any sensational features. Harry New, the winner, allowed his mount to lag along in third position until the stretch was reached, and with a little urging the colt came away from the others and won by five open lengths. South Trimbale, under the place easily, Abe Frank made a bid for the money at the head of the stretch, but the heavy impost seemed to tell on him, and he dropped back steadily at the end. An examination of the screen showed that it was charged with electricity, the current being conveyed to it by two disconnected telegraph wires which had fallen across a heavily charged trolley feed wire half a mile from the grounds. This adds a new and terrifying danger to baseball, inasmuch as 50 out of every 100 grandstands in baseball parks contain wire netting to protect spectators from foul balls. In view of what happened at Syracuse, and to prevent repetition, it would be well for club managers everywhere to give their wire screens an occasional inspection.

THE PEARSONS OUT OF IT.

Washington's Chances of Winning Coming Meets Are Slim.

SEATTLE, Wash., May 26.—The University of Washington track team left this morning for the inland Empire, where dual meets will be held with Whitman College, Washington Agricultural College and the University of Idaho. The team is greatly weakened by the absence of Joe and Robert Pearson, the crack sprinters, who have been disqualified by the university faculty on the ground of professionalism. The protest of Manager C. R. Wade of Whitman College, carried a threat to call the Whitman-Washington meet off unless the Pearsons were disqualified. The team will be very weak in the short runs, and Washington's chances of winning all the meets of the tour are slim, indeed.

BAKER CITY WON.

Defeated Pendleton in the Inter-Scholastic Field Meet.

BAKER CITY, O., May 26.—In the inter-scholastic field meet for Eastern Oregon here today the Baker City High School team won over Pendleton by a total score of 71 to 61. About 3000 people were on the grounds to witness the sports. The best of feeling prevailed. The Pendleton team was the victor over Baker City last year by a score in their favor about equal to the score by Baker City today. HOUSES FOR HOMELESS

NAVY DEPARTMENT WILL TRANS-PORT CANADIAN LUMBER.

Captain Gallagher, of the Commissary Department, Reports the Situation in St. Vincent.

WASHINGTON, May 26.—The Navy Department has added one more, and perhaps the last, to the good offices which it has been called on to perform in behalf of the West Indian volcanic sufferers by undertaking to deliver to the homeless people of St. Vincent a large quantity of lumber which the Canadian Government has given. The lumber is coming by rail from Canada to Norfolk, the Treasury officials authorizing its passage through the United States in bond and without payment of duty. At Norfolk, the lumber

Government for the sufferers in Martinique, has returned here, says a Herald dispatch from St. Kitts, B. W. I. The crew of the Dauntless became frightened on the voyage, refused to go on, and deserted the ship at Dominica. When the Dauntless passed St. Pierre on the voyage northward the city's ruins were burning fiercely. The island has been swept by a fearful thunderstorm.

THE VICTOR JUNIOR.

Quartz Property in Southern Oregon That Justifies Attention.

PORTLAND, May 26.—(To the Editor.) From time to time your columns have had notice of the Greenback mine in Southern Oregon, situated near Placer, on Grave Creek, in Josephine County. In the beginning of the development of this mine there was more or less litigation connected with it, so that it was always difficult to find out much about the value of the mine. It was generally known, however, from the number of men employed and the work done in development, that the owners were confident of the property and were doubtless enjoying good returns from it.

The mill first had 10 stamps, and later five more were added. About a year and a half ago to protect the vein and its dip, to gain depth and to avoid further litigation, they purchased from the Columbian mine, at Placer, whose placer properties directly adjoin, sufficient ground to protect them and to give them opportunity to explore the mine to a greater depth. For some time they have been running along the cross-cut tunnel with successful results.

The owners of the Greenback have just been visiting the property with other capitalists from the East and Europe, and it is understood that they are going to incorporate a company called the Greenback Gold Mining Company. The present incorporation has been closed and the Victor, Jr., Gold Mining Company.

The writer was reliably told that during the three or four years that this mine has been running about \$20,000 has been taken out with the small mill on the property. Above the 800-foot level they have in sight, it is estimated, \$100,000. This vast cross-cut tunnel cuts the vein about 800 feet below the outcrop. The ore is strong, and the vein shows best in the bottom.

The work now under way consists of a big shaft to be sunk 50 feet below the level, and the erection of a new 30-stamp mill that will handle 50 tons a day. The stamps are to be 100 pounds each, and an 8-horsepower compressor is to be put in to run six machine drills. They have water power for a portion of the year from the ditch of the Columbian Mines Company at a pressure of about 350 feet. The mine is to be equipped thoroughly with electric lights and an agitating cyanide mill is to be erected to treat tailings. Shipments of the tailings have occasionally been made to the smelter at Tacoma.

The camp of the mine is to be moved to the new works, and all the old improvements are thus being sacrificed for the new development. The erosion of the country indicates beyond a doubt the continued depth of the vein. There are six veins on the property, which will be explored. There are some 250 acres of ground connected with this property. At present 60 men are employed, and altogether there are 300 people in the camp. The improvements under way will cost at least \$20,000. There is no doubt that this mine has one of the longest and best ore chutes in the country, and is one of the best gold producers on the Coast. The permanency of Southern Oregon veins is sufficiently shown by this one vein, so that the old theory of pockets in this section must be discarded. The value of a mine of this character to Southern Oregon, and incidentally to Portland, is very great, and the success attending the development and the projected work is a result which can also be expected from more of the numerous veins which are in this district. Most of the other veins have as yet had little work done on them.
