Republicans Win a Great Victory.

THE GOVERNOR IS IN DOUBT

Fairly Large Vote and Count is Slow—Both in Marion County—Surprise Republican Congressmen Elected.

MARION COUNTY.
Crawford 33, Riley 31. The same precincts in 1900 gave Geer 77, King 22. The vote between Kuykendall and Travis, for Senator, is close. The remainder of the city, so far as counted, is going Republican. The Republican legislative ticket, with the exception of Senator, is probably elected. The vote was the heaviest ever polled.

Bodyslet, Rep. Commissioner.

COOS COUNTY.
MARRIHELD, Or., June 2.—Out of a total of 26 precincts, incomplete returns from five give Furnish 23, Chamberlain 12. Congressmen, Rep. 33; Democratic, 15. The Republicans elect Schiller B. Hierman Representative. On county officers, the Republicans elect Harlock, Judge; Dulley, Treasurer; Cathcart, Surveyor; McIntosh, Commissioner. The Democrats probably elect Lester Sherriff, Sheriff, Assessor the Clerk is still in doubt.

COOS CITY, June 2.—Coos City complete returns from Wood 11, Tongue 2, Weatherford 11, Chamberlain 14, Furnish 5, Bean 11, Bonham 9, Dunbar 10, Sears 3, Blackman 7, Ackerman 10, Wann 6, Crawford 10, Riley 7, Godfrey 4, Whitney 5. The vote for county officers is mixed.

Butcher, so far, leads Williamson for Congress, almost two to one in this county.

Congressmen, Republican 234, Democratic 124. Returns on Legislative nominees received from the same precincts are: Booth, 250; Chamberlain, 124. Dem. 178. County officers—Sheriff, A. L. Clark, Dem.; 231; R. S. Hattan, Dem. 266. Clerk, D. Davis, Rep.; 217; H. Henderson, Dem. 174. Edith, Rep. and County Treasurer, is elected on the Republican ticket. He had no opposition. Indications are that Hattan, Dem., is elected Sheriff. The other county officers are in doubt.

Douglas County.
ROSEBURG, June 2.—Meager returns indicate that Chamberlain carries the County by 250. The remainder of the Republican state ticket wins, except Crawford, who loses by about 50. One Democratic Representative is elected, also the Assessor and Coroner, and probably the Sheriff and County Judge. The Republicans are still hopeful, however, and say Furnish will carry the county by probably 100.

Josephine County.
GRANT'S PASS, Or., June 2.—Tonight partial returns in the three precincts of Grant's Pass give Furnish 143, Chamberlain 132; Tongue 132, Weatherford 91; Representative, Hale, Rep. 125; Smith, Dem., 116. Three outside precincts complete that give Geer 37 and King 116 now give Furnish 36 and Chamberlain 132. The total vote so far, on Representative, give Hale, Rep. 268, Smith, Dem. 272. The county ticket will be close. Indications are that the Democrats will elect Judge and Commissioner.

Polk County.
DALLAS, June 2.—Reports are coming in very slowly. Complete returns from five precincts that give Geer 160 and King 198 give Furnish 139 and Chamberlain 134. Returns from these precincts show substantial Republican gains. Indications are that Furnish will carry the county by 100. The Republicans will carry the Legislative ticket by greatly increased pluralities. Tongue's vote will be heavier than that of two years ago.

EUGENE, Or., June 2.—One hundred and seventy out of 181 votes in South Eugene, No. 1, give Chamberlain 68, Furnish 36 and Chamberlain 132. The total vote so far, on Representative, give Hale, Rep. 268, Smith, Dem. 272. The county ticket will be close. Indications are that the Democrats will elect Judge and Commissioner.

MULTNOMAH FOR CHAMBERLAIN.
His Plurality Over Furnish is Between 500 and 500.
Incomplete returns from every precinct but two in the county, representing 252,100 voters cast, give Furnish, Rep., for Governor 1190 votes, and Chamberlain, Dem., 1214. Chamberlain leads by 124 in a count of a little less than one-fourth of the vote cast. Chamberlain's lead has apparently carried the county by 500 to 500 votes. In the vote so far accounted for, Mr. Furnish runs far behind Williamson, the nominee on his ticket for Congress. Williamson leads Butcher by 700 votes out of 1214 votes counted for Congressmen, and has carried the county by the usual Republican majority. Following is the vote by precincts for Governor and Congressman.

Prospects Good for Them to Have Nine Seats.
