Chamberlain Probably Elected Governor.

PLURALITY IS ABOUT 750

Baker and Union Give Him Big Votes. Farnish Still Hopeful—Next Legislature Will Be Republican.

precincts give the Republican nominee for Representative, Martin Booth, 415; Kirtland, Dem., 234; Ferrine, Sec., 29. Martin Booth is conceded the Democratic representative by a good majority. R. S. Hattan, the Democratic nominee for Sheriff, has 130 majority in the precincts reported, while Henry Henderson, Democratic candidate for Clerk, has 74 majority in the same precincts. Incomplete returns from the remaining precincts give Henderson a majority of 73 votes. For Congressman, Butler has 169 and Williamson 425. So far as heard from, the county gives Farnish 130 majority over Chamberlain. This county gave Geer 130 majority over King four years ago. In 1898, Chamberlain has elected Assessor, Surveyor, Commissioner and Coroner, with fair majorities.

CLACKAMAS COUNTY.

Republicans Sweep Everything—Farnish Has Lead of 250.

OREGON CITY, June 3.—The Republicans have gained a sweeping victory in Clackamas County, and have elected the entire Legislature and county officers, with the exception of the Democratic nominee for Sheriff, who has a majority of 250 over Chamberlain. Complete unofficial returns from 29 out of 37 precincts, that gave Geer 129 and King 145, give Farnish 123 and Chamberlain 128, a majority for Farnish over Chamberlain of 230. Representative Tongue received 2105 votes, while Weatherford gets only 284, a majority 1321. State Senator George C. Brown has a majority over George W. Grace of 367, and this will probably be increased when the returns are complete. The county gives Farnish 130 majority over Chamberlain. The vote on the Legislative nominees follows: Huntley, Rep., 171; Paulsen, Rep., 167; Webster, Rep., 150; Clark, Ct., 132; Eastham, Ct., 124; Hodges, Ct., 118. The vote on County Clerk is close, but F. A. Sleight, Rep., will have a majority over B. H. Cooper, Ct., of about 150. For Sheriff, John R. Shaver has 170, and J. E. Jack 116. For Treasurer, Enoch Cahill has 109, and Alfred Lulling 104. Judge Ryan's majority over King is 284, a majority of 284. State Assessor James P. Nelson has 163, and William Johnson 137. William Brohet, Republican nominee for Commissioner, has a majority of 204 over Democrat, Charles R. Baker. For Coroner, receives 1371 votes, and Dr. J. W. Powell gets 1253. For Joint Senator, Herbert Holman has a majority of 113 over Richard Scott.

Unofficial returns from all precincts will be in by tomorrow morning. Republicans are jubilant over the result, which exceeded all expectations. The Democrats will obtain by this election four offices now held by fusionists—Sheriff, Clerk, Treasurer and one Representative.

COOS COUNTY.

Farnish Will Easily Have a Majority.

MARSHFIELD, Or., June 3.—Unofficial returns from 15 precincts in Coos County give Farnish 57, Chamberlain 41; Tongue 23, Weatherford 49. The Republicans elect all the county officers with the exception of Sheriff, Assessor, and one Representative. Farnish, Rep., is elected Representative; Hum, Rep., Joint Representative from Coos and Curry Counties. Farnish will easily have 200 majority on a full count.

CROOK COUNTY.

Goes to Farnish by 50 to Williamson by 250.

PRINEVILLE, June 3.—Returns from 11 out of 24 precincts give Chamberlain 22, Farnish 27. HEPNER, Or., June 3.—The counting of votes in Morrow County has resulted in all precincts but one have been heard from, the one to hear from only having 12 registered voters, so it cannot materially change the result. Unofficial returns from 14 out of 15 precincts give Farnish 54, Chamberlain 46. Representative Tongue receives the largest majority yet given him, about 600. The Republicans elect their Legislative nominees, Dr. Charles Hines, B. F. Purdy and D. M. C. Gault, by majorities of 3 to 300. The Democrats also elect Commissioner, W. J. Butler; Recorder, Emil Kuratli; Treasurer, W. M. Jackson; Sur-

YAMHILL COUNTY.

Furnish Will Carry It by Fifty—Big Vote for Tongue.

MCMINNVILLE, Or., June 3.—Complete returns have been received from all but three precincts in Yamhill County. W. J. Farnish, for Governor, has a majority of 28. His majority in this county, on the final count, will be at least 50. The remainder of the Republican state ticket received majorities ranging from 239 to 178. On the Legislative ticket, two Republicans and one Democrat are elected. The Senatorship has been returned to W. A. Howe, of Carlton, by a majority of 44, every precinct having been heard from. C. Miles, of Newberg, Rep., and Charles V. Galloway, of McMinnville, Dem., will occupy seats in the House of Representatives. For Joint Representative from Yamhill and Tillamook Counties, B. L. Eddy, of Tillamook City, received a majority of 3 over Charles Grison, Dem., in this county.

YAMHILL COUNTY.

switch, which had evidently been left in that condition by some unknown person. The train is what is known as a double-header, having two engines, and was running at a good rate of speed, as it was on a down grade. Both engines were thrown into the ditch and completely wrecked.

Engineer J. M. White and Fireman Fred Lafel, of the forward engine, were thrown under the wreckage and crushed to death, their bodies being fearfully mangled. A force is working to recover their remains, which are still under the engine with which they went down to death.

The mail car was thrown across the track, where it now stands.

All of the passenger coaches were largely English.

A number of the passengers were more or less injured, but so far as can be learned, none was killed.

AMERICANS GO TO OXFORD

Students From This Country Take Course at England's University.

The few Americans who are now to be found at Oxford and Cambridge are of two classes, says the London Speaker. "There are the sons of rich men affected by a more or less acute form of Anglo-mania, who are often more English than the English undergraduates themselves. These may be ignored, for they will not concern us. The sons themselves positively do not, but I believe that nearly all the new scholarships will go to Americans the traditions of whose families are largely English."

I have never heard of a pure-bred American who came to Oxford or Cambridge merely because he thought, or his parents thought, that he could get a better education at those universities than he could at home. And I believe that the pure-bred American with no English in his veins would come to Oxford for his degree, and then go back to his own country, will be as rare when Mr. Rhodes' scheme comes into effect as he is now. But, in any case, the result will be the same, for, whatever their fathers may have thought, the sons themselves positively do not, but I believe that nearly all the new scholarships will go to Americans the traditions of whose families are largely English."

You will have them, in Oxford, a hundred young Americans, glorying in their nationality, glorying, that is, in being unlike the other young men who now, to use a phrase, own the place. They will bring with them the best of what university life should be like, drawn from their knowledge of what university life is in the United States. They may be very good ideas, but they will not be the ideas of Oxford. The Americans will form themselves into a society and will try to push those ideas, and they will not do very quickly, or those are the ways of young Americans. The men who have been in America as anybody, and they are not likely to forget their nationality when they find themselves at Oxford.

The vote in this county was largely influenced by the Prohibition strength here. After putting up strenuous appeals for a straight party vote on principle, the Prohibitionists in Yamhill County split their ticket worse than any other county of politicians. Their Judge was traded, which gave Rhodes the Democratic candidate, his majority. In some precincts, where the Prohibitionists were especially strong, their candidate for Judge did not receive a vote, every ballot otherwise being marked for the Democratic candidate for Judge. In the east end of the county the Republican strength was divided, costing the party ticket much.

Altogether it was the closest, most hotly contested campaign ever held in Yamhill County.

INDIAN DEMOCRATS.

State Convention Will Meet at Indianapolis Today.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., June 3.—The Democratic state convention to be held tomorrow will devote little time to speech-making. The state committee today decided to recommend the following as the only candidates to be nominated by acclamation: Jerome Herrf, of Peru, who is Treasurer; J. R. Stiggs, of Sullivan, State Auditor; W. E. Stillwell, of Princeton, Attorney-General; Adam Heimbarger, of New Albany, Clerk of the Supreme Court; Timothy Howard, of South Bend, Judge of the Foreman Court for the Fifth Judicial District.

The only fight that is promised on the floor of the convention is for the nomination of Secretary of State. The candidates are Albert Schoonover, of Attica, and D. F. Allen, of Frankfort, are candidates. A significant development of today was the action of the Twelfth District caucus in selecting J. M. Barrett, of Warsaw, as a member of the committee on resolutions after a delegate had intimated that Barrett was opposed to mentioning Bryan and endorsing the State of Indiana in the state platform. It was charged that Barrett had voted, at a conference held in the afternoon, to omit the name of Bryan from the platform.

Declaration of Meaning.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—The President today issued a declaration of meaning of Section 5 of the Civil Service rules, relating to the procedure in removing from office in the Government service. The declaration announces that to prevent all misunderstandings and improper constructions of that section, the President has caused to be printed and issued to mean any other than an merely political or religious which will promote the efficiency of the service, and that nothing in the rules shall be construed to require the exercise of his willfulness or any trial or any hearing, except in the discretion of the officer making the removal.

Postal Currency.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—An Administration bill for the establishment of a postal currency has been drafted by the committee appointed to consider the question. It authorizes the Postoffice Department to issue to be issued postal checks of fixed denominations, not above \$1, in even multiples of 5 and 10 cents. These are to be redeemable or payable at any money order postoffice in A. F. in addition to the face value will be charged for every check issued. These postal checks will not be negotiable nor payable after the expiration of three months from the last day of the month which may be written or stamped thereon, but a duplicate may be issued at any time thereafter by the Postoffice Department without charge.

Protest Against Coercion.

CHICAGO, June 3.—The meeting of the Irish-Americans of Chicago at the Auditorium tonight, to protest against the new law in force in nine counties of Ireland, was probably the largest demonstration ever held in this city. Bourke Cochrane was the principal speaker, and when he began, in the hall, a large number joined in the applause that greeted him. Crowds thronged the avenue outside, appointed at being unable to gain admission. Judges, clergymen, bankers and men prominent in every department of the city's life occupied places on the platform.

Incestry Fires at Pekin.

PEKIN, June 3.—Fires occurred yesterday at the French barracks here and today at the quarters of the Austrian troops. Although the fires were large, the resulting damages were small. The main cause of the fire was incendiary origin. When the buildings burned there was much excitement and rejoicing among the crowds of Chinese who had congregated outside the legion quarter to enjoy the sight of the flames.

Tuberculosis Congress.

NEW YORK, June 2.—The American Tuberculosis Congress today considered a paper on the epidemiology and etiological aspects. A number of papers were read and discussed.

President Calhoun Resigns.

COLLEGE SPRINGS, Iowa, June 2.—President J. Calhoun of Ames College, tendered his resignation today. He expects to enter the ministry of the United Presbyterian Church on the Pacific Coast.

John Burroughs for Simplicity.

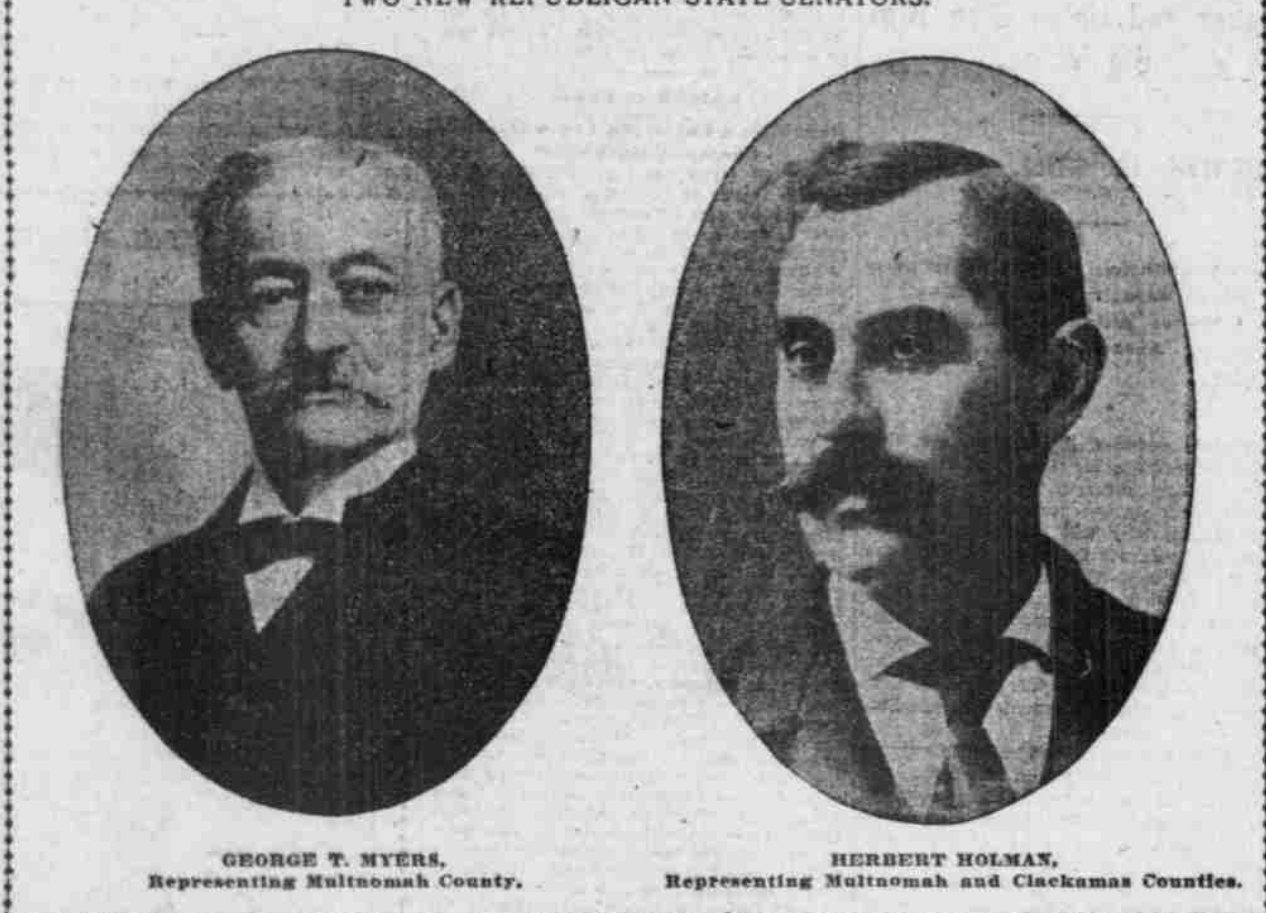
I suppose one comes to like plain literature as he comes to like plain clothes. The purport of the better living, says John Burroughs in the Century. What grows with us is the taste for the genuine, the real. The less a writer styles himself, the better he is. The better he is, the less his dress, his equipage, his house concern themselves about appearance, the more we are pleased with them. Let the purpose be entirely selfless and let the seriousness be pushed till it suggests the heroic; that is what we crave as we grow older and tire of the vanities and shams of the world. To have literary value is not necessarily to suggest books or literature; it is to possess a certain genuineness and seriousness that is like the validity of real things. How much better Horace's letter which speaks at Gettysburg is than the more elaborate and scholarly address of Everett on the same occasion. General Grant's "Memoirs" have a higher literary value than those of any other General in our Civil War, mainly because of the greater simplicity, serious-

ness and directness of the personality they reveal. There is no more vanity and make-believe in the book than there was in the man. Any touch of the elemental, of the veracity and singleness of the natural force, gives value to a man's utterances, and Lincoln and Grant were undoubtedly the two most elemental men brought out by the war. The literary value of the Bible, doubtless, arises largely from its elemental character. The utterances of simple, unlettered men—farmers, sailors, soldiers—often have great force and impressiveness from the same cause; there are in them the virtue and seriousness of real things. One great danger of schools, colleges, libraries, is that they tend to kill or to overplay this elemental quality in a man—to make the poet speak from his culture instead of from his heart.

Want Parcel Post Treaties.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—The Japanese and other governments are pressing for the negotiation of parcel post treaties
