HIS WIFE IS UNDER ARREST

States Husband Informed He Was Taking Three-Days-Old Babe to Family for Keeping.

ABERDEEN, Wash., June 4.—Paul Underwood, who is wanted by the officials of King County, to answer to the charge of murdering his 3-days-old babe, is still at large, in spite of the vigilante search that has been made for him today in every part of this county.

Mrs. Nellie A. Underwood, the child-wife, who is also charged with complicity in the crime, was taken by Marshal Graham to his residence last night, where she remained until this afternoon, when she was delivered into the custody of Sheriff Cuddehe, of King County, who arrived on the train from Seattle to take her back there tomorrow morning for a hearing.

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OLD VETERANS IN CAMP

ANNUAL REUNION OF STATE G. A. R. OPENS AT ASTORIA.

City Is Gaily Decorated in Honor of Its 10000 Visitors—A Great Parade.

ASTORIA, June 4.—The three days' grand encampment of the G. A. R. of Oregon was commenced in this city today. There are about 10000 visitors, including the delegates of the Woman's Relief Corps and Ladies of the G. A. R. The encampment was formally opened this afternoon with a parade which was nearly a mile long, and was participated in by the visitors, local fraternal orders and school children.

At the conclusion of the parade the delegates held a meeting, perfected a formal organization and transacted some minor business. STATE APPLIES FOR LAND.

Another Move in the Celebrated Tillamook County Contest.

OREGON CITY, June 4.—L. R. Geer, State Land Agent, today made application to select 64.80 acres in sections 1, 2, 4 and 5, in township 3 north, range 7 west, in county of Tillamook, Oregon, for the selection with disclaimer of contests by Charles E. Hays, contestant, and G. O. Nolan, junior contestant, against the entries of Robert M. Wagon, George Jackson, Mary Bailey and Charles A. Bailey. Relinquishment of all four of the entries was also by the state. Under instructions from the Secretary of the Interior, the entries were allowed.

He set fire to several buildings at a dairy, where he was working for the benefit of his health, as he explained. His motive in the crime, he says, was revenge on the pastor of the church at Jacksonville, where he was employed and property was destroyed. He will be examined as to his sanity.

THE REMAINS BROUGHT HOME.

Philippine War Veterans to Be Laid to Rest at Oregon City.

OREGON CITY, June 4.—The funeral of Oleg A. Hansen, a member of the First Presbyterian Church, who died last Saturday, will be held in this city tomorrow. The body arrived on the train tonight and was met at the depot by a military escort from Company A, Third Regiment Oregon National Guard. The casket was taken to the Armory, where it will rest all night under a guard of militiamen. At 2:30 tomorrow afternoon services will be held at the body in the First Presbyterian Church. Rev. W. J. Gilbert, Chaplain of the Second Oregon Regiment, officiating. The interment will take place in Mountain View cemetery.

WELL-KNOWN FOREST GROVE WOMAN.

FOREST GROVE, June 4.—Mrs. Sarah Ann Sloan, who had conducted a hotel here for 40 years, died suddenly of apoplexy at her home this morning. She was born in Chautauque County, New York, August 12, 1858, and was married to Chester Sloan, who, with two sons, James and George, of this place, survive her. Interment will be in the Buxton cemetery tomorrow afternoon.

John Clark Taylor.

OREGON CITY, June 4.—John Clark Taylor died this morning, aged 82 years. He had resided in Oregon since 1882. He left a wife, seven children, 12 grand children and four great-grandchildren. The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock from his late residence in this city.

Marion County Hop Contract.

SALEM, June 4.—Hop contracts covering 17,000 pounds of the 1902 crop, and 20,000 pounds of the crop for the years 1903-04-05, were today filed in Salem. The contracts were made by T. J. Gandy, of this city. The figures paid for this year's crop is 1 1/2 cents. The grower making the contract for 20,000 pounds for three years is John Johnston, Jr., et al., of Geneva, who will receive 1 1/2 cents.

Fire at Grass Valley.

GRASS VALLEY, Ore., June 4.—Part of the business portion of the town was destroyed by fire, starting about 3 o'clock this morning. The fire started in the billiard hall, George D. Clement's general store and H. W. Paulson & Co.'s saloon are all total losses, with little insurance.

First June Jury in Years.

ASTORIA, June 4.—A list of jurors to serve during the June term of the Circuit Court was drawn today by Circuit Judge Clark and Sheriff. For the first time in years a jury is drawn for a June term, but there are now a number of both civil and criminal cases to be tried.

OREGON OFFICERS IDENTIFY INDIVIDUAL WHO SAID STRANGER SHOT HIM.

WEISER, Idaho, June 4.—At 2:30 this morning a man giving his name as Julius Hanson appeared on the streets and claimed he had been shot in the shoulder by a stranger about two miles from town, while walking into town on the railroad track. He had walked from Pocatello, where he had been in work. Physicians pronounce him well serious. He could give but a meager description of the man whom he says shot him. Telegrams were sent to the Marshal at Huntington to hunt up Marshal Hanson and they were soon located, and when ordered to surrender they drew their guns and began shooting at the Marshal and his men. They returned the fire, shooting six times each at the men. Marshal Hanson knew that he had hit one of them, and probably both. As soon as receiving the telegram Marshal Hanson and Erwin came to Weiser and immediately identified him as one of the hold-ups. It was determined to take him to Huntington, but he refused to go with the marshal, and Erwin, saying that he was interested in Hanson, and would cure him when he would be taken to Baker City. It is believed his pal has been killed, as they were followed some distance until they were shot and his pal escaped criminals or desperate characters.

NO PASSENGERS INJURED.

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BALLET CASE TO JURY

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., June 4.—The strike situation at the Santa Fe machine shop here this morning was quiet. The men will be set to work in the morning, unless this is prevented by the strikers. It is said that another carload of men is on the way from the East. Each striker was served with written notice from the head office of the railroad company at Los Angeles this afternoon to the effect that he was discharged and would not again be employed at this point. Trouble is feared.

LAKE LOEBARGE IS BROKEN.

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 4.—The steamer Princess May arrived from the North this morning bringing word that the ice in Lake Loebarge is finally broken and there is now no impediment to navigation. The river was clear several days ago, but the ice in the lake was unusually slow in breaking. The river is low, but it is gradually rising. The lowest stage reached by the water is 13 inches above extreme low-water mark.

DUNSMUIR TO BE AT CORONATION.

VICTORIA, B. C., June 4.—Mr. Gifford, member for New Westminster, has agreed to pair with Premier Bennett for the balance of the session to allow the Premier to attend the coronation in London. Mr. Dunsmuir will leave on Saturday evening, his passage having been booked on the Etanra, sailing from New York on the 14th.
