HONORS FOR KITCHENER

CREATED A VISCOUNT AND PROMOTED TO BE GENERAL.

King Edward Recommends That Parliament Award Him a Grant of £50,000.

LONDON, June 4.—It was announced this afternoon that Lord Kitchener had been created a Viscount by King Edward.

In the House of Commons the government leader, J. Balfour, presented a message from King Edward, as follows: "His Majesty, the King, in consideration of the eminent services rendered by Lord Kitchener, and being desirous, in recognition of such services, to confer on him some signal mark of his favor, recommends that he (the King) should be enabled to grant Lord Kitchener £50,000."

The fact that the Kitchener grant is only £50,000 has already caused considerable discussion in the lobby, and much regret is expressed that it was not equal to the award made to Lord Roberts, £100,000.
