

READY FOR A. O. U. W.

Reception Committee Off For
State Line Tonight.

GOVERNOR GEER AT THE HEAD

Guests Will Be Escorted to the
Dalle and Will There Take the
Steamer Valley Gatzert
for Portland.

At a meeting last night of all the committees having in charge the reception of the Supreme Lodge, A. O. U. W., and the Superior Lodge, D. of H., final arrangements were made for what is expected to be the most elaborate entertainment ever given the highest councils of these orders. From the time they are met at the state line on our eastern border, until they depart for their several homes, the delegates will be accorded the best that the local lodges can provide.

A reception committee, composed of Governor T. T. Geer, Grand Master C. C. Hogue, J. E. Werlein, J. R. Mann and Ralph Feeney, on the part of the A. O. U. W., and of Mrs. Willa Belknap, Grand Chief of Honor, Mrs. Mammie Brisse, Miss Ivy Barker, Mrs. C. C. Hogue, Mrs. J. E. Werlein and Mrs. J. R. Mann, on the part of the Degree of Honor, will leave this evening for Huntington to meet the special train bringing nearly 400 delegates to this city. This committee will escort the delegates to the Dalle, where they will be met by another reception committee, composed of Mayor H. S. Rowe, representing the City of Portland, J. A. Cameron, representing the Chamber of Commerce; F. E. Beach, representing the Board of Trade, and W. H. Morrow, representing the Manufacturers' Association, and the following representatives of the local lodges:

The foregoing committee will go to the Dalle by the steamer Valley Gatzert on Sunday morning, where they will meet the delegates Monday morning. The delegates will be extended a most cordial welcome to Portland and will be given the freedom of the city. They will be brought down the Columbia on the steamer in order that they may enjoy the beautiful scenery that has excited the wonder and admiration of all who have had the good fortune to behold it.

The city's guests will arrive in Portland about 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Arrangements have been made to have the fire bell rung and several steam whistles blown as the Valley Gatzert passes Vancouver. An hour later the visitors will arrive at Portland, and this announcement of the time of their coming will give all members of the orders an opportunity to be present at the Alder-street dock when the delegates land. A large number of conveyances have been provided, and all delegates will be promptly taken in carriages to the hotels to which they have been assigned.

At the committee meeting last evening Colonel L. L. Hawkins donated to the Grand Lodge of Oregon a gavel made from wood which was formerly in the hull of a Chinese junk wrecked near the mouth of the Nehalem River nearly 200 years before the discovery of America. It was asserted that the gavel was mounted with silver plates bearing the history of the wood, and that the emblem of authority be presented to the Supreme Lodge at its opening session. A similar gavel was donated to the Grand Lodge D. of H., and will be presented to the Superior Lodge next Monday.

Among the special events of the session next week are a reception to the delegates at Woodmen Hall on the East Side Tuesday evening, a floor-work contest in Arion Hall Wednesday evening, an excursion to Astoria Thursday, the annual memorial services at Taylor-street M. E. Church Friday evening, and a grand parade Saturday evening.

TO GIVE GREAT CARNIVAL

MULTNOMAH CLUB DECIDES TO GO AHEAD WITH FAIR PROJECT.

Dates Selected Are September 1 to 13—E. W. Rowe Has Been Chosen as Manager.

At the meeting of the board of trustees of the Multnomah Club, last evening, the matter of a fair or carnival, to be held from September 1 to 13, was taken up and considered. It was decided to proceed with the enterprise and steps were taken fixing the dates and arrangement of plans, the result of which will give to the City of Portland the greatest local fair or carnival in its history. The character of Multnomah Club and its location in the city is such that the natural advantages tend to a perfect plan for the carnival. "The services of Mr. E. W. Rowe have been secured as manager," said a member of the board yesterday. "Mr. Rowe is a representative citizen of this community and is a man of experience. His services were of such value that he was called to the East and inaugurated and carried to a successful issue like carnivals in several large cities. His representations to the board as to the kind of entertainment that could be given were a revelation. As he is a man to be trusted, and giving due consideration to the fact that he is well known here, the board felt that it was not making a mistake in relying entirely upon him. His best efforts will be given to make the carnival a complete success, and the city may look forward to two weeks of varied amusement and of profit such as it has never seen before in its history."

The Multnomah Club comprises representative men of the city in all walks of life, is enthusiastic and active, and will give to the enterprise the force and push that has always characterized anything it took hold of. The railroad will aid in such manner as they have always done, in bringing to the city people from the various portions of the surrounding country. A particular element of success in this regard will be that the dates have been fixed so as not to compete or conflict with any similar enterprise or fair which may be carried on in different portions of the state.

"This is an enterprise by a recognized organization of the city, and its representations with regard to the character of its exhibitions will undoubtedly be carried out to the letter."

Mrs. Hartridge Released.
NEW YORK, June 6.—Nothing incriminating has been found in her baggage and there being no evidence to support the charge of larceny made by Otto Keregard, of San Francisco, Mrs. Katharine Hartridge has been discharged. Keregard alleged that Mrs. Hartridge robbed him of \$270 while on a Panama steamer bound for this port.

Pooled With an Elephant.
NEW YORK, June 6.—Another man, bent on plaguing the elephant Topsy (which killed a tormentor recently in Brooklyn), has nearly paid for it with his

life. At Poughkeepsie Louis J. Dondoro tried to tickle the beast about the ears with a stick. Topsy threw back her trunk, gave a roar, shot out her trunk and wound it around Dondoro's waist. She raised him high above her head, held him poised there a few seconds, and then, while the young man yelled with fright, the elephant laid him on the ground.

STARTED NEW INDUSTRY.

Flax Fiber Association Closes Up Its Affairs.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Oregon Women's Flax Fiber Association was held yesterday afternoon at the home of the president, Mrs. H. L. Pittcock, with a good representation of stock. Annual reports of the secretary and treasurer were read and ordered filed. A statement from the law firm of Bonham & Martin, of Salem, Or., covering the period from November, 1901, to April 22, 1902, clearly setting forth their legal services for the association, was read. At this meeting the entire business of the association was closed, as a final result of the sale of the association plant, made last March to Mr. Eugene Bosse, a practical flax-grower, formerly of Belgium. Those present at the meeting expressed the opinion that had all or some of their members been residents of the place where the association work was conducted, and thus been able to oversee personally the work and the employees, a more satisfactory financial showing might have been made. Wherever samples and the products of the association have been exhibited, diplomas, as well as bronze, silver and gold medals, have been awarded. One of the stockholders present stated that "the little money which I invested in this association, while it is in a sense lost to me, I feel that it is well invested, because it has added a small mite to a grand enterprise for the State of Oregon."

The following is an extract from a letter from Eugene Bosse, bearing date May 22, 1902:

"The continual unfair weather has given me a great trouble. I had to sow my 225 acres of flax nearly all in the short intervals from one shower to another. The flax is all up, looking sound and healthy, some very green, and these few stalks show, of 1st of April sowing."

I am satisfied now that I am here to stay, as I expect to have flax in this crop that will compare favorably with the best I have ever grown in Belgium, and I find that the Santiam River or the Willamette River waters for retention will enable me to duplicate the Courtland flax fiber here.

LECTURE TO MASONS.

Rev. A. K. Glover Will Speak on "Ancient and Modern Masonry."

Bridge Approach Repairs.

The county and City & Suburban Railway Company are making a complete job of rebuilding of the approach to the Morrison bridge. First the timbers of the bents were renewed. Most of the old ones had to be taken out. New stringers were put in, and for the double tracks of the street car special stringers were put down. The surface is being deepened. The top layer being four inches thick. These improvements will soon be finished and the bridge thrown open to the public again.

Decision Favors Jerome.
NEW YORK, June 6.—Justice Greenbaum, of the Supreme Court, in a decision just handed down, establishes the right of District Attorney Jerome to spend as much money as he may see fit for the purpose of procuring evidence for the suppression of crime.
