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OREGON'S WELCOME

A. O. U. W. Supreme Lodge
Given Hearty Reception.

MET THEM AT HUNTINGTON

Special Train Is 15 Hours Late—Formal Greeting by Governor Geer
This Morning at Pendleton—Arrival in Portland.

The Supreme Lodge, A. O. U. W., will arrive in Portland at 8 P. M. today, and the delegates will be given a hearty reception. They were welcomed at Huntington yesterday morning by Governor Geer and a committee, and will be met at the Dalles by the Portland committee at noon. The trip down the Columbia will be made on the Bailey Gatzert. When the boat passes Vancouver the Portland firebell will ring and the fire whistles will blow five times at intervals of 10 seconds, and an hour later the delegates will arrive at the Alder-street dock. This evening an informal reception will be given to the officers and delegates of the Supreme Lodge, A. O. U. W., and Supreme Lodge, D. of H., at the Hotel Portland.

HUNTINGTON, Or., June 8.—A great demonstration and reception at Huntington was tendered to Governor Geer and the reception committee of the A. O. U. W., which came to extend the hospitality and welcome of the State of Oregon to the Supreme Lodge, A. O. U. W. The special train bearing the delegates was 15 hours behind time. At 2 this morning, the A. O. U. W. special, consisting of 12 Pullmans drawn by two engines, pulled into Huntington and the officers of the supreme lodge received Governor Geer and the Portland committee. At 3 this morning, amid cheers and hurrahs, the train pulled out of Huntington on its triumphant trip to Portland. Early Sunday evening the Huntington brass band serenaded Governor Geer and party. The band, headed by Ralph Feeney, J. E. Werlein and J. R. Mann, followed by a large crowd, proceeded to the Pacific Hotel, where a delightful serenade of a half hour was enjoyed. Mayor Insenshopper introduced the Governor, who delivered a happy Sunday address.

The delegation will breakfast at Pendleton, after which Governor Geer will extend the hospitality of the State of Oregon. This was intended for Huntington, but the delay of the train caused the change. His address will be responded to by A. C. Harwick, of Buffalo, N. Y. C. C. Hogue, grand master of Oregon, will tell of the appreciation of the workers of this state incident to the visit of the supreme lodge. His words will be responded to by W. W. Wilson, of Michigan. Mrs. Wilda Belknap, of the Oregon grand lodge, will speak for the Degree of Honor. She will be responded to by Mrs. Ella Mantor, superior chief of honor of the United States and Canada.

The plans for the reception at The Dalles have been changed. The delegates will be there for luncheon, after which they will be transferred from the train to the steamer Bailey Gatzert, where Mayor Rowe will deliver to Supreme Master Harwick the keys of the City of Portland. The time of arrival in Portland will be 8 P. M. Monday evening.

WAITING AT THE DALLES.

Portland Committees Will Escort Visitors Down the Columbia.

THE DALLES, Or., June 8.—A reception committee of the A. O. U. W. and Degree of Honor Lodges of Oregon arrived in this city this evening to extend a welcome to the delegates to the supreme lodge when they arrive here tomorrow on their way to Portland. About 800 people were gathered at the dock when the Bailey Gatzert arrived, bearing the reception committee, and great interest is manifested in the occasion of this visit of the delegates from the East. The special train bringing the delegates from all the Eastern States and the Canadian provinces will arrive in The Dalles at 1 P. M. tomorrow, and after a brief welcome by Mayor Rowe, on behalf of the City of Portland, the guests will depart immediately on the Bailey Gatzert for Portland. They will arrive in Portland about 4 o'clock P. M.

The Portland firebell will be rung as the steamer passes Vancouver, and the guests will land at Alder-street dock about an hour later. The trip of the reception committee to The Dalles today was a very pleasant one and without particular incident. It had been predicted that a steamer the size of the Bailey Gatzert would not be able to pass the rapids, but the steamer came up without difficulty.

TO GREET CITY'S GUESTS.

Enthusiastic Welcome Planned for Visiting A. O. U. W. Delegates.

The Supreme Lodge of the A. O. U. W. of the United States and Canada will convene in Elbera Hall in Portland tomorrow morning. The Superior Lodge, Degree of Honor, will convene this evening in Industry Hall. In the morning the delegates to the supreme lodge will be present during the deliberations, which will occupy about two weeks' time. All the delegates to these conventions are past masters or past chiefs of honor of the several state jurisdictions, and are therefore among the most highly esteemed citizens of the states from which they come. This is the second time in its 30 years' history that the Supreme Lodge has held its session on the Pacific Coast, and it is the purpose of the Oregon lodge to make this the most enjoyable session ever held.

A year ago, when the Supreme Lodge met in Buffalo, during the exposition, the parade was participated in by 2300 persons. Three special trains had been

run into Buffalo to bring in members of the order from New York, Pennsylvania and Ohio. It is proposed to make the parade in Portland next Saturday night make the Buffalo parade look like 30 cents. In other words, the Oregon workers will show their Eastern brethren the Oregon style of doing things. Twelve bands will furnish music for the parade, and there will be in line representation of every subordinate lodge in the state.

AWARDS FOR OREGON

State Wins Highest Honors at Charleston Fair.

253 MEDALS AND DIPLOMAS

Complete and Official List of Awards Made to Oregon Exhibitors in the Final Report of the Jury of Judges.

CHARLESTON, S. C., June 7.—The final reports of the committee of awards for the South Carolina Inter-state and West Indian Exposition give to the State of Oregon and Oregon exhibitors a larger percentage of medals and premiums than

to any other state. The list includes one diploma of highest award, 64 gold medals, 43 silver medals, 65 bronze medals and 90 diplomas of honorable mention—a total of 253 medals and diplomas. The classifications under which these awards were made include Agriculture, Birds, Fruits and Accessories, Horticulture and Pomology, Forestry, Mines and Metallurgy, Chemicals, Furniture, Education, Engineering, Oil Paintings and Installation. This list is a wide one and it is something indeed, it is much to have covered so extensive a field and to have won honors in so many and such various departments. It is a result which justifies the boast of every Oregonian who has seen the state exhibit here, that it surpasses competition, not only as a whole, but in many of its departments. The arrangement and management of the Oregon exhibits have been in perfect keeping with the quality of things displayed. Our best horticultural authority, Mr. Dosch, has been in attendance at the Oregon headquarters every day of the exposition; and inquiries growing out of our horticultural display have had not only intelligent but prompt and interested attention. In the line of forestry, too, Mr. Johnson has, by his constant presence, been able to turn the interest created by our exhibits to the largest possible account. The main purpose in the making of this exhibit was the demonstration of Oregon's productive capabilities. To this end the state had been ranged over with the greatest care and the collection justified the labor. Not only our timber and our fruits, but our field products, our minerals and a hundred other things were beautifully and adequately represented and under such novel, artistic and striking arrangements as to charm as well as instruct every visitor. Largely as the award favors Oregon it makes no surprise here, for the general superiority of the Oregon exhibit is universally admitted, and has been from the first. The Church in China.

A LACK OF SYSTEM

Supplies Sent by the Dixie Were Not Distributed.

PROFESSOR HILL'S CRITICISM

Relief Cargo for Martinique Volcano Sufferers Has Not Reached Persons for Whom It Was Intended.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Professor Robert T. Hill, of the geological survey, who was one of the scientists on the expedition of investigation sent out by the Government following the Martinique disaster, arrived in this city today from New York. Professor Hill says:

"The Dixie expedition was a great success. It was organized in less than four days with a complete equipment. The endeavor which the United States made to relieve the distress, and the large representation of naval vessels and newspaper men has made a deep impression upon the people of the island, to whom we were a constant marvel and source of astonishment. The negroes of Martinique were laboring under a misapprehension that American enterprise was going to rebuild St. Pierre, and when told that it was on French territory, they could not understand why a little matter of international complication should be permitted to interfere in the work.

"Too much cannot be said of the enterprise and labor of United States Consul Arme, who rushed to the scene of action from his station at Guadeloupe with hardly a stitch of clothing or a cent in his pocket, and intelligently did everything in his power to assist the people of the island and the American relief party. It is feared that his health, which was already precarious, is seriously shattered by his labors.

"The only criticisms that could be made concerning the outcome of the expedition would be concerning the manner in which the relief was distributed on the island. Notwithstanding the reports to the contrary, there was much distress on Martinique, and had our supplies been distributed with the same generosity by the local officers as that with which they were given, much more good would have been done. The Governor and many of the prominent island officials having been killed by the disaster. The slowness of the relief was no doubt due to the disorganized condition of affairs. The few patients in the local hospitals who should have been the chief beneficiaries of our charitable expedition, which contained every possible article for the relief of the sick and clothing enough to have clad the population of the island, did not receive a single article which we carried. And the two sailors from the Koraima, whom we brought back with us, came up the Dixie almost naked and had been supplied with cloth from the sailors' 'lucky bag.' The supplies brought by the Dixie were simply stored in the warehouses. Many people on the island are without shelter while the tents we carried remain unpacked. And when we left, but little of the relief was reaching the interior of the country, where it was most needed."

Battle for Governor.

Penneyacker and Elkins Republican Candidates in Pennsylvania.

HARRISBURG, Pa., June 8.—"The nomination of Judge Penneyacker is as certain as it is that there will be a railroad Wednesday," said Insurance Commissioner Durham tonight, in speaking of the contest for the Republican nomination for Governor. Secretary of the Commonwealth Greist, who is assisting in the management of the campaign of Attorney-General Elkins, said: "Mr. Elkins will be nominated on the first ballot. If there was ever any doubt as to the outcome of this contest the result of yesterday's primary elections should remove that doubt."

Judge Penneyacker and General Elkins are the leaders in the battle for Governor and these statements are samples of the claims of each side. Elkins is also a candidate, said he held the balance of power and that his chances were as good as either of his opponents. Judge Penneyacker's campaign is being directed by Commissioner Durham and Senators Quay and Penrose.

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
