

SIX RUNS IN THE SIXTH

SPOKANE MAKES DESPERATE ATTEMPTS TO WIN.

But Deisel's Hit Brings In Vignoux
When the Score Is a Tie, and Portland Makes It Five Straight.

Portland made it "five straight" yesterday against the Bunchgrass ballplayers from Spokane. Mr. Samuel Vignoux and his men winning the last game of the series by a score of 7 to 6. The visitors bunched in their half-dozen runs in the sixth inning, when they landed on Portland for two safe hits and a double, and Engle made a wild throw. A second, another circumstance which materially aided Spokane was the miserable work of Umpire Mullane, whose decisions in numerous instances were unsatisfactory to both sides. Unfortunately, at a critical moment in the sixth, Mullane called a Spokane baserunner safe at third, when it was very evident that Weed had touched him out. This odorous decision made Spokane a runner, and the game was a most costly Portland game, for the score was "even up" at the end of the inning. Mullane evidently tries to be fair, but doesn't show a knowledge of the game sufficient to hand out decisions with any justice. He was booed and hissed by the entire crowd yesterday, and Portland fans now understand why the Tacoma people almost mobbed Mullane some time ago.

Spokane Was Outclassed.
A crowd of six thousand people saw yesterday's game, in which Portland clearly outclassed Jack Grim's coits. The reliable George Engle was in the box, and although he went up in the disastrous sixth, he regained his composure and pitched curve after curve over the plate in a manner that befuddled the alleged stick-swingers from Eastern Washington.

Aside from the sixth, Spokane captured eight big round grooves, the players leaving the diamond in a most unhappy frame of mind.

Spokane came out to the bat first, and McLoughlin landed safe on an error by Weed. Then came a safe hit by Retz, and McLoughlin was put out at second by Jakey Deisel. Deisel-trust, Eley fanned the slider, and Engle's curve and McKevitt knocked a pretty little fly into Lou Mahaffey's hands, retiring the side.

Portland Scores in First.

Muller hit safe, going to second on Deisel's account. Second base was scored by the bleachers cheering by hammering out a double which brought Muller early to the plate. Anderson's single scored Van Buren, but "Andy" was put out at second. Deisel's second error let Fray to the first base, filling the bases. Donohue got to first and Eley scored on a felder's choice, and McKevitt was declared safe at third, much to the disgust of those who saw Engle put him out. Four balls off Engle put Howell on first and scored McKevitt. Things looked good for Spokane, but Green struck out, and Engle died at first. Then Spokane struck a lump again, for McLoughlin's single drive scored Fray, and the bases were still full. The bleachers groaned and hissed the umpire, but the code of war was against Portland, for Retz launched a two-bagger that scored Donohue, Howell and McLoughlin. Eley the next man up, went out of business at first and the side retired.

Vignoux Scores Winning Run.
The spectators were up in arms and had the game been anywhere but in peaceable Portland there would have been a riot and a badly-beaten umpire. The score was 1 to 6, but Vignoux's single, aided by Deisel's error, scored the Portland manager, and put the local team one run to the good. Here the score remained until the close of the combat, neither side being able to land a run. One of the prettiest plays of the game was Green's capture of Weed's hot grounder in the fourth. The most amusing feature was Vignoux's ejection from the enclosure of an army of small boys who had energetically climbed the fence to see the sport. The score:
