FURNISH STILL GAINING

CHAMBERLAIN IS NOW ONLY 240 VOTES AHEAD.

Official Returns From Wasco and Polk Counties Cut Down Democrat's Lead 47.

George E. Chamberlain's plurality for Governor was cut down yesterday by official returns from Polk and Wasco counties. He now has 240 more votes than W. J. Furnish. Official returns have been received from 25 of the 33 Oregon counties, and complete but unofficial returns from all but three.

BAKER COUNTY.

Official Changes Make a Number of Changes in the Vote.

BAKER COUNTY, June 9. - County Clerk Giddens completed the canvass of the election returns Saturday. Several important changes were made in the figures as given in the unofficial returns. The county clerk has been notified by the official count that the majority is 551, a loss of 55 votes from the unofficial count.

AGRICULTURE OF IDAHO.

WASHINGTON, June 9. - The Census Bureau today issued a report on the agriculture of Idaho, showing that the 17,671 farms enumerated there June 1, 1900, were valued at \$123,193, of which 11 per cent represented the value of the buildings and the remainder the value of land and improvements other than buildings. The value of farm implements and machinery was \$2,200,000, and livestock \$1,271,000, making the total value of farm products \$17,571,000. The total value of farm products in 1900 was \$18,655,000, of which 19 per cent represented the value of animal products and 81 per cent the value of crops, including forest products. The total value of farm products for 1900 was over four and one-half times that reported for 1892, partly due to a more detailed enumeration in 1900. The gross farm income in 1899 was \$14,645,521, and gross income on investment 23 per cent.
