MARKET NEWS

The early feature of special interest in the produce and fruit markets yesterday was the long-expected slump in the strawberry market. Growers held the price up so long that the demand was restricted, and yesterday night several hundred crates were carried over. These were turned over to the hawkers at from 50c to 75c per crate, and when the fresh market struck the street yesterday, they were up against the competition of some stock that had the merit of being cheap. Fresh stock suffered in consequence, and by afternoon was a drag on the market at 40c per pound. At that figure there will be an increase in the demand, and it is believed that the slump has been arrested for a few days at least. Stocks of poultry continue to increase, and retailers are holding off expecting some low prices today or tomorrow. The demand has slackened very materially, and as the prices until a few days ago have been quite attractive, receipts have been heavy. Dealers were indulgent to put prices down to 10c per pound, but they are compelled to do so, unless there is a decrease in receipts. Old potatoes are dull, and a carload of very fine stock was sold yesterday at 50c per sack. Some sales are made as low as 35c per sack. New potatoes are a shade firmer, but are still selling at 45 per sack. Onions are weak, but are still selling at 25 per sack, but onions are weaker.
