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HONOR COLLEGE FOUNDER

WILLAMETTE MEMORIAL TABLET FOR THE LATE REV. WALLER.

Gift of a Member of the Alumni—Commemoration Exercises Come to a Close.

SALEM, June 12.—The concluding exercises of the fifty-eighth annual commencement of Willamette University were given in the university chapel tonight.

The occasion of the commencement proper of the university, and included the conferring of degrees, unveiling of a memorial tablet in honor of Alvin F. Waller, and the awarding of the Alvin F. Waller prize of \$25.

The Alvin F. Waller prize is given annually by President T. M. Gatch, of the Oregon Agricultural College, of Corvallis, to the student passing the best examination in either United States Constitution or Latin.

The unveiling of a memorial tablet dedicated to the memory of Alvin F. Waller, who died in 1892, was the feature of the exercises.

The memorial tablet was the gift of the Alumni Association, an alumnae association, and a number of the departments in the State Agricultural College at Corvallis.

The tablet is a marble slab 22 inches long and 18 inches wide, and is inscribed with the name of Alvin F. Waller, his birth and death dates, and his honorable and useful life.
