

DID HE SEND LETTER?

EDWARD J. FRENCH CHARGED WITH VIOLATING U. S. LAW

Mayville Farmer is on Trial for Alleged Offense in Sending Threatening Epistle.

Edward J. French, indicted for mailing an obscene letter at Mayville on September 20, 1919, addressed to J. B. Fitzwater, Condon, was placed on trial before Judge J. W. French in the United States District Court yesterday.

The first witness called was Mrs. Ella Axtell, the Postmaster at Mayville. She testified how a watch had been kept to catch the person who had been complained of as mailing certain letters through the office.

The deposition of Mrs. Fitzwater was admitted in evidence by Judge Bellinger, after a strong fight to keep it out had been made by William Seton, attorney for the defense.

The defendant alleges that he does not know anything about the letters, but the Postmaster asserts that she watched French from the back part of the office and kept record of letters being mailed during a certain time, and her judgment was that the unlawful letter was dropped by French.

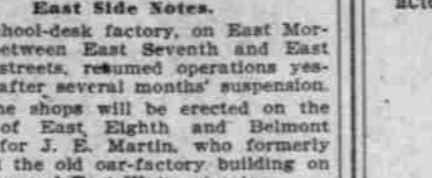
