

DEATH UNDER A CAR

Dr. McDaniel's Fatal Fall
From a Bicycle.

CRUSHED UNDER THE WHEELS

On His Way to See a Patient, He
Turns Suddenly in the Track
of an Incoming
Car.

While on his way to visit a patient at 6:30 o'clock yesterday morning, Dr. William J. McDaniel, of Multnomah, met death under a Williams-avenue car of the City & Suburban line. The accident occurred about 50 feet north of Shaver street. The doctor was hurrying along the runway on his bicycle, and in order to escape an approaching car 150 feet ahead of him, he turned to the east side of the track and either slipped or was pitched under a north-bound car which was only 10 feet behind. The coroner's jury attaches no blame to the motorman of the car.

Dr. McDaniel was called from his home at 547 Mississippi avenue, corner of Shaver, about 5 o'clock. As his patient was very ill, he hurried to his house and he did not notice the clanging of a car bell about 100 feet in the rear. As the roadway on Williams avenue is very rough, he followed the runway of hardened gravel and sand and kept to the west side, so that he would be out of danger from a north-bound car. Fifty feet north of Shaver street, he heard the bell of an incoming car 150 feet away, and he turned suddenly in front of the car which was bound for the St. Johns junction, and which had sounded the danger signal when he first turned into the avenue. Some of the passengers on the incoming car are of opinion that his wheel slipped in the loose gravel and that he fell under the car, which was only 10 feet away when he made the turn. One P. Hill, a farmer, of St. Johns, is positive that he was not struck by the car. The motorman, George Kain, did not see the accident.

"As soon as I saw him try to cross the track," he said immediately after the accident, "I reversed the current, turned on the sand and did not stop to look around. All I wished to do was to avert the accident."

Dr. McDaniel's remains were looked after by Patrolman Patton until the coroner arrived. Later they were removed by the undertakers, who will make arrangements for the funeral.

An inquest was held at 4:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon, and a number of witnesses were examined, including the motorman and the conductor of the north-bound car, and the motorman of the south-bound car. The testimony of Ulysses Lowe, the south-bound motorman, and of P. Hill, a passenger on the car, and Edward Stansbury, a teamster, varied but little. All had seen the deceased riding along the runway, and when the south-bound car was from 150 to 200 feet from him and the north-bound car about 10 feet behind him he turned or slipped in front of the car. Mr. Lowe could not say whether the wheel had slipped or the deceased had turned or been run down by the car. Mr. Hill said that Dr. McDaniel had either turned or pitched into the way of the car. He was positive that the car had not struck him. When he saw the doctor make the turn he ejaculated, "What chances those riders will take!"

A second later the doctor fell. Previously Mr. Hill had noticed some careless wheelmen, and he thought at first that Dr. McDaniel was one of them. The motorman had tapped the gong and attempted to stop his car in time to save the doctor's life, but was unable to do so. The car was going at its usual speed.

George Kain, of 263 Monroe street, motorman on the north-bound car, said he first saw Dr. McDaniel some distance away. He immediately tapped the gong, but the deceased paid no attention to it. Dr. McDaniel was riding along the east side of the runway, and as there was room for the car to pass by Kain thought that he intended to keep that side. When a space of only 10 feet intervened, the rider turned suddenly, as if to cross the track. The south-bound car was then about 150 feet away. Kain said that he at once tapped the gong, reversed his brakes and applied sand to the tracks, and did all that he could to prevent the car from running the man down. He thought the wheel passed over the first track, but he could not tell how the doctor had fallen, for, he said, from the minute the turn was made he gave all his attention to the stopping of the car.

The evidence of Charles M. Pys, conductor of the car, did not differ materially from that of the motorman.

A. J. McDaniel, of 27 Mississippi avenue, a brother of the deceased, said that the doctor's full name was William Joshua McDaniel; that he was a native of Polk County, 46 years old; resided at 547 Mississippi avenue; was married, and left a wife and one son. When the accident occurred he was on his way to visit a patient.

Dr. Samuel C. Slocum, who made the post-mortem examination, stated that the skull had been fractured, both collar-bones broken, the spinal column dislocated and other injuries sustained.

The verdict of the coroner's jury, after giving the cause of death, etc., stated "that it appears to this jury that said injury and death were due solely to accident, and that said George Kain, as motorman, exercised all due care."

The jury was composed of R. R. Danielson, L. M. Davis, Theodore A. Goffe, D. J. Durand and W. Harris.
