Older Members Criticise the President for Message.

DEEMED UNDUE INTERFERENCE

Impression Prevails at Washington That Country Will Be Aroused and Demand Cuban Reciprocity Legislation.

The President's Cuban message impresses the fact that there will be no extra session of Congress. If it does not pass some reciprocity legislation now, the matter will go over until Fall.

WASHINGTON, June 12.—President Roosevelt has made his position plain by sending a message to Congress showing what he wants done in the way of reciprocity with Cuba.

At the vote today, Representatives Tongue, Moody, Cushman and Jones all voted with Western members for the bill, and against amendments, Jones taking occasion to make a brief, vigorous speech, in which he pointed out that the reclaimed lands, instead of entering into competition with the East and Middle West, would be thickly settled and create a market for products of those sections.

Some members of the Senate are disposed to criticize the President for taking any action, whatever in this matter, and think he should have allowed the whole question to be settled without a supplemental message.

NO INCIDENT TO VIOLENCE AT PAWTUCKET.

Arrests of Disturbers Freely Made Prevented Any Demonstration by Strike Sympathizers.

PAWTUCKET, R. I., June 12.—Action which the authorities hope means the beginning of the end of the reign of violence incident to the street railway strike was taken today by High Sheriff Hunter C. White, in removing his Deputy Sheriffs from the street-cars.

When the first car of the Pawtucket-avonue line reached the city today it was guarded by companies of militia and troops of cavalry with machine guns trailing along. The car was escorted safely past the point where the attacks yesterday were made.

ASKS RELIEF FOR CUBA

tem under which this country has thrived so marvelously. The present tariff law was designed to promote the adoption of such a reciprocity treaty and expressly provided for a reduction not to exceed 50 per cent upon goods coming from a particular country, leaving the tariff rates on the same article unchanged as regards all other countries.

Objection has been made to the granting of the reduction on the ground that the substantial benefit would not go to the agricultural producer of sugar, but would inure to the American sugar refiners. In my judgment, provision can be made by which the benefit of the tariff reduction will be guaranteed against the possibility, without having recourse to doubtful policy, such as a bounty in the form of a rebate.

The question as to which, if any of the different schedules of the tariff ought most properly to be revised does not enter into this matter in any way or shape. We are concerned with getting a friendly reciprocal agreement with Cuba. This agreement applies to all the articles that Cuba grows or produces. It is not in our power to determine what these articles shall be, and any discussion of the tariff as it affects special schedules, or countries other than Cuba is wholly aside from the subject matter to which I now call your attention.

Some of our citizens oppose the lowering of the tariff on Cuban products, just as three years ago they opposed the admission of the Hawaiian Islands, lest free trade with them might ruin certain of our interests here. In the actual event, their fears proved baseless as regards Hawaii, and their apprehensions as to the damage to any industry of our own because of the proposed measure of reciprocity with Cuba seem to me equally baseless. In my judgment no American industry will be hurt, and many American industries will be benefited by the proposed action. It is to our advantage as a nation that the growth of Cuban market should be controlled by American producers.

The events following the war with Spain, and the prospective building of the Panama canal render it certain that we must take in the future a far greater interest than hitherto in what happens throughout the West Indies, Central America and the adjacent coasts and waters. We expect Cuba to treat us on an exceptional footing politically, and we should put her in the same exceptional position economically. The proposed action is in line with the course we have pursued as regards all the islands with which we have brought into relation of varying intimacy by the Spanish War. Porto Rico and Hawaii have been included within our tariff lines, to their great benefit as well as ours, and without any of the feared detriment to our own industries. The Philippines, which stand in a different relation, have been granted substantial tariff concessions.

Cuba is an independent republic, but a republic which has assumed certain special obligations as regards her international position, in compliance with our request. I ask for her certain special economic concessions in return; these economic concessions to be given as well as her. There are few brighter pages in American history than the page which tells of our dealings with Cuba during the past four years. On her behalf we waged a war of which the malapring was generous indignation against oppression, and we have kept faith absolutely.

It is earnestly to be hoped that we will complete in the same spirit the record so well begun, and show in our dealings with Cuba that steady continuity of policy which it is essential for our Nation to establish in foreign affairs if we desire to play well our part as a world power.

We are a wealthy and powerful Nation; Cuba is a young republic, still weak, who comes to us for help, whose whole future whose very life, must depend on our attitude toward her. I ask that we help her as she struggles upward along the painful and difficult road of self-government and independence. I ask this aid for her because she is weak, because she needs it, because we have already aided her. I ask that open-handed help, of a kind which a self-respecting people can accept, be given to Cuba for the very reason that we have given her such help in the past. Our soldiers fought to give her freedom, and for three years our representatives, civil and military, have toiled unceasingly, facing the disease of a peculiarly sinister and fatal type, with patient and uncomplaining fortitude, to teach her how to use right her new freedom. Never in history has any alien country been thus administered with such high integrity of purpose, such wise judgment, and such a single-hearted devotion to the country's interest. Now, I ask that the Cubans be given the same chance to use to the best advantage the freedom of which Americans have such right to be proud and for which so many American lives have been sacrificed.

OPPOSITION NOT INFLUENCED. They Say the President's Message Does Not Change the Situation. WASHINGTON, June 12.—The Pres-

ident's reciprocity message gave the Senators a live topic of conversation today, but so far as yet appeared, there is no change in the situation.

There was a disposition on the part of the leaders on both sides of the controversy to claim, when speaking publicly, advantage from the message. The straight reciprocity men urged that the effect would be to cause at least some of the beet-sugar Republicans to abandon their opposition. They contended that some of them had misunderstood the attitude of the President, and now that that had been made clear there was no longer any excuse for opposing reciprocity measures.

The message, they said, would clear the atmosphere, rendering the President's attitude unmistakable, and, therefore, being opponents within the party face to face with the fact that in continuing their opposition they are antagonizing the head of the party.

We do not know at the time where the President stood on this subject and have told the Republican opponents of reciprocity just what the facts are, said a leading reciprocity Senator. "They refused to receive our assurances and professed to have expressions of the President to the contrary. The message confirms what we have said to them, it clears the atmosphere and necessarily the result must be beneficial for a reciprocity bill."

The beet-sugar leaders declared at the close of the day that the message had caused no loss whatever to them; that all those Senators who had stood with them yesterday are still with them. They asserted that the President's position in the matter had had the effect of causing to hesitate some Senators who had heretofore not taken a positive stand against reduction, because of the feeling that the President should leave Congress to deal with the subject in its present stage. Senator Dietrich was among the most outspoken of the beet-sugar men, and he made an unusual effort to secure the attention of the chair after the reading of the message. Those who are in his confidence say that it was his purpose to move for the discharge of the President from the consideration of the House bill, in order to permit the immediate consideration of that measure.

There is still more or less canvassing of the wisdom of handing the subject to the President, and it is probable that ultimately one will be held, but no date is now mentioned.

The President has earnestly considered the reciprocity matter for several days, and it is stated that the action of the anti-reciprocity Republican Senators yesterday in declining to hold out against the message, was influenced by the broad question of the duty of the United States to Cuba, and of fairness to the new republic.

It has been pointed out to the President that his warmest political support is in the section of the country where there is the greatest opposition to reciprocity, the West and Northwest, and that he should remain content with the stand he has taken, without accentuating his views in a special message. It is known, however, that the President did not, hesitantly arrive at a conclusion, as well as he would not let his political prospects interfere with what he regarded as his plain duty. It is further known that he told his friends that it was a source of great regret to him to take a position hostile to the wishes of his warmest supporters, but that he felt it would not be in keeping with his own nature and his position as President to remain silent on this subject, and thereby give an opportunity for false speculation as to his attitude.

The President was further led to conclude that the relation of the United States and Cuba must necessarily grow closer, and that the United States should not at the outset, after its declared purpose toward the island, assume a position contrary thereto, and thus arouse the suspicions of the Cuban Government as to our real intention towards it.

It is stated that the President's positive declaration in his message today as to the duty of Congress probably will end his active efforts to bring about reciprocity.

AS TRUSTEE FOR CUBA. General Wood Acted in the Interest of Reciprocity. BOSTON, June 12.—During his visit to this city today, General Leonard Wood, ex-governor-general of Cuba, expressed himself in the most emphatic manner regarding the alleged irregularity in the expenditure of Cuban Government funds in the interest of reciprocity. Commenting on President Roosevelt's special message to Congress on reciprocity with Cuba, General Wood spoke of it in the highest terms. Of the situation in Cuba, General Wood said: "There is nothing in connection with my administration of Cuban affairs that I wish to cover up. Talk of investigation is welcome to me. Every expenditure that was made was free and above board. I was actuated as a trustee for Cuba. I simply used Mr. Thurber's mailing list as the best means of distributing the literature on reciprocity, and this was well known before the examination of Mr.
