Pioneers Linger and See tha Sights.

LOOK OVER OLD-TIME RELICS

Praise for the Promoters of the Rennion-Roster of State-Builders Who Attended the Meeting.

Nearly all the Oregon ploneers who were in Portland to attend the annual session of the Pioneer Association Wednesday remained in the city all day yesterday. They visited the City Park, Portland Heights and other places of interest. The chief attraction, however, was the collection of pioneer relics in the rooms of the Oregon Historical Society in the City Hall. Beveral hundred old-timers visited the rooms yesterday, some of them men the rooms yesterday, some of them men and women who had been through the rooms before, but who enjoy looking at the primitive implements of frontier farm-ing and housekeeping, the sight of which reminds them more clearly of the inci-dents of half a century ago. George H. Himes was at the rooms all day and during the evening to answer questions and make the visit of the pioneers as pleas-

Those who have spent the last two decades on their farms or in country towns, and have seldom visited Portland, find it difficult to comprehend the rapid changes that have been made. One old gentleman-quite an active man, toolost all patience with the street-car com-panies yesterday because the cars would not wait for him. Wrapt up in a norrative concerning early-day adventures, he would forget all about the car until It had passed him and then he would snout for it to stop. "You youngsters are too dern smart," was his comment, and after three cars had passed him without his signaling them, he walked down town. Beflecting upon the days when men's first business was to be neighborly and accommodating, he couldn't understand that 20 people on the car would lose their tempers if the conductor should wait for a man who fulled to signal in time. The motorman and conductor were looking shead, and not behind. The young men are looking with pleasant anticipation into the future—the old pioneers get much of their enjoyment from hiring over again the events of the next. the events of the past.
All were pleased with Wednesday's

meetings and many words of commenda-tion were heard yesterday as the old pioneers talked among themselves. They especially praised the banquet that was spread for them and the kindness of the young ladies who waited upon them at the tables. The task of preparing a feast for so large a crowd of people was not an easy one, and that all passed off pleas-antly and without confusion is a matter of gratification to all concerned.




