

MURDERER GIVES UP

Slayer of Nora Fuller Surrenders in Washington.

IMPPLICATES PROMINENT MEN

Alleges San Francisco Doctor Paid Him to Leave City and Stay Away.

Then Failed to Send Him Money.

A man who says he was one of the principals in the Nora Fuller murder, which caused a sensation in San Francisco a few months ago, has surrendered himself to the officials at Washington.

SEATTLE, June 24.—A special to Times from Sedro-Woolley says:

The man claiming to be John Bennett, the alleged slayer of Nora Fuller at San Francisco last January, was seen at this city this morning by the Times reporter. He was arrested here last night. He said he had passed the most peaceful night he had enjoyed since being hustled out of San Francisco after the exposure of himself to the public by Bennett.

CONVICTS ROB MORE FOLKS

TRACY AND MERRILL, STEAL LA CENTER FARMER'S CLOTHES.

Also Take \$20 and Some Bacon—Bloodhounds Fail to Keep Track of Men.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 24.—Another robbery by the escaped Oregon convicts, Tracy and Merrill, was reported by the men in prison here this morning. The men last Sunday made a raid on the house of Pat McGuire. During the absence of McGuire and his family, from 8 to 10 o'clock this morning, they broke into an apartment house and stole clothing, including \$20 in cash, two pairs of dark-colored trousers, two black hats, two pairs of shoes, and about five dozen eggs and seven or eight pounds of bacon. A hat and a cap were found on the premises by McGuire, all of which have been recognized as garments worn by the convicts by Carson Skipton and Lyon, who were notified by McGuire of the raid on his place. One pair of trousers were identified as those taken from Roberts at Salem, and some papers were also found which had belonged to the convicts. The men were taken from Dr. White near Gervais. The posse made a search around the McGuire place yesterday, but the dogs were unable to pick up the trail. The McGuire posse was out on a hunting party for the convicts, and one mile from Dunlap's place, where the escapes were made Saturday. The desperadoes are now supposed to be in the vicinity of Haines, and are believed to be hiding still in the woods this side of Lewis River. The posse is positive that the men have not crossed the river, as all boats owned by private parties have been accounted for.
