

MANY FINE CLASSES

Promised as Features of the
Chautauqua.

THE LIST OF INSTRUCTORS

History, Literature, Bible Study, Art
and Physical Culture Will Be
Among the Subjects Taught
at Gladstone.

The Chautauqua Association at Gladstone has one important branch of work which is very interesting and profitable to the daily attendant, but is little known or appreciated by the general public. This is the work of the morning hours from 8 A. M. to 10 A. M. which is the special work of the Chautauqua which is of interest to readers of The Oregonian.

Professor W. H. Boyer, the well-known musical director of Portland, will again have charge of the music department. A large chorus will be organized and daily instruction given.

Reading and elocution Professor S. S. Hamill, of Chicago, of National reputation as an author and teacher of elocution, will preside. The Ohio Educational Journal says: "As a teacher of elocution Professor Hamill has no superior in America."

Professor W. C. Hawley, of Willamette University, will give 15 studies in American history, and no doubt with as great satisfaction as ever to a class which averages over 100 in daily attendance.

The old auditorium is thronged from 8 o'clock on with a large and varied throng of juveniles, and not a few teachers and elderly matrons, learning to march and counter-march, and going through the various intricate athletic evolutions and class drills.

Professor B. J. Roadley, of Willamette University, will introduce in a popular and instructive way his Gladstone class to the mountain world of English and American literature. Charts and maps will be used. In addition to the lectures the class will have readings from the authors discussed.

Art Class.

Professor John Ivey, the post-painter, of Monterey, Cal., will be with the Chautauqua again for the first week with his magnificent water-color pictures. These pictures will be on display in a room which is set aside for the purpose. The professor will give special instruction to a private class for five lessons for the nominal charge of \$1. He receives for each lesson a small fee, but he has the valuable services of Dr. Alexander Blackburn, the pastor of the First Baptist Church of Portland, for its teacher. The great book of Romans will be divided into 30 studies and given to the class. The professor will have a freshness and vigor that cannot be taught. He will have readings from the authors discussed.

W. C. T. U.

The ladies of the Women's Christian Temperance Union of Oregon are excellent themselves in the endeavor to make their particular work during the week at Chautauqua this year a splendid success. Mrs. Helen D. Harford, the president of the Oregon societies, is directing the work with her usual skill. The plan of work to be done at the assembly has been mapped out with great care and thoroughness, and will be especially interesting to all white-collar workers. They have reserved ample space for a large headquarters tent near the pavilion, which will be in charge of Mrs. McCann, a woman of culture, who will make it an attractive place for friends of the cause.

Mrs. Ada Wallace Urnsh, the president of the National board of organizers for the W. C. T. U., will have charge of and conduct the class that meets daily from 11 A. M. to 12 M.

The class in amateur photography, under the management of Woodard, Clarke & Co., of Portland, Or., could hardly be more popular than this one. One of the most competent instructors in the City of Portland will have charge of the department. A darkroom and all chemicals are provided, and during the week demonstrations made each day. Pupils desiring to enter this class will, of course, bring their cameras.

The Sunday school normal training class, under the competent management and instruction of James Edmunds, Sunday school missionary for Western Washington, will be a great aid to Bible school teachers who desire to improve themselves with which to meet the obligations and privileges of a teacher. The lessons will include the following topics: The Teacher's Trade and Equipment (the introductory lecture), "The Mind," "The Elements of Knowledge," "Memory," "The Imagination," "The Association of Ideas," "The Attention," "The Preparation of a Lesson," "Class Work," "Order and Discipline."

The Junior Bible study class this year, with Rev. J. H. Beaven, of Oregon City, as teacher, will be a new one. It was begun last year and aims to complete the view of the Old Testament.

They will go over the books of the first section of the Bible, and place the theological relation to each other. They will also have brief biographical work in the heroes of this period, especially the Judges, Kings and prophets. When they are through with the course they will know what very few older persons know—that is, the place in Bible history where the different utterances of the prophets should be placed.

Lately correspondence has been had and avertures made which look to the establishment of a summer school at Gladstone, to continue in session during most of the summer vacation. This work, if undertaken, would be in direct charge of one of the large universities of the state, and would be a distinct benefit to the Chautauqua, and in turn the Chautauqua would furnish an attendance and support to the school that could not be had elsewhere in the state.

Persons who desire to enjoy the class-room during the coming season of the Chautauqua are advised to make arrangements and camp on the grounds.

EPISCOPAL CONVENTION HOLDS ANNUAL ELECTION.

Laymen and Clergymen Delegates Transact Business of the Church—Committees Are Appointed.

All business of the annual convention of the diocese of Oregon of the Protestant Episcopal Church will be completed today. At yesterday's meeting the officers for the ensuing year were elected and the various committees appointed. The officers elected are as follows:

ON THE WAY TO BOHEMIA

PROGRESS OF CONSTRUCTION ON OREGON & SOUTHEASTERN.

Will Begin Hauling Freight by July 4—Ten Miles Ready August 1, and 22 Miles November 1.

W. F. Morphy, vice-president and general manager of the Oregon & Southeastern Railroad, is down from Cottage Grove to meet his family, who will arrive from Omaha this morning. The family home will be established in Cottage Grove, the headquarters of the railroad enterprise Mr. Morphy is identified with.

"We are making satisfactory progress with the construction of our line to the Bohemia mines," said Mr. Morphy last evening. "The grade for the first 10 miles is completed and track is down on three miles of it. Before the Fourth of July we expect to be hauling logs on the first five miles of the road, from Mosley Creek to Cottage Grove. Trains will be running over the first 10 miles of the line by August 1, and by November 1 we expect 22 miles of the line to be complete. That will train to the border of the Cascade forest reserve, leaving 14 miles more of the road to be built to reach the Bohemia mines. That stretch of road will

MONEY FOR THE FAIR

Checks, Gold, Silver and Currency Pour In.

TREASURY NOW HAS \$12,160

Although the 25 per cent assessment on the stock of the Lewis and Clark Centennial will not be due until next Tuesday, money poured into the office of the company yesterday, and when accounts were closed it was found that there was \$12,160 in the treasury. The largest payees were Ladd & Tilton, with \$500, the Portland Railway Company \$175, and the First National Bank \$125. The stockholders received their statements in the morning mail, 374 notices having been sent out, and immediately began a run on the secretary's office with checks, gold, silver, and currency. In all 139 stockholders, principally business and professional men, settled their assessments.

The stockholders paid up cheerfully and showed the same enthusiasm in parting with their money that they did in signing their names to the subscription lists last November. When asked why they paid up so far before the money was due, their reply invariably was: "We subscribed to it to have a big fair in Portland in 1905, and the sooner the money is in the treasury the better."

Yesterday's record of payments is kept up, it is very likely that at least 10 per cent of the assessments will be paid in tonight, and that two days before a single cent is payable. The run on the secretary's office is expected by the officers of the company. President Corbett had assigned one of the clerks of the First National Bank to the secretary's office to assist in receiving and depositing the money and posting the stock-book for the annual meeting, but the young man was not to go to work until Tuesday, as it was thought that there would be nothing to do.

When the secretary's receipts were deposited with Cashier Newkirk at the First National Bank shortly before the close of banking hours, he remarked that it looked as if the Lewis and Clark Centennial was doing business, and forthwith instructed Clerk Dukehart to report for duty at the Exposition Company's office this morning.
