

CANNOT BE FOUND

Ticket Agent Schilling Mysteriously Disappears.

FRIENDS FEAR FOR HIS SAFETY

No Reason for His Unexplained Absence Is Apparent—He Was Last Seen in Spokane Sunday.

V. A. Schilling, city ticket agent of the Harriman line in Portland, has not been at his office since Saturday afternoon, and his friends are becoming decidedly anxious regarding his safety. It has been ascertained that he left Portland on the Spokane Flyer at 6:30 Saturday night, without saying a word to any one about his destination. He had not, in fact, told any one definitely that he was going away, but two or three of his associates recall that he remarked casually that he thought some of going out of town to spend Sunday. O. R. & N. Depot Agent Shunkie, in Spokane, talked with Schilling there Sunday. He inquired about the Portland agent, and Schilling responded that he was up there attending to a little business. There all trace of him was lost. For a railroad agent to quit his post without leave of absence is ordinarily regarded as equivalent to resignation. It is deemed quite probable, however, that Mr. Schilling intended to be back at his office Monday, in which case there would have been no occasion to get leave of absence. He could even have spent a large part of Sunday in Spokane, and then be back in Portland at 7 Monday morning. But he did not return Monday, nor has he been seen here since.

It was known that he had considerable mining investments, most of which were in the Baker City district. It is said, however, that he was interested in some mines in the Coeur d'Alene country, and he might have had investments in mines north of Spokane. But all this is conjecture. It is a mystery where he could have gone from Spokane. If he went out to some mine and was accidentally detained it is deemed hardly probable that he would be silent so long. Some report about him would be almost sure to drift in, even if he should himself be incapable of sending a message. It is not supposed that he had much money with him, so that play is not a probable theory. All his friends are wondering, having no clue whatever to follow.

No indication can be found that he made any preparation for a long absence. The affairs of his office are said to be all straight, and he had drawn nothing on his salary for June. His wife is visiting his parents in Los Angeles, having gone there about 30 days ago with his sister, who had been visiting some time in Portland. Mrs. Schilling has not yet been informed of her husband's disappearance. Her father, Eugene Shiley, is as much at a loss to account for Schilling's departure as anybody else is. General Passenger Agent Craig, of the O. R. & N., is out of the city, but it has been ascertained that he had no intimation that Schilling was going away. Inquiry is being diligently prosecuted in Spokane, and even farther, but beyond that point it is groping in the dark.

THE MAYOR'S VETO.

President of Council Mulkey sharply criticizes it.

SEASIDE, Or., June 26.—(To the Editor.)—I note that Mayor Rowe has given his approval to my most inspection ordinance, undertakes to maintain that section 2 of the ordinance tends to create a monopoly. This is not true. Neither that section nor any other section of the ordinance could be so construed by a fair reading of the ordinance. A committee of retail meat dealers was satisfied with the ordinance as passed. But as certain commission firm on Front street was not, it was necessary to veto the ordinance. The other reason of the Mayor's, that it contained blanks, was in a measure true; but it only referred to the inspection of milk inspection ordinance, and was not dependent on the legality of the ordinance. Had Mayor Rowe been acquainted with the first principles of legal construction, he would have known that the reference to other language was sufficient without the passing of the ordinance that contained the language. It has been objected to because these ordinances were brought up so near the end of our term. The Mayor and other members of the Council know why this was done.
