

BUSY DAY FOR TRAPS

Dr. J. J. Plummer, of Boise, Carries Off Trophy.

W. F. SHEARD WINS MEDAL

Tacoma Marksmen, Messrs. Smith, Sheard and Denning, Capture Three-Men Team Contest—Dayton Next Meeting Place.

The principal events at the annual tournament of the Sportsman's Association of the Northwest yesterday were the winning of the Globe trophy by Dr. J. J. Plummer, of Boise; the playing off of the three-men team of Thursday; and the winning of the Brownlee medal by W. F. Sheard, of Tacoma.

The regular annual meeting of the Sportsman's Association of the Northwest was held in the parlors of the Portland Hotel, last evening. Judge A. D. Godman, of Dayton, Wash., was elected president. After the routine business had been disposed of, Dayton, Wash., was chosen for the next annual tournament, to be held in June, 1903.

There were about the same number of marksmen present as on the day before, and the most proceeded in every way similar to that of Thursday. The crack shots were many, but those who seemed to be prominent above the rest were Clarence Nauman, J. E. Emory and W. F. Sheard, Messrs. Denning and Lanning, of Tacoma, also did good work, both on the teams and individually.

By far the most important contest of the day was that for the possession of the Globe Trophy. This very handsome trophy was donated to the association in 1889 by the Morning Globe, of Tacoma, and is valued at \$400. Many marksmen entered the contest and shot at the 50 blue rock targets as they sailed from under the traps, but of them all only one could win, and that one was Dr. J. J. Plummer, of Boise, Idaho, who hit 47 times out of the 50. G. L. Becker, of Ogden, came next with 46, and W. F. Sheard, of Tacoma, the holder of the trophy for the last year, came third with 45.

The two Tacoma teams that tied Thursday in the three-men team contest played off the tie, and the team composed of Messrs. Smith, Sheard and Denning defeated the team of Messrs. Lanning, Rowe and Wood by a score of 22 to 17 out of a possible 30. The tied contest for the Multnomah medal was to have been played yesterday, but the contestants failed to materialize when the proper time came, and the final was postponed till today.

The last event on the program was the winning of the beautiful Brownlee medal by W. A. Sheard, of Tacoma, who shot 29 straight birds out of a total of 30 sent out by the traps. The Brownlee medal is the most important of the trophies, as the marksmen were of such equal merit that a tie resulted in nearly every contest.

MAHAFFEY BROTHERS IN TROUBLE

Joe is Released, and Lou Suspended—First Base Man May Quit.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 27.—Manager Vigneux has released Joe Mahaffey outright, and has suspended Lou Mahaffey for two weeks, without pay, and fined him \$25.

The manager gives as his reason for Joe Mahaffey's release that the pitcher does not keep himself in condition to pitch winning ball, and that his (Vigneux's) time can be better employed than sitting up nights watching his men.

Mr. Vigneux says he has a string out for another pitcher, and until he lands him, Engle, Salisbury and Witbeck will do all the box work.

The suspension of Louis Mahaffey was caused by the first baseman's failure to get his man in the first game here. He fielded the ball while playing deep, and waited for Engle to cover the bag.

The pitcher failed to do so, and when Mahaffey finally started the runner back out and afterward scored. The baseman and the manager had some words about it on the bench and Mahaffey brought up the subject again that night in the lobby of the Hotel Northern.

When Mahaffey went upstairs to put on his uniform for Thursday's game, he found his brother, Joe, there with a letter from Manager Vigneux, stating that he (Louis Mahaffey) was suspended, and that he was fined \$25 for disorderly conduct.

The talk in the hotel corridor is the disorderly conduct.

Mahaffey is very sure over his suspension and fine, and says he will never again play ball under Vigneux.

The latter says he will put Mahaffey back in the game at the expiration of two weeks, and if he plays good ball he will be kept on first; if he does not play good ball he will be given another suspension.
