SUBJECT TO A MORTGAGE

HOMESTEAD NOT EXEMPT, SAYS JUDGE CLELAND

Boundary Dispute Decided in Favor of Irvington—Lovell Gets Year in Penitentiary.

JUDGE CLELAND YESTERDAY DECIDED THAT PROPERTY CLAIMED AS A HOMESTEAD IS SUBJECT TO MORTGAGE FIDELITY, AND THAT THE HOMESTEAD LAW DOES NOT APPLY IN SUCH CASES.

Judge Cleland yesterday decided that property claimed as a homestead is subject to mortgage foreclosure, and that the homestead law does not apply in such cases. The decision was rendered in the suit of James Y. Wade against E. O. Lovell and wife, Bessie W. Paxton et al., to foreclose a mortgage for \$200 on a half acre of land.

ISN'T IT ABOUT TIME THE ROCK WAS LIFTED?
