Conference Report on Philippine Bill Adopted.

WARM DEBATE AT THE CLOSE

Carmack Wants a Further Investigation of the Philippine Question—Compliments to Frye.

nounced the action of the minority of the Philippine committee, asserting that it was the fault of the minority that the investigation had not been taken to the larger tribunal of the American people and we were perfectly willing to make the appeal to that tribunal. He did not think anything to be gained by continuing the investigation during the summer. The case had gone to the American people. "We will hear from them next week," he said, "and the appeal, if the other side does not."

WASHINGTON, July 1.—When the Senate convened today at 11 o'clock there were no indications of the exciting scenes of yesterday.

After a session marked by some of the most heated debates ever heard in the American Congress, the Senate adjourned sine die at 5:30 yesterday afternoon. During the last hours of the session there was a hot debate on the Philippine question, participated in by Carmack, Spooner, Culberson, McComas and Lodge. The conference report on the Philippine government bill was adopted without any serious opposition, and then, when the desks were cleared for adjournment, Carmack called up his resolution for the continuance of the investigation of the Philippine question, and for a visit to the Philippines by the committee during the summer.

WITHOUT FOUNDATION.

No Bribery in Connection With Proposed Sale of Danish Islands.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—Chairman Dail of the special committee of the House which investigated the charges in connection with the purchase of the Danish Islands, today submitted the report of that committee. After detailing the charges and showing that Christmas had repudiated the alleged report on which the charges were based, the committee reported the results of its investigation as follows:

Adoption of Conference Report.

Lodge then moved the adoption of the conference report on the Philippine bill. Culberson, one of the Senate conferees, said he had declined to sign the conference report because he could not conscientiously vote for the measure as agreed upon, or recommend its passage to the Senate. He thought it would be a good purpose to let the conference report stand as it is, and to let the Senate and Representatives who have been referred to the report advise the committee of their position.

ST. LOUIS, July 1.—A copy of Lord Lansdowne's letter to Ambassador Choate, accepting the invitation to participate in the World's Fair, was received today by the Secretary of State. The display to be made by Great Britain at the fair will consist largely of educational and art exhibits. Opportunity will also be afforded the British manufacturers to make exhibits.

ITALIAN STRIKER KILLED.

First Loss of Life in Anthracite Fields Trouble.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., July 1.—The first loss of life during the anthracite strike occurred today at the William A. colliery at Durysa. Antonio Giuseppe, an Italian, was shot dead by one of the coal and iron policemen from behind the stockade of the colliery. Reports differ as to the cause of the shooting. The friends of the dead man say he was walking on the road near the stockade when he was fired upon, and was on his way from Seranton to Durysa. Another report is that the Italian tried to get over the fence, and would not heed the warning of the policemen to go away. There is much indignation, and the Sheriff of Lackawanna County was summoned to take steps to preserve order, as it was reported that there would be a riot among the foreigners, and that they would attack the stockade.

President Will Go to Oyster Bay.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—President Roosevelt, after attending the Fourth of July celebration at Pittsburgh, will go direct to Oyster Bay, N. Y., where the executive headquarters are to be located during the summer, instead of returning to Washington.

Minneapolis Detective Sentenced.

MINNEAPOLIS, July 1.—Judge Sampson today sentenced Captain N. W. King, of the detective force, to three years and six months at hard labor in the penitentiary at Stillwater. King was convicted of being accessory after the fact to a felony.

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SMELTING TRUST SUIT.

Concessions for the Company Says It Is Not Illegal.

DENVER, July 1.—James B. Grant, general manager of the American Smelting and Refining Company's plants in Colorado, was served today with notice of the suit to be commenced in the Supreme Court for a dissolution of the trust, and for the appointment of a receiver for its property. This afternoon, Assistant Attorney-General George Foot left for Pueblo and Leadville to serve notice on the officers of the Colorado, the Philadelphia and the Bimetallic smelters, which are also alleged to be in the trust. It is likely that the Supreme Court will decide Saturday whether to allow the state to file its suit. The Supreme Court is due to adjourn for the term Saturday, and arguments in the suit of the state case may not be heard before September.
