

NAMED BY MAYOR

New Officers for the Williams Administration.

ANNUAL MESSAGE IS DELIVERED

Proper Restraint Upon Gambling and Brothels Is Suggested—Powers of a Fire Marshal.

In the Council Chamber, decked with flowers and potted plants and with vases of flowers on the desk of each member, Mayor Williams called the first meeting of the new city legislature to order at 2:45 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Every member of the Council was present, and when the Mayor took his chair candidates for the various appointive offices could be seen in the doorways and in the galleries, which contained more spectators than at any time since Mayor Penneyer entered upon his duties six years ago.

The inauguration of the Mayor and the Council into office was unattended by any ceremony. The Mayor left his office a few minutes after 3 o'clock and descended to the Council floor by the public stairway instead of by the private staircase, where three or four seekers for political jobs were waiting him. He entered the chamber almost unnoticed, and so engrossed were some of the spectators and the Councilmen in an animated conversation that they did not know he was present until a loud voice asked, "Is there a majority of the Council in attendance?"

"There is," answered City Auditor Devlin.

Instantly all the Councilmen were in their chairs. The roll was called and showed that the wards were represented as follows:

"The first business," announced the Mayor, "will be the election of the president of the Council."

The two officers to be confirmed were the City Physician and the Poundmaster. Both were confirmed unanimously and then the spectators began to disappear from the galleries. The Mayor then delivered his inaugural message.

New Fire Ordinance.

After the preliminary matters had been disposed of, the Councilmen settled down to their new duties and passed several ordinances, one of which was of importance to the city in general, and especially so to the Fire Department. It was introduced by Mr. Rumelin at the request of the Board of Fire Commissioners, and provided for the appointment of a Fire Marshal and a Deputy Fire Marshal, and regulates the storing of combustibles and the repairing of buildings which the Marshal may consider in an unsafe condition.

Under the ordinance the Chief of the Fire Department is to act as Marshal, and shall receive no additional compensation for his services. He has the power to appoint a deputy, who shall represent him in the performance of the duties required. Either the Marshal or his deputy, in the discharge of their duties, may enter any building at a reasonable hour to ascertain whether the ordinance has been complied with. Ashes must not be deposited in any wooden vessel or in any vessel of combustible material, but may be placed in a galvanized iron vessel, which must be removed two inches from all woodwork. Shavings, hay, straw and combustible fragments must be so stored each day as to be secure from

final passage. Mr. Rumelin said that Chief Inspector Porter, of the Underwriters' Association, told him that it was similar to those which had been adopted by other cities in the Northwest. Mr. Porter wished to see it passed immediately, as its reference to a committee meant a delay of two weeks and the delay meant an expense to himself and his assistants of \$30 a day. The Fire Commissioners had approved the ordinance. The ordinance was then passed, all the Councilmen voting in its favor. The Deputy Marshal will be paid by the underwriters, and will not receive any salary from the city.

Restore Mayor's Power.

An ordinance that was reminiscent of Mayor Penneyer's administration was introduced by Mr. Bentley. It provided for the repeal of the famous "anti-Mayor" ordinance, which took the appointment of regular and special committees out of the hands of the executive, and for the return to the old law, which gave the Mayor the appointive power, the members first named to act as chairmen of their respective committees. The Mayors had this privilege until Mr. Penneyer had entangled himself with William Mead, T. C. Malone and other members of his Council about appointments, and the power was taken from him. Each of his successors, however, named the committees, which were recognized by the Council.

After the reading of the ordinance, Mr. Merrill moved that it be placed on its third reading. The motion was lost. Bentley, Cardwell, Merrill, Rumelin, Sharkey and Sigler voting aye, and Albee, Fiegl, Foeller, Sherrett and Zimmerman no. A

motion to reconsider was carried by the same vote. Mr. Rumelin, for the negative side, thought the ordinance should be referred to a committee. Mr. Merrill withdrew his motion, and the ordinance was referred to the ways and means committee.

Proposed City Laws.

Other ordinances introduced were as follows:

Appropriating \$300 out of the general fund for the improvement of streets in front of public property; referred to the street committee.

Authorizing the Mayor and the Auditor to draw warrants in favor of the payment of assessments on property owned by the city; referred to the street committee.

For the construction of a sewer on East Couch street from East Eighteenth to East Sixteenth, directing that the assessment be entered in the docket of city liens and appropriating \$725 for the work; passed.

For the construction of a sewer in East Ash street from East Twentieth to East Twenty-second, directing the proportionate cost and appropriating \$725 for the work; passed.

For the construction of a sewer in Eugene street from East Seventh to Union avenue, declaring the proportionate cost, directing that the assessment be entered

in the docket of city liens and appropriating \$725 for the work; passed.

For the construction of a sewer in Kerby street from Mason to Bench, and making an appropriation of \$354.25; passed.

For the improvement of Fourth street from Burnside to Jefferson, declaring the probable cost to be \$28,577.50, and making an appropriation; passed.

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THROWS WATER ON HIM.

How Mrs. Hooker, White, Tames a Colored Husband.

Matrimonial woes existing between W. R. Hooker, colored, of Piedmont, and his white wife appeared in evidence yesterday at the Municipal Court, when Hooker was charged with having threatened to kill her. Hooker is a tall, powerfully built, full-blooded negro, about 30 years old. Mrs. Hooker is about five feet tall, probably weighs less than 100 pounds, has a slight voice, and an eloquence peculiarly her own. She and her husband were married at Cleveland, O., in 1888. Hooker had a handkerchief over his neck, to hide burns caused, he said, by his wife throwing boiling water over him.

"My husband has threatened to kill me," spoke up Mrs. Hooker, at a 2:14 o'clock. "Yes, I threw water on the stove on him, but I didn't think it was warm. I just did it for romance."

"You did it for what?" queried Municipal Judge Hogue.

"Oh, just for romance—fun, I mean. He started to quarrel with me, and said he was going to take the children away from me. That's why I did it. I didn't think

It was referred to the committee on streets, together with the company's acceptance of the terms of the ordinance, and it is probable that the whole matter will be threshed out again.

A resolution was introduced by Mr. Sherrett asking whether some means could not be taken to have the elevators in the City Hall, which have not been used for years, placed in operation. It was referred to the ways and means committee.

Petitions for the improvement of Maryland avenue, Benton street and Albina

avenue were referred to the street committee, and for sewers in Upshur and East Thirty-third streets to the committee on sewers and drainage.

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REPORT TO GRAND LODGE

A. O. U. W. GRAND OFFICERS REVIEW THE WORK OF THE YEAR.

Grand Master Workman Hogue Recommends Appointment of Field Supervisor—Convention July 15.

Grand Master Workman C. C. Hogue, Grand Reporter Newton Clark, Grand Receiver R. L. Durham and the Grand Medical Examiner have prepared their annual reports for submission to the Grand Lodge, A. O. U. W., at its session, which will begin July 15, in this city. Mr. Hogue gives an extended review of the work of the year just closed, and calls attention to the amendments to the constitution of the Grand Lodge of Oregon, which were approved by the recent Supreme Lodge. The most important amendment is contained in section 16, which now sets forth that if one or more beneficiaries shall die during the lifetime of the member, the surviving beneficiaries shall be entitled to the benefit (\$2000 or \$1000), unless otherwise provided in the beneficiary certificate, and if all the beneficiaries shall die during the lifetime of a member, and he shall have made no other direction, the benefit shall be paid to his widow, if living.

Reference is made to the Mathot case and the report of the board of arbitration. This is the case in which Dana Mathot is alleged to have deceived the medical examiner and obtained membership through such deception. He was admitted to membership on April 2, 1901, and died April 28, 1901, of heart disease. The board of arbitration has held that the beneficiary, his wife, is not entitled to the benefit, and the grand master sustained the report. The matter, on appeal, will come up before the Grand Lodge.
