**HOME FOR AGED ELKS.**

The Order Buys the Hotel Bedford, at Bedford City, Va.

BALTIMORE, Md., July 4.—Henry W. Means, of this city, one of the supreme trustees of the Order of Elks, reports to-day that the order has secured a National home for its aged and indigent members by the purchase of the Hotel Bedford, at Bedford City, Va. This building was erected in 1880 and its original cost, with fittings, was \$120,000. It has accommodations for 250 inmates. The home is now thoroughly furnished and will be opened October 1. The committee which purchased the property includes M. D. Detweiler and Judge Fisher, of Jamestown, N. Y.; Mayor Brennan, of Birmingham, Ala.; George P. Kronk, of Omaha, and the supreme ruler of the order, Charles B. Pickett, of Waterloo, Ia. The purchase has been officially approved by the supreme trustees.

**SNOW IN COLORADO.**

Fall Ranges From One to Three Inches in Mountain Districts.

DENVER, July 4.—Specials from various towns in the mountain portions of Colorado report snowfall today ranging from an inch to three inches. Leadville reports a light fall, while at Aspen, more than two inches fell during the day and night. The temperature has been low all over the state.

## NO SIGN OF TRACY

Outlaw Eludes Seattle Officers.

SPENDS NIGHT IN THE CITY

Drives Away With Stolen Horse and Buggy.

NEIL RAWLEY, WOUNDED, DEAD

Fugitive Last Seen Near Scene of His First Battle—Militia Has Been Dismissed, as Sheriff Does Not Desire Assistance.

Where Convict Harry Tracy is no one knows. He has again made his way out of a country teeming with armed men, and when last seen was going north with a stolen horse and buggy. Sheriff Cuddehe, of King County, now proposes to station parties of three to seven men all over the county.

Neil Rawley, who was wounded in the battle near Fremont Thursday, is dead. Deputy Sheriff Williams, who was wounded in the fight at Bothell, has a good chance of recovery.

SEATTLE, July 4.—On roads ambushed and patrolled by guards armed with new Winchester rifles, Tracy, the Oregon convict, has again escaped. His whereabouts in a district of 30 miles radius are absolutely unknown. Sheriff Cuddehe's office has been deluged with reports of his appearance. Each was traced down to its source by posse. All were groundless.

Neil Rawley, shot by Tracy, when the convict killed Policeman Breece at Fremont, last night, died today. Deputy Sheriff Williams is not yet dead, and has a good chance to live.

Up to this time, Tracy has killed three men since his first appearance near Seattle Thursday morning. All three "were well known and popular here. This has incited hundreds to hunt the desperado. One hardware store, named to supply arms for the posses, has given up its complete stock in this line. Specials are leaving on the railway leading into the adjacent country every few hours with reinforcements. Parties are dropped off all along the route between here and Bothell, the scene of the first battle between the desperado and his pursuers, yesterday.

At about 1 o'clock this morning, Tracy was first seen after his encounter at Fremont at a house on the outskirts of Ballard. He shouted his name defiantly to the occupants, and coolly proceeded to hitch up a horse and buggy. He drove away south of the town of Ballard in the direction of Seattle. The next authentic reports brought to the Sheriff after daybreak this morning contained the information that Tracy had eluded them by a route in Woodland Park, within the Seattle City limits. He left the park shortly before sunrise in his stolen rig.

## DID POSSE KILL HIM?

Doubt as to Whether Tracy Shot Rawley.

FATAL WOUND FROM REVOLVER

Coroner Is Certain the Unfortunate Man Was Hit by a Bullet From Weapon in Hands of Man Hunter.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 4.—Did a member of the posse, instead of Tracy, the Oregon convict, give Neil Rawley his death wound in the fight near Fremont

last night? The finding of a 38-caliber bullet in his body leads Coroner Hoye to believe that he was shot to his death by some one other than the desperado Tracy. While the Coroner will wait until Tracy is either captured or killed before going into an investigation, he is certain the unfortunate man was hit by a bullet from the hands of one of the party chasing the convict. The important and startling discovery was made this afternoon about 4 o'clock. Up to that time it was believed for a certainty that Tracy had sent the death bullet into Rawley's body. When the lead missile was finally located in the breast, just over the heart, it proved to be a bullet from a cartridge of a 38-caliber pistol.

Coroner Hoye, who was present at the post-mortem, preserved the small piece of lead. If Tracy is captured, and it is found that he had firearms in his possession besides the 30-30 rifle, it will then be an established fact that, being close pressed by the officers of the law, he took a desperate chance with his revolver.

Then there is a possibility that Rawley might have been hit accidentally by J. I. Knight, who was a member of the posse. Mr. Knight carried a 38-caliber revolver, and was near Officer Breece when he was not killed by Tracy. He states he distinctly saw Tracy fire and kill the policeman.

BOISE, Idaho, July 4.—The man held at Nampa on suspicion of being David Merrill, the Oregon convict, who escaped with Tracy, was released today. While he resembled the fugitive, it was clearly shown he was not the man wanted.

Heirs to Two Millions.

NEW YORK, July 4.—John Gilmore Hall, adopted son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles T. Hall, of Arlington, N. J., with three other children, is believed to be heir to \$2,000,000 left by his father, who is said to have bequeathed his four children 2 years ago at Crestline, O., after placing them in an orphan home. Mr. and Mrs. Hall adopted John when he was 5 years old and brought him up as one of their own family. About a year ago the young man entered the Army, and is now stationed at Fort Riley, Kan.

According to information received by Hall, Gilmore, after placing the children in an orphan home, went to Mexico, where

he took up mining, and died wealthy. On his death bed he told his partner of his children and begged him to take up the search for them. All have been found except a daughter.

ST. LOUIS EXPOSITION.

President Announces the Postponement Until 1904.

WASHINGTON, July 4.—The President has issued a proclamation in accordance with the act of Congress, announcing to the world the postponement, until April 30, 1904, of the opening of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition. The proclamation says:

## READ TO FILIPINOS

Amnesty Proclaimed at Manila Yesterday.

SIX HUNDRED PRISONERS FREED

Aginaldo Preparing to Take a Trip—General Observance of Independence Day—Transfer of Authority.

MANILA, July 4.—President Roosevelt's amnesty proclamation was read at noon today in English and Spanish from a flag-draped stand on the Luneta, after a parade of 6000 Americans and Filipinos. Arthur Ferguson, secretary to Governor Taft, read the proclamation in the presence of a small gathering, as the heat dispersed the crowd when the parade ended.

The prisoners freed by the proclamation, estimated to number 600, were released without ceremony. Many military prisoners had previously been freed. Aginaldo remained in the house which has sheltered him since his captivity. He is expected to visit friends briefly and then depart on a trip. His destination is not announced. The exiles on the island of Guam are expected to return here on a special steamer.

The observance of the National holiday was general. The city was decorated, and the shops were flying all their flags. The celebration was typically American, even to the fireworks.

Acting Governor Wright and General Chaffee reviewed the procession, and Captain Crossed delivered an oration. He defended the American policy in the Philippines, predicted the ultimate complete acceptance of American institutions by the Filipinos, and denounced the critics of the Philippine policy.

There were athletic games and races in the afternoon, and fireworks and illumination at night.

The military have surrendered control of Batangas Province to the civil authorities, and with Laguna Province organized and General Calles appointed Governor, every province in Luzon is now under civil government.

Strain Tells on Gardener.

The cross-examination of Major Cornelius Gardener, Governor of Tayabas Province, by the board which has been investigating the charges of cruelty, etc., brought by the Major against American officers and soldiers, was continued yesterday. The case will be closed shortly.

There was much wrangling between the Recorder and counsel for the Major. The Recorder made frequent objections to counsel conferring with his client when the latter was testifying, and counsel objected to much of the cross-examination on the ground that the questions were designed to trip the witness. Major Gardener is ill and on the verge of nervous collapse, owing to worry and the strain of the proceedings.

Spread of Cholera.

In Manila yesterday, 49 fresh cases and 23 deaths from cholera were reported. In the provinces the records show that 199 new cases and 147 deaths have occurred. The health officials are striving to check the spread of the disease, and have asked for larger appropriations.

General disappointment is expressed here at the failure of Congress to deal with the currency question.

Captain Ryan's Trial Begun.

The trial by court-martial of Captain James A. Ryan, of the Fifteenth Cavalry, on the charge of being unnecessarily severe and arbitrary in his dealings with the natives of the province where he was stationed, has begun here.

Hanna Taylor a Columbia Professor.

WASHINGTON, July 4.—Hanna Taylor, of New York, who works on constitutional and international law, and formerly United States Minister to Spain, has been elected to the chair of English common law in the school of comparative jurisprudence and international law of Columbia University. Dr. Taylor will divide with Justice Harlan and Brewer, of the United States Supreme Court, the teaching of constitutional and international law in that institution.
