

JUMPED WITH BABE

Frantic Deed of an Insane Woman in Albina.

LEAPS FROM AN UPPER WINDOW

With Her Four-Months-Old Infant in Her Arms, Mrs. Haggallion Makes Desperate Attempt at Suicide.

Crazed by a fit of temporary insanity, and dependent upon the absence of her husband, Mrs. Haggallion, with her four-months-old baby in her arms, jumped from the second story of the Peacher building, at Mississippi and Russell streets, yesterday afternoon. The woman was badly bruised and injured from the fall, and it is not yet known whether she can recover. The baby was more or less protected, and, while very badly bruised, it is thought that the injuries will not prove fatal. The woman's 2-year-old daughter was at her side when she jumped, tugging at her skirts and trying to dissuade her from the foolish act. Quite a crowd who had been attracted by her strange actions before she jumped, witnessed the startling attempt at suicide, and all describe it as the most sad and heart-rending scene they had ever witnessed. The little child, tears, pitifully pleading with her mother and vainly attempting with what little strength she had to prevent the deed, the frenzied saving of the woman, then the startling leap resulting, as they all thought, in the loss of two human lives, made an impression upon all spectators which they say they will never forget.

Perry Parmelee, with his family, occupies rooms directly above those from which the woman jumped. About 4 o'clock he was attracted by the noise down stairs. The mother was frantically crying and screaming, "Oh, my Lord, my darling baby," was all that she could be heard to say, but her voice and actions showed clearly that something was wrong. Mr. Parmelee rushed down the stairs to attempt to get into her room. At the door he met Ernest Burwick and Herman Rittigan, who had been passing along the street and had also been attracted by the strange noise and actions of the woman. Together they attempted to force the door and gain an entrance, but before they could get inside and stop her, she had jumped from the window, and they could only go down and attend to her injuries.

Both the baby and the little girl are being taken care of by Mrs. Lee, the landlady at the Peacher House, and the woman has been taken to St. Vincent's Hospital, where all possible will be done to save her life. Nothing has occurred or been said before or since the accident to explain the woman's action, other than to ascribe it to a fit of temporary insanity. Those who know her say that they have thought for some time that her mind was failing, and that since her husband left a few days ago she has been especially dependent. Her husband had been a dockhand in Portland for some time, but a few days ago he went to Astoria, where he expected to make a business of fishing, and from the time of his departure, say those who were well acquainted with the family, dated her dependency. She had a hard struggle of sickness about three months ago, and since she has recovered her peculiar actions have been noticeable.

"I feel sure it was a fit of temporary madness," said the woman's landlady, Mrs. Lee. "We have noticed that her mind was failing for some time. I do not think she has ever been all right in her mind since her sickness about three months ago. Since the departure of her husband she has been more dependent than ever. I have never heard of any trouble between them, and do not know whether she objected to his leaving, or whether it was her own mind that was so much. She never has said anything to lead us to think that she wanted to take her life. After her fall, she did not realize that she had jumped from the window at all, and when asked why she did, she denied having done it."

Mrs. Perry Parmelee noticed the actions of the woman and saw her jump. "It was a most distressing scene," said she, "and I think I shall never forget it. At first the woman put one foot out of the window and sat there for a while with her 2-year-old girl at her side and her baby in her arms. The little girl was doing all she could to save her mother, and was crying pitifully. The mother was walling and screaming, my Lord, my poor baby, but I could not hear her say anything else. After she jumped, I ran down stairs, and my husband and some other men took her to her room and sent for the ambulance."

Both Mr. and Mrs. Parmelee ascribe the deed to insanity, and tell the same story regarding her actions as that told by Mrs. Lee.

MARINE ENGINEERS WORK

Run Holiday Boats Rather Than Disappoint the Public.

The marine engineers exerted their full strength in the strike yesterday, and all boats that left the harbor carried non-engineers, with the exception of a few, where excursions had been previously planned, and the engineers gradually tendered their services, rather than have the people disappointed. The tie-up, however, was not complete, as members of the companies and nonunion engineers managed to have at least one boat from each company running. A few of the companies succeeded in securing engineers for two of their boats. Nothing was done by either side yesterday toward settling the trouble to a settlement, and aside from the informal gatherings to talk over the situation no meetings were held.

The advertisement in the papers by the Caledonian Club, saying that its excursion had been postponed on account of the strike of the marine engineers, was regarded by them as an unjust statement, and they said that they had always held themselves ready to accommodate the people in such cases as this, and that they had offered this particular club their services for the excursion. The following communication was yesterday received from the marine engineers:

"Portland, Or., July 4.—In justice to the marine engineers, the statement that was made in this morning's Oregonian, in regard to the Caledonian Club, was misleading. The postponement was made on account of the inclemency of the weather, and not on account of the misunderstanding between the engineers and the employers. The engineers tendered their services gratis to the Caledonian Club, so as not to disappoint the club and their many friends, and they refer this matter to Judge Cameron for the veracity of this statement."
