SIGNAL HONOR FOR OREGON MAN

Work of Convention in Portland is Practically Concluded—Excursion Down the Columbia Today.

The business of the annual convention of the Pure Food and Dairy Commissioners was practically brought to a close yesterday. Another session will be held today, however, when a few unfinished details will be attended to.

The highest honors of the convention were awarded to Oregon, when J. W. Bailey, the Oregon Commissioner, was elected to the presidency.

Aside from the election of officers, the address of Hon. J. E. Blackburn, of Ohio, was the leading feature of the day. Dr. E. N. Eaton, of Illinois, presented a paper in which he brought out the need of a National food pharmacopoeia. The idea is entirely an original one, and will be taken up by the Commissioners. Today an excursion will be given to Astoria, and the delegates will hold the last session of their convention on the waters of the Columbia. At Astoria the Commissioners will be entertained by the Citizens' Club, and in the evening will be tendered a banquet. A telegram was received during yesterday's session that the banquet would be ready at 8 o'clock for the visitors. From Astoria the party will go to Seaside, where they will spend a pleasant day and return to Portland tomorrow.

Address of Hon. J. E. Blackburn.
The second day of the convention was opened yesterday by the address of Hon. J. E. Blackburn, of Ohio, upon the subject of "Adulterated Coffee, Glazed and Other Food Products." He is a well-known food expert, and his address was one of the most interesting of the convention, and was thoroughly discussed.

Mr. Blackburn's address was in part as follows:

"Within the last few years the consumption of coffee has increased from eight pounds per capita to nearly 12 pounds. Nearly everybody uses coffee at least once a day; many two or three times. Statistics show that there is imported about 90,000,000 pounds of coffee into the United States every year, or an average of over 12 pounds for each and every inhabitant. I am also informed that there are about 48,000,000 pounds of coffee consumed in the State of Ohio every 12 months, and it will be readily seen that an article of such wide popularity that is consumed in such enormous quantities, that is used regularly in every family, becomes an article of supreme interest to every student of questions affecting the welfare of the people, whether this interest arises from business or sentimental reasons."

The speaker then cited a number of authorities on the subject of what constitutes pure coffee, and said:

"The principal forms of adulteration in the bean are by mixing some foreign substance with the berry and then grinding altogether. The adding of peas, beans and coffee shells in mixtures of this kind have become common. The remedy is simple: Do not buy ground coffee; buy a small mill and grind it yourselves as needed."

"But by far the most serious and far-reaching adulteration with which I am familiar is the so-called glazing of coffee. This abuse has been growing in popularity of late years and seems to me to demand immediate attention by all interested in preventing imposition upon the consumer. The glazing is composed of albuminous material like the contents of an ordinary hen's egg, and the method of application is to dilute with water and apply to the coffee while warm from roasting, and immediately after the coffee has been sprayed with water."

"There is not a case on record where this filthy dope has ever been applied to anything but the cheapest and trashiest coffee obtainable; there is not a case on record where this stuff has ever been applied to even a medium grade of coffee or any other grade except the very lowest."

"In the light of these undisputed facts, what can be the object of this treatment? There can be only one rational

then made for a call for a National food pharmacopoeia convention by the National Association of Food Commissioners. This association was claimed to be the proper authority to issue the call for such a convention and give credentials for representation. The subject was discussed by Dr. A. S. Mitchell, Wisconsin; Dr. R. E. Doolittle, Michigan; and Dr. J. M. Nelson, Nebraska. Action on the matter was postponed until a later date, but the members generally expressed themselves as in favor of the plan presented by Dr. Eaton. At the close of the discussion the officers for the ensuing year were elected, after which a number of communications were read from various cities that wished to have the next meeting of the convention. The next place of meeting was not decided upon, and the matter was referred to the executive committee. The most pressing invitation was from Salt Lake City, and telegrams urging its acceptance were received from the Governor of Utah and the Mayor of Salt Lake City. After three communications were read, the meeting adjourned, to meet again tomorrow on the steamer "Potter," which will take the convention to Astoria at 9 o'clock this morning.

MORE SHIPS CHARTERED

GERMAN, DANISH AND BRITISH CRAFT FOR WHEAT-LOADING.

En Route List Now Largest on Record—Pembroke's Hard Luck—Trafalgar at Newcastle.

Prospects for a big crop of wheat in the Pacific Northwest have steadily improved within the past fortnight, and under the stress of good crop reports exporters have begun to take up more ships for fall loading. All flags look alike to the grain shippers, and the French bark Daniel, reported chartered Wednesday, was followed yesterday by the Danish bark Ingeborg. German ship Wegs and British ship Glenholm, both with the exception of the Glenholm, being taken for Portland loading. The Ingeborg is now en route to Maat-lan from Europe, with general cargo, and

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TEAMSTERS ARE ENJOINED

PERPETUAL WRIT OF INJUNCTION ISSUED BY JUDGE GEORGE.

Order is Granted With the Approval of the Strikers' Attorney, Henry E. McGinn.

A perpetual injunction was issued by Judge George yesterday afternoon in the suit of Bannell-Vesey Fuel Company against the striking teamsters and their union, known as Fuel and Sand Teamsters' Local Union, No. 208, Team Drivers International Union.

Henry E. McGinn appeared as attorney for the teamsters and stated that the men had not committed any acts of violence, and did not intend to commit any disorderly acts, or to do anything contrary to law. Counsel said he was willing for the temporary restraining order made by Judge Fraser to remain in force.

William T. Muir, attorney for the company, asked to have the order amended so as to prevent the following of teams of the company, but this was not allowed, not being considered necessary.

Mr. McGinn stated that he had read the complaint and talked with his clients. As far as he had learned they had not been guilty of any of the things complained of. They admit, he said, that some things have been done which should not have been done, but they were not the guilty persons. Continuing, he said: "Inasmuch as the union has done nothing wrong, they are willing to have the same order entered as was entered in the case against the Amalgamated Woodworkers' Union, with which your honor is familiar."

Mr. McGinn stated that if the company thinks it will make matters more binding, they are willing to have the order referred to issued, or the one drawn up and signed by Judge Fraser temporarily in this case, and any client at law-abiding citizens. The strike is now on, but the men do not desire to do anything contrary to law.

Mr. Muir declared this agreement on the part of the defendants would be satisfactory, but he wanted an addition made to the effect that the men should not follow the teams and abuse the drivers.

Mr. McGinn stated that he would do this. "Intimidation" covered it. He stated that it was a union principle to find out where wood was delivered, and in a peaceable manner to try to persuade people to patronize union places, but they would do nothing against the law.

"Well, your honor," said Mr. Muir, "can we bring the matter into court if they abuse the drivers? Only yesterday there was an instance of several men following one of the drivers and abusing him. I cannot say they were union men, as that is not known, but if one of them could be found he could be easily identified."

"You can always come into court if the order is violated," answered Judge George. The order agreed upon and signed by the court is as follows:
