ARBITRATORS CALLED IN

Question of Repairs on Fourth and Alder Street House is Settled.

The warrants for the arrest of S. L. Brown, owner of the building on the northwest corner of Fourth and Alder streets, and G. L. Vanderhoof, contractor for the repairs to the building, were served yesterday morning, but no further action was taken, as the men agreed to quit work until a satisfactory settlement could be reached. Terms were arranged with the Fire Commissioners by which the matter could be arbitrated under section 38 of the fire ordinance, which provides that in the case of the damage to a building and the owners and the Fire Commissioners are unable to agree as to whether the damage exceeds 40 per cent, arbitrators may be selected, the commission to select one and the owner the second. In event of a disagreement the two are to choose a third, all three to be competent mechanics, and their decision is to be final.
