CHINA AGAIN APPEALS

WANTS AMERICA TO HELP SETTLE INDEMNITY QUESTION.

Says It is Impossible to Make Payments in Gold, as Some of the Powers Demand.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—Having practically adjusted the question connected with the surrender to the Chinese of the control of the City of Tien Tsin, this government has been asked to interest itself in the settlement of the grave difficulties growing out of the insurance of some of the powers upon payment of their share of the war indemnity in gold instead of silver.

DEATH OF AN OREGON PIONEER OF 1853.

JORDAN, Or., July 15.—William Shelton, who died at his home here July 4, crossed the plains to Oregon from Missouri in 1853, and settled on the Lane County farm where he died.

The cablegram, which is from Viceroy Liu Kuo Yih and Chang Tung, is as follows: "According to reports of a conference held by the foreign Ministers at Peking on the indemnity question, the United States is willing to accept silver, Great Britain is willing to accept silver in accordance with the plan of amortization up to 1910, and Russia and France propose the collection of import duties in gold.

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., July 16.—The strike at the Carr coal mine, where 200 men went out yesterday because the company refused to employ a workman whom the men had displaced, was declared off today and the men will return to work tomorrow.

STORM IN NORTH DAKOTA

Much Damage to Property, but No Loss of Life.

FARGO, N. D., July 16.—A section north and south of Grand Forks was visited by a terrific wind and hail storm last night, causing great damage. At Conway the hail was the worst ever experienced, and it is feared the damage to crops will be heavy.

China Ripe for Rebellion.

VICTORIA, B. C., July 16.—Pekin correspondents of Chinese papers received here by the Oriental liners arriving yesterday stated that a big rebellion is being organized by the ex-Boxer leaders, Fung Fu Hsing, Prince Tuan and Lan Kung, who are in Ninghsai, and that they have the assistance of the army of General Tang Zu Hsing whose army was ordered disbanded, an order which the soldiers refused to comply with, but, instead, took up their arms and joined the rebels.

RESTORING THE COMPANIE.

Work Begins on the Collapsed Bell Tower at Venice. NEW YORK, July 16.—Within a barricade surrounding the ruins of the campanile, workmen are sorting into separate heaps the marble, statues, broken bronze bells, copper roofing, carvings of the columns and iron bars cables. The Venice correspondent of the Herald, Signor Kasi, Minister of Public Works, and Signor Calderon, Director of Fine Arts, have arrived from Rome to conduct the inquiry into the causes of the disaster.

Oil Found in Lower California.

GUAYMAS, Mexico, July 16.—During the past few days considerable excitement has been created over the discovery of small springs containing oil in Lower California. Further explorations for oil will be made.

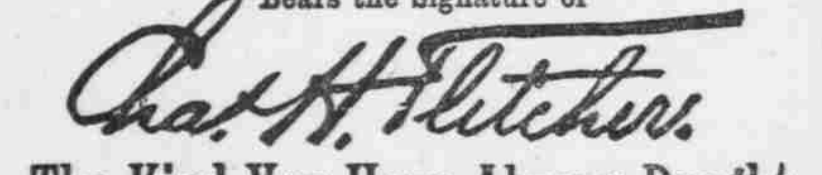
