Prospects of an extra session of the Oregon Legislature seem to be glimmering less every day. In fact, the subject has sunk almost into innocent desuetude.

A little while ago the little birds were twittering under the leaves something about a round robin. The round robin was to be a petition to the Governor against an extra session, and it was to contain a broad hint that enough lawmakers might not show their faces in the Capitol to make an "extra." This outcome was deemed possible in view of the precedent of 1877, since what man has done man can do.

Governor Geer said that the question of an "extra" was for the people to talk about and decide.
