

SOLDIERS ARE LOLE

Nothing for Them to Do at Shenandoah.

THE STRIKERS ARE ORDERLY

Troops Are a Great Attraction to the Unemployed - Union Officials Want Them Withdrawn.

Mineworkers at Shenandoah are incensed over the action of the National Guard. They declare that troops are not needed there, and appeal to Governor Stone to withdraw them.

RHENANDOAH, Pa., July 31.—Twelve hundred state troops are encamped tonight on a hill overlooking Shenandoah.

Another Restraining Order Issued Against Mineworkers.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., July 31.—John Mitchell, president of the United Mineworkers, has been ordered to file an equity suit in the Federal court here today by the Chesapeake & Ohio Coal Agency Company, a New Jersey corporation.

Beyond the presence of a group of soldiers here and there on the principal street, Shenandoah does not show any evidence of having passed through a trying ordeal.
