

REMOUNT SCANDALS UP

SUBJECT OF DISCUSSION IN HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Government is in Favor of Full Investigation—Purchases in United States and Argentina.

LONDON, Aug. 4.—The remount scandals were discussed in the House of Commons today in the course of a discussion of the army estimates and the item of transportation and remounts.

In answer to the War Secretary, John Dillon (Nationalist) asserted that Mr. Brodrick's vague speech only strengthened his suspicions, and he pointed out an instance of this that the government had not denied that Major Studdert had profited largely through buying horses in Ireland under a false name.

The vote on the item of transportation and remount was agreed to.

The House of Commons sat until 3 o'clock this morning, passing resolutions amounting to millions of pounds by the now familiar end-of-the-session "raffish" process, but without the scenes which usually accompanied wholesale closure.

CHANGE IN ROSEBERY.

Irish Think He Has Abandoned the Gladstone Policy.

NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—Lord Rosebery's speech on Thursday night, although creating little surprise, naturally attracted considerable attention in Ireland, says a London dispatch to the Tribune. It was regarded as marking a definite departure of the Premier from Gladstone's Irish policy, which he supported from 1886 to 1896.

Turkish Princess Arrested.

LONDON, Aug. 5.—The Constantinian correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says Prince Rashid, a veteran politician of Turkey, and Prince Djimat, the next in succession to the throne, have been arrested and imprisoned, accused of assisting the Young Turkey party.

Boers Still Opposed to Britain.

LONDON, Aug. 5.—The correspondent of the Daily Mail at The Hague says in a dispatch that it is becoming increasingly difficult to combat the generally accepted Dutch theory that the Boer leaders here are conscientious toward the ultimate substitution of British rule in South Africa.

Want Troops Out of Shanghai.

LONDON, Aug. 4.—Cabling from Shanghai, the correspondent of the Times says that Liu Hsun Yi, Viceroy of Nankin, has addressed a strong request to the consuls of the foreign powers to withdraw the foreign troops from Shanghai in the hope that Great Britain, France and Japan, who are willing to accept their terms, will induce Germany to consent to the proposition.

Hyde Gets a Rosette.

PARIS, Aug. 4.—James H. Hyde of New York has been decorated with the rosette of officer of public instruction as a recognition of his Franco-American educational efforts. It is announced that Mr. Hyde will bear the expense of the rosette.

Enthusiasm for Alfonso.

MADRID, Aug. 4.—King Alfonso's journey to Oviedo yesterday was a continual triumph. The town was decorated in honor of the King's visit, and crowds were gathered around the Town Hall, enthusiastically cheering the young monarch, who appeared on a balcony and acknowledged the ovation.

Anarchy in Turkish Province.

VIENNA, Aug. 5.—The Politische Correspondenz reports a serious state of anarchy in the vilayet of Monastir, European Turkey, due to the activities of Albanian brigands who are said to be murdering and mutilating people in order to extort money and for the purpose of seeking Macedonian revolutionists.

Donor of Balloon Prize Hurt.

PARIS, Aug. 4.—M. Deutch, donor of the prize of 100,000 francs, offered for the invention of a dirigible balloon, which was won by Santos-Dumont, was seriously hurt in an automobile accident in a suburb of Paris today. Several of his legs were broken and he was otherwise injured.

Vatican Hostile to France.

ROME, Aug. 4.—The Vatican regards the present situation in France arising from the closing of unauthorized congregational schools as most grave, as it is now believed to be the intention of M. Combes, the French Premier, to denounce the concordat.

SIXTEEN CONVICTS ESCAPE FROM TENNESSEE PENITENTIARY.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 4.—Armed with dynamite to blow his way out of prison, Glad Hyatt, the train robber, and his desperado, tonight made a desperate band of 16 convicts to liberty from the Tennessee penitentiary. Fifteen of the escaping party got entirely clear of the premises, but one, Ed Carney, Nicholas, pulling the penalty of death in the bold undertaking.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—The grand jury indicted Harry A. Barrows, formerly disbursing clerk of the United States Census Bureau, on charges of alleged embezzlement and the larceny of \$7500. Barrows was confessed to the discrepancy.

Historic Building Begins to Crumble.

BERLIN, Aug. 4.—The historic building in Frankfurt in which the old German Emperors were crowned is beginning to crumble. The authorities have ordered that bricks be placed at once to save it.

St. Paul Cathedral Weak.

LONDON, Aug. 4.—In its issue this morning the Daily Mail says that one of the great portions of St. Paul's Cathedral threatens to collapse unless thorough repairs are undertaken.

Middlemen Repudiated Settlement.

NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—A new complication has arisen in the strikes of the East Side tailors, and it is to be discussed at a mass meeting tomorrow evening in Cooper Union. Some of the officers of the American Federation of Labor are expected to speak. About 15,000 garment-workers will have gained their demands and will return to work today, while 20,000 who have not done so will strike again.

DRYDOCK TO CROSS OCEAN

Government Will Tow Large Structure to Philippines.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—The Navy Department will soon call for bids for a huge floating dock to accommodate a 16,000-ton battleship, to be built in the United States and floated over to the Philippines. This will be one of the largest floating docks ever constructed. The amount available is \$1,250,000, and Admiral Endicott, of the bureau of yards and docks, has already completed the specifications under which the dock will be towed across the Pacific or across the Atlantic through the Isthmus Canal, whichever route is chosen.

Hopkins, ex-Commissioner of Pensions, James Tanner and John McElroy, of the District of Columbia, and Louis Wagner of Pennsylvania.

New Orleans Strike on Again.

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 4.—Only four of the Cumberland Telephone Company's linemen who went on a strike which was settled yesterday, were assigned to duty today, and some of the nonunion men were retained. This reopens the strike, and the men who were put to work were called off. The electrical workers of the New Orleans Railway Company's lines all went to work, and the St. Charles Railway Company today accepted the terms of its men.

No Operation of Coal Mines.
