Large Shorts in July Oats Are Suspended.

ARE MAKING A FIGHT ON BULLS

Six More Injunctions Issued Stopping Payment of Margins-Precipitated by Several Calls for Settlements.

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—Injunctions were secured today from Judge Chytrius by Waite. Thoburn & Co., srain comminsteners, against three other Board of Trade firms, to prevent settlements in the July onts deal. President Warren is restrained from indorsing down margins to the firms who bought July onts of the complainants to the extent of \$20,000. The Bank of Montreal is sign enjoined from paying over the margins. To date, Bi injunctions have been issued by Judges Chytraus and Chetlain as the outcome of the charge by this Board of Trade firm that leading buils were engineering a corner in July onts.

Complaint was minde by Harrison, Gates & Co., that an indebtedness of \$36,000, incurred during the recent corner in corn, had been unsatisfied. In Thoburn saked the directors for more time in which to make a defense, but the request was desired. Concerning the action of the board Mr. Thoburn said:

"The suspension will make no difference in our fight in the court to prove the disgality of corners. We believe that as a result of our action there will never be another corner attempted on the Board of Trade."
