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MINING DREDGE STARTS UP

JOHN DAY PLANT RUNS SMOOTHER THAN EXPECTED.

Cost \$150,000, and is the second Plant of the Kind in Eastern Oregon.

SUMPTER, Aug. 5.—(Special.)—J. H. Pomeroy, general manager of the large dredger enterprise on the John Day River, has just given his machine a preliminary test of the dredging of the river.

The capacity of the dredge is above 200 cubic yards, although in making general averages, which must include necessary stops, the daily capacity is reduced.

It is believed that in the John Day Valley there will not be a month of the real cold weather may interfere for a brief time. Water for the limited supply required is assured. A large placer area is being worked by the company, which will soon be worked.

Idaho Bank Statement. SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 5.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: The Commercial National Bank today gave out an abstract of reports of the condition of National banks in Idaho on July 15.

It shows that the total resources increased from \$1,854,000 to \$2,319,547; loans and discounts decreased from \$2,511,623 to \$2,383,467, and cash reserves increased from \$235,880 to \$456,511, of which the gold holdings increased from \$22,470 to \$25,230.

Harvest Fire Near Wasco. WASCO, Or., Aug. 5.—(Special.)—A large harvest fire occurred this afternoon on the George N. Cronshaw ranch, three miles east of Wasco, 2500 sacks of wheat going up in smoke, along with a separator, derrick table, cookhouse and five wagons.

AS TO HOG RAISING. Defense of the Practice of Feeding Swill.

PORTLAND, Aug. 4.—(To the Editor.)—I notice in The Oregonian of Aug. 4, a piece about the harrangue of swill-fed pork and signed by "C." I am interested in and have some on shares; so I will try and answer "C." He asks, "is it not time to condemn the swill-fed articles?" I say it is not, and give my reasons.
