House of Commons Criticises the Government.

POLICY IN EUROPE AND CHINA

Change Was Mildly Replied to and Premier Balfour Said Britain Was Not Behind Other Countries.

LONDON, Aug. 6.—During the discussion of the appropriation bill in the House of Commons today the government was severely criticised by various members on its policy in Europe and in China.

In the course of a general reply, Viscount Cranborne, Under Secretary of the Foreign Office, made an illuminating reference to the treaty with Germany by saying that if a secret treaty existed, it was secret, therefore it followed necessarily that the government could not publish the terms thereof.

In moving the bill, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Thomas Balfour, explained that he thought it desirable to alter one clause of the bill so as to enable the Chancellor to borrow funds when necessary.

Replying to J. Edward Seeley (Conservative), who represented the lack of modern war appliances by the British army and navy and who urged the establishment of a department responsible for the adoption of every invention necessary to the army or navy, the Premier, A. J. Balfour, denied that Great Britain was behind other countries.

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CHINESE OPPRESSED BY TAXES.

Substitution of Surtax for Likin No Improvement.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 6.—General Sharretts, the special American tariff commissioner, in the course of an address at a banquet tendered him, said the Chinese people were ground to the verge of despair by taxation to meet the obligations of the central government, and that individually and officially he was opposed to the abolition of the likin and the substitution of a surtax.

Abolition of the Likin.

LONDON, Aug. 6.—In a dispatch from Shanghai, the correspondent of the Times says he considers Viceroy Liu Kun Yi's attitude on the question of inland waters to be partly due to the declaration made by General Sharretts, the American special tariff commissioner, that the Viceroy was opposed to the abolition of the likin.

LONDON, Aug. 6.—The Corporation of the City of London celebrated the conclusion of peace in South Africa with a reception in the Guild Hall, tendered jointly to Lord Roberts and Lord Kitchener. Both guests were present with addresses commemorating their distinguished war services.

Lord Roberts, responding to the presentation of a sword by Sir John Dimsdale, Lord Mayor of London, paid a tribute to Lord Kitchener as "the General whose guidance had brought the war to its successful conclusion."

Natal Wants Immigration. PIETERMARITZBURG, Natal, Aug. 6.—An important report by the Surveyor-General and Director of Agriculture estimates that 30,000 whites are necessary that Natal may be able to supply her own agricultural needs, and declares that preference should be given to farmers willing to work with their own lands.

Two Frenchmen Fined. PARIS, Aug. 6.—The Correctional Court today fined the Prince de Sagen 500 francs and the Comte de Marilly 100 francs for their assault on Maitre Barbour July 17, which the court declared was premeditated.

Kruger Gone to Visit Steyn. THE HAGUE, Aug. 6.—Ex-President Kruger, of the Transvaal Republic, went to Scheepstroom today to visit ex-President Steyn, of the Orange Free State.

Don't Want to Marry. MUNICH, Bavaria, Aug. 6.—The betrothal of Archduchess Marie Annunziata of Austria and Duke Siegfried of Bavaria, which was announced from Vienna June 15, has been broken off by mutual consent.

Protection Against American Copper. BERLIN, Aug. 6.—At a session of the tariff committee of the Reichstag today Herr Altmann moved a duty on raw copper in order to protect the German mines against the American.

Wanted to Succeed Cadogan. LONDON, Aug. 6.—It is considered probable that Dudley Cadogan will succeed Earl Cadogan as Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.

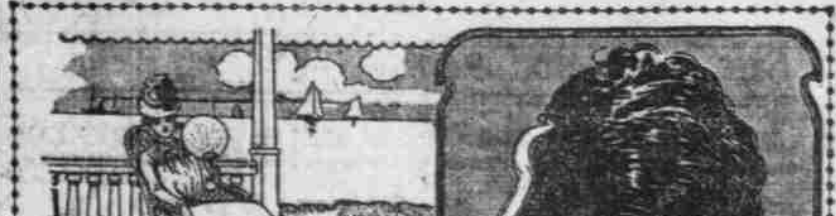
