

TO KILL THE GERMS

Now is the Time for Disinfecting, Say Physicians.

GENERAL CLEAN-UP IS NEEDED

In Order to Prevent Spread of Disease in Winter, Sanitary Practices Must Be Carefully Observed.

Many physicians of Portland seen yesterday regarding the sanitary condition of the city were united in their views that the practice of disinfecting and observing sanitary principles could not be overdone and that at the present time there is far too little attention paid to these things.

Health Commissioner's Views. Dr. Bierdorf, City Health Commissioner, in speaking of the matter, said: "The health of the people is practically in their own hands. A great majority of the diseases of today are germ-borne, and if the proper care were taken it would be possible to kill these germs before they have done any harm."

In this matter," said Dr. E. P. Geary, County Physician, "and I believe that it is wise to disinfect so far as you can. We have a record for health in Portland that we ought to keep up, and we will have to be at work to do it."

"A general disinfection would be a good thing," said Dr. S. C. Sloum, who is acting as City Physician in the absence of Dr. Zan, "if it could be carried out, but it would require a great deal of money."

Necessary Sanitary Measures. "The amount of disease could be greatly lessened," said Dr. C. H. Wheeler, professor of hygiene at the medical department of the State University, "if the proper sanitary measures would be observed."

Views of Dr. S. E. Joseph. "There is no doubt," said Dr. S. E. Joseph, dean of the State Medical School, "but that the amount of disease could be greatly lessened by the more thorough use of disinfecting agents, and it is a practice that cannot be overdone."

NO WOODEN WALKS NOW

MAYOR WILLIAMS SIGNS THE CONCRETE ORDINANCE.

Large District Set Aside on Both Sides of River—Big Rush Last Day for Permits.

The sidewalk ordinance is now a law, having been signed by Mayor Williams yesterday. Portland citizens will in a few years be able to speak proudly of their walks, for under the law no new wooden walks can be laid in the district embraced by the ordinance, and no old walks can be repaired for more than one-sixth of their original value.

When City Engineer Elliott opened up his office he was surprised to find a crowd of people, property owners and contractors, waiting to obtain permits to build walks of wood. They had heard of the ordinance, and were anxious to obtain permits to build before it was signed by the Mayor and became a law.

The limits of the new ordinance embrace a district of about 1700 blocks, on both sides of the river, and multiplying by 300 or the number of feet around a block, a total of 1,360,000 feet is covered by the amount of sidewalk to be improved within the next few days.

Resolutions were passed at the same meeting that the Council intended improving Fourth and Fifth streets with concrete walks and curbs from Gilman to Jefferson street.
