

CANNON PRAISES SHM

Roosevelt a Man of Action in Dealing With Trusts.

DEMOCRATS LOSE THUNDER

Illinois Representative Does Not Believe Next Congress Will Hear the Voice of the People and Revises the Tariff.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Wash- ington, Aug. 21.—President Joe Cannon is of the opinion that President Roosevelt has demonstrated his position on the trusts to the satisfaction of the country.

"A pound of action is worth more than a ton of denunciation," said he, "and President Roosevelt has given us more than the pound. He has halted the Northern Securities Company into court, and the case is now ready for trial. The Democrats may denounce the trusts, but they have done nothing to curb or regulate them. A Republican Congress passed the Sherman anti-trust act, and a Republican President is trying to enforce it. He did not wait for complaint or prompting. As soon as the Northern Pacific merger was effected, by which two great parallel lines of railroad were to be consolidated and destroy competition, President Roosevelt directed the Attorney to begin legal action. I fancy the Democrats will have little ammunition for an anti-trust campaign by the time the court hears this case, which is set for the first week in September."

Strong Fight on Lacey. Iowa is a Good Legislator, and West Should Wish Him Well.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Wash- ington, Aug. 20.—A fight is being made upon Representative Lacey, of Iowa, and quite a strong effort is being put forth to defeat him. Lacey is a man who has been in the legislature of Iowa for many years, and he is chairman of the committee on public lands, and for the most part has been very careful of Western interests. He is present in the House of Representatives with Western Representatives, and opposes some things which men are anxious to put through for their localities. But upon the whole, Representative Lacey is a man who gives the most careful attention to legislation, and is always thoroughly equipped with facts upon any bill that is reported from the House committee. For these reasons, Lacey is a special reason to wish him well, and he was one of the warm friends of the Crater Lake Park proposition. He also introduced Representative Moody on several Indian land bills, and was a prominent member of the committee on Indian affairs, as well as public lands.

Representative Lacey has one hobby which ought to be encouraged, and for that reason it is to be hoped he will be returned to the House and continue as chairman of the committee on public lands. He believes in taking all of nature's wonders and making them National Parks. He not only favored the Crater Lake National Park, but he also interested himself in the Mount Rainier National Park. He has succeeded in procuring for the people of the United States a National Park in the state of Iowa which contains the famous petrified forest in Arizona, and he is also favoring a bill making the great Wind Cave, in South Dakota, a National Park. He thinks that these wonderful spots should be separated from the public domain and be placed under National care, so speculators would probably be made this week. Le Boir this evening said that M. Cambon is mentioned as the successor of the Marquis de Montebello, French Ambassador to Russia.

Spanish War Condemned. ASHFIELD, Mass., Aug. 21.—At the 24th annual dinner, in aid of Sanders Academy, held here today, the so-called doctrine of imperialism was assailed, and the Spanish War was the object of caustic criticism. Professor Charles E. Norton presided, and made the opening address. In vigorous words he protested against the brutality of war in general and severely condemned the War with Spain. The other speakers included Edwin Burritt Smith, of Chicago; William G. Brown, of Alabama; Rev. John W. Chadwick, of Brooklyn; and Dr. G. S. Hall, of Worcester.

Distress in Cuba. New York Mail and Express. It is evident that the Cuban Congress will open under the industrial paralysis of the island as an excuse for the passage of the bonding bill. In the face of an estimated deficit, when it is pointed out that the creation of a national debt whose principal cannot be met and whose principal cannot be charged out of the current revenues, would be an open violation of the "Platt amendment," the answer is a petulant denial coupled with a plaintive account of the distress of the people. It is not to be denied that the failure of Congress to open the American market

to Cuban products is largely responsible for prevalent idleness that threatens starvation, which may ultimately cause riots. That fact makes the present situation all the more delicate. But in itself, that condition does not warrant the creation of a debt in plain violation of the organic law. It is to be observed, also, that it is planned to raise additional revenue—although still insufficient—by a heavy increase upon the necessities of life. That is a proposition to tax the poor man to pay a debt incurred ostensibly for his relief. It is to be noted at the same time that the proceeds of this bond issue are not to be expended for public works, or any other economic development. The cash thus raised would be distributed among the planters and in payment of wages due the "Army" of the revolution.

It would be interesting to know what progress is making toward embodying in a permanent treaty the provisions of the "Platt amendment" to the Cuban constitution. That instrument provides specifically for such a treaty. It is possible that in its terms may be included some method of commercial and industrial relief.

Japan's Trade With Siberia. WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—Japan is making an effort to develop her trade in Siberia, according to a report from United States Commercial Agent Greener, at Vladivostok, dated June 27, which was made public at the State Department today. Mr. Greener says that a Japanese commercial agent is making a tour of that vast territory to select eligible localities for consular representatives of Japan, and endeavor to ripen the trade of Japan there in various other ways.

Premier Sprigg Reappointed. LONDON, Aug. 21.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegram Company from Cape Town says: The Progressive party has elected Dr. J. W. Smart to be their leader, repudiating J. Gordon Sprigg as Premier. This probably means that the suspensionist wing of the Progressive party has chosen Dr. Smart as its leader. He was Premier in 1898, and was re-elected in the Spring Ministry until last May, when he resigned.

Death of Kang Yu Wei Ordered. LONDON, Aug. 21.—From quite a trustworthy source it is learned that the Shanghai correspondent of the Times, "I learn from the Dowager Empress has sent secret instructions to Wang Chi Chua, the new Governor of Kwangsi Province, to use every endeavor to complete the death of the reformer, Kang Yu Wei." Continuing, the correspondent says an official telegram from Hankow reports anti-felonians tried to lynch an automobilist who ran over an 8-year-old girl at Sing-sing; a Belgian Count killed an aged man at Bruhl, and a child was run over and killed at Puercher, on the Moselle.

Botha Goes to Belgium. LONDON, Aug. 21.—It is announced here in a special dispatch from Brussels that the Belgian Government has requested the Boer Governor, Botha, Dewet and Delarey, not to enter Belgium, and that the station-master at the Northern Railroad station has been instructed to summon troops to keep order in the event of his receiving notification of the presence of the Generals on board a train from Holland.

Death-Dealing Automobiles. BERLIN, Aug. 21.—The police administration of the Rhine country is taking measures to resist the invasion of Belgian automobiles. Parties from across the frontier race recklessly through German villages, and fatal accidents have just been reported from three villages. Rumored Killing of Missionaries. SHANGHAI, Aug. 21.—The rumors that an Australian missionary named Bruce and an English missionary named Lewis have been murdered at Chien Chou, in Hunan Province, continue to persist. A missionary named Stewart, of Chang Te Fu, Hunan Province, has started on a journey to inquire into the reports. He will be gone a week.

New British Academy. LONDON, Aug. 21.—King Edward has granted a charter, dated August 8, incorporating the new British Academy for the promotion of historical, philosophical and philological studies. The institution of the new academy, together with the creation of the recent Order of Merit, is regarded as a striking experiment on the part of the King, and has provoked much comment and comparison to the French Academy, which has recalled the fact to enroll any of the greatest names in French literature. Satisfaction is expressed that members of the British Academy are to be called simply "fellows," instead of the high-sounding French title, "Immortals."

Dr. Temple to Retire. NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—While there is no direct confirmation of the report that the archbishop of Canterbury will retire in the autumn, it is generally credited by clerymen, cables the Tribune's London correspondent. His infirmity was so conspicuous at the coronation that there was an announcement that he should have undertaken to conduct a service at St. Paul's Cathedral. The Prime Minister will have two of the most conspicuous ecclesiastical nominations at his disposal. The archbishop of the dean of Westminster into retirement, and as he is a Presbyterian rather than a churchman, his selections will be unusually interesting.

King and Queen on a Cruise. COWEE, Aug. 21.—The royal yacht Victoria and Albert, with King Edward and Queen Alexandra on board, left Cowee this afternoon on a cruise along the west coast of England. She anchored off Portland tonight.

WALSENBURG, Colo., Aug. 21.—A forest fire of immense proportions is burning on the western slope of the Greenhorn Mountain Range, 30 miles from Walsenburg, in the northwestern corner of Huerfano County.
