RISE- IN SOUTHERN PACIFIC RE-ASSURES SPECULATORS.

Another Excellent Influence Was the Good Support Accorded Colorado Fuel-Money Is Ensier.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22 -Today's stock market railled from yesterday's depression, and closed materially higher than last night. There

ket railled from yesterday's depression, and closed materially higher than last night. There was a considerable contraction in the volume of the trading, and it was not until late in the day that the disturbance to sentiment caused by yesterday's break in prices seemed entirely overcome. This was partly due to the evidence of continued liquidation in Colorado Fuel, which, it was feared, was creating a necessity to unload stocks elsewhere in the market. The appearance of support in that stock, and its raily to more than a point over last night, was an important factor in reassuring sentiment, and its effect was emphasized by the renewed strength in Louisville & Nashville, which was supposed to be relegated, in a speculative way, to the movement in Colorado Fuel.

The points of strength in the early part of the day were somewhat sentered, and might be attributed to special clusses. In the late dealings the strength became more general, and the market brondened out under the immediate influence of a 2-point rise in Southern Facific. The explanation of the strength in this stock a favorite of late years is now due to arrive from Europe. Ontario & Western contined its advance, with a rumor that it was being sought by the Canadian Facific for a combecting link with New York City, thus supplementing rumors of the Canadian Pacific's purpose to enter Chicago, which were subsequently denied.

The firmness of Western Union continued to accide remark and conjecture as to a possible combination of telegraph interests. When

September corn started 18810 up, at 574,858c, and with wide fluctuations jumped to 50%c. Here big quantities came out, and soon 1,000,000 bushels or more had been turned over to the shorts. 
Boyce Candidate for Governor.
