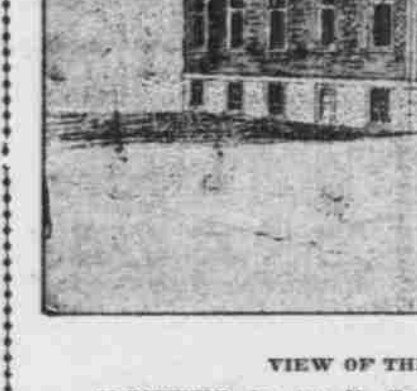
KANGAROO ESCAPES FROM CAGE AND SAILORS FLEE.

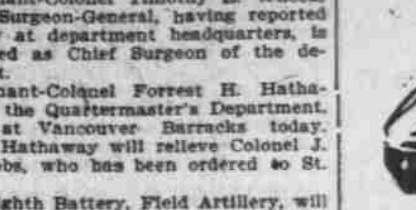
