

HIS BOOM OPENED

Tom L. Johnson a Presidential Candidate.

HE WINS A DECISIVE VICTORY

Sentiment of the Delegates to the Ohio Democratic Convention Back of the Cleveland Man.

SANDUSKY, O., Sept. 2.—Mayor Tom L. Johnson, of Cleveland, won a decisive victory today in the meetings preliminary to the Democratic state convention, which will be called to order tomorrow. Ever since he was selected as chairman of the convention by the state central committee, it has been the general opinion that this occasion would be made the public opening of his candidacy for the next Democratic nomination for the Presidency. In that respect his success has been phenomenal. No Ohio candidate for the Presidency ever had more unanimity of sentiment in his favor among the delegates at a state convention than was shown at the meetings tonight. The delegates, who met in the evening, were divided into districts for the purpose of selecting officers and members of the state committee. The committees on credentials, permanent organization and rules and order of business are almost unanimously with him for anything he wants. One of them gave him the double honor at once of agreeing on a report to make permanent the temporary organization of the convention. The Johnson men were opposed only in the selection of the committee on resolutions and members of the new state central committee. In some districts the contests were closer and more bitter than expected. The Johnson men took 14 of the 21 state committee members with three contests pending and a large majority of the committee on resolutions.

Major Johnson was to canvass the state this year with his big tent just as thoroughly as if he was on the ticket, and it is conceded to be a trial race for him as to whether he will be available next year.

The friends of other leaders, notably those of John R. McLean, claim that Mayor Johnson will be held responsible this year for defeat if the party falls, as well as get considerable credit for success in event of his new departure's winning. Among those here watching the course of events is John L. Zimmerman, of Springfield, who is a candidate upon the Democratic nomination next year for Governor, and who is friendly to McLean. The delegates met by Congressional districts this evening. The Johnson men met with more opposition than they expected. They had anticipated a fight for members of the new state central committee, but some of the districts pushed their opposition still further by selecting members of the committee on resolutions that are radically opposed to the Johnson platform. It is claimed that there will be a minority report on resolutions signed by about one-third of the 21 members of the committee unless the Johnson men make concessions.

The most notable meetings were those of the First and Second districts, which include Cincinnati, and which were the most disorderly known in the state for years. This was partly ascribed to the fact that there were no seats in the hall where the delegations met, and the howling delegates were able to rush upon the chairman in their endeavors to gain recognition. There was much pushing and shoving. The result in both districts was very close. What is known as the "Lewis G. Barnard faction," representing McLean, won out over the followers of Rev. Herbert S. Bigelow, representing Johnson.

ELECTION IN VERMONT.

No Candidate for Governor or Lieutenant-Governor Has Majority.

WHITE RIVER JUNCTION, Vt., Sept. 2.—There is no election by the people for Governor and Lieutenant-Governor, as a result of the state election held in Vermont today. The returns up to midnight indicated that Percival W. Clement, high license option candidate, was running very close to General John G. McCullough, Republican. The returns from 20 cities and towns out of 246 give the vote for Governor.

As a majority vote is required to elect the choice of Governor and Lieutenant-Governor is shown in the General Assembly, which will convene next month. The best idea of the change-over in votes, both in the Democratic and Republican parties, is shown by the comparison with the vote of the same 20 cities and towns in 1900, which gave Stokely, Republican, 29,661; Senator, Democrat, 14,439; all other, 129.

Clement showed great strength in the large cities. McCullough did not begin to hold the Republican vote. Clement getting his strength from this deficiency, to which, it is said, was added about one-half of the total Democratic vote of the state. The Prohibitionist vote was heavy.

David J. Foster, Republican, is elected to Congress. The First District, and Kittredge is elected in the Second District, as the contest at the head of the ticket did not affect the remainder of the Republican ticket, and Congressmen securing the usual majority.

The remainder of the state Republican ticket is as follows: Treasurer, John L. Bacon, of Hartford; Secretary of State, Fred Fietwood, of Newtown; Auditor, Horace F. Graham, of Craftsbury.

The House will consist of 118 Representatives, 25 Democrats, 53 High License and three Labor. The Senate is overwhelmingly Republican.

General McCullough will have a majority of 35 over all in the general ballot in the Assembly, which assures his election. The election today will go down in history as the most interesting ever known in the state, because of the spirited contest brought about by the bolting of delegates to the Republican state convention, headed by Clement, after an effort to place in the platform a plank favoring high-license local option had failed. The high-license men held a separate convention, nominating Clement for Governor, and have worked early and late in endeavoring to defeat the regular Republican ticket. But little attention was paid to the Democratic ticket, except to ask the voters of the party to assist in electing Representatives who would vote for a high-license local option liquor law, with a referendum clause attached.

DEMOCRATIC CAMPAIGN BOOK.

Mainly Devoted to Imperialism and Trusts.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—The Democratic Congressional campaign book, which made its appearance today, is a volume of 254 pages, the major portion of which is devoted to the discussion of imperialism and trusts, 249 pages being given to these two topics. Upon the title page is the Democratic slogan, "Equal Rights to All, Special Privileges to None." The volume opens with the platform of the Democratic party for 1902, and the resolutions adopted by the Democratic members of the House at their conference June 19, arraigning the Republican party for failure to give relief to Cuba and to enact proper anti-trust legislation. Then follows an extended criticism of the Republican campaign book, many of the statements contained therein being challenged as to accuracy, especially those dealing with the trust question.

Under the head of imperialism there is a long general review of the Philippine policy under the following heads: "Attempt to Divert the Issue," "Partisan Censorship," "War Department Investigation and That of the Senate Contrasted," "War Department Policy of Suppression," "Parliamentary Investigation," "A Court-Martial Shopped Because It Would Prove Too Much," "Court-Martial Trial a Farce," "Cruelty Committed and Encouraged," "Crimes of War and Not of Soldiers," "American Expansion Versus Protected Imperialism," "Colonialism and Trade," "Statistics Against Colonialism," "Keep American Appeal at Home," "The Burdens of Militarism," "Philippine Venture the Beginning of a General Policy of Colonialism," "Our Warlike President," "Philippines a Source of Weakness," "Shall We Spend People's Taxes at Home or in Distant Lands?" "A Government for Carpet-Baggers and Spoils," "Statehood for the Philippines."

This review is succeeded by chapters on "General Miles and the Army," "Disgraceful Record of the Military Authorities at Both Ends of the Lines in the Garden Case," "The Smith Court-Martial," "Torture as a Policy," "Review of Evidence Involving the War Department and Certain Army Officers in the Philippines in Violation of the Laws of War," "The System, Not the Individual, to Blame," "Fundamental Objection to the Philippines," "Account of Slavery and Polygamy Under the Protection of the Flag and Vice and Loathsome Diseases in the Philippines."

The chapter on the tariff and trusts is crowded with statistics and figures, most of it being devoted to an attempt to show that protected trusts and manufacturers get the benefit of all the tariff in our markets and sell in foreign markets at greatly reduced prices. Facsimiles of export price lists are given and comparisons are made with domestic prices of like articles. A number of big trusts are discussed in detail to show that they sell their products abroad much cheaper than at home, and the whole question is summarized in a chapter on the "Evils of Protected Trade," which is subdivided as follows: First—"Political Corruption," second—"Watered Stock," third—"Concealment of Export Prices," fourth—"That the Manufacturers Juggled Statistics."

The records of the two parties on the trust question are contrasted. Reciprocity generally is denounced as a "humbug."

The Split in Delaware.

DOVER, Del., Sept. 2.—The Union Republican state convention today nominated Michael Byrnes for Congress. J. Edward Addicks sat in the convention as a delegate. The regular Republican convention, made up of delegates opposed to the nomination of Congressman L. H. Ball, and the action of today's convention insures the presence of two sets of Republican candidates.

The convention nominated Martin B. Barre for Treasurer and Purnell B. Norman for Auditor, both of whom are nominees of the regular Republicans. The platform indorses the National Administration.

Wisconsin Democratic Convention. MILWAUKEE, Wis., Sept. 2.—Democrats of Wisconsin will meet here tomorrow for the purpose of holding a state convention to place in nomination a complete state ticket to be voted upon next November. Every indication points to the nomination for Governor of David S. Rose, the present Mayor of Milwaukee. A prominent leader said today that the platform would be almost wholly a state document.

ASSESSED \$40,000.

Mr. Roosevelt's Real Estate in Oyster Bay Valued at \$30,000.

OYSTER BAY, L. I., Sept. 1.—Now that the Assessors of this town have finished their work, it is learned that they have valued the real property of Theodore Roosevelt, President of the United States, in this town at \$30,000. There is a personal assessment of \$10,000 also charged against the President on the town tax roll. As to other members of the Roosevelt family who reside and own property here, Mr. J. West Roosevelt is assessed \$10,000 real, and Emily Roosevelt is assessed \$30,000 on the same basis. Some of the President's neighbors figure on the tax roll for large amounts.

A Sioux City Shot.

Sioux City Journal. Because President Roosevelt said, "A good soldier must not only be willing to fight; he must be anxious to fight," Colonel Bryan has thrown a fit. He accuses the President of "inherent barbarism" and "moral deformity," to say nothing of having been carried away by the "blood-and-brutal gospel of imperialism." What ever may be the fact as to the President and the soldier, it is quite apparent that Mr. Bryan believes that a talker ought not only be willing to talk; he must be anxious to talk. Now that Bryan has said this in his mind Mr. Roosevelt is such a bloodthirsty monster maybe the Commander man would like to do a little detective work in connection with that skeleton recently unearthed in the cellar of the White House.

Arkansas Election Returns.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Sept. 2.—Partial returns indicate the election of the Democratic state ticket by majorities ranging from 5,000 to 45,000. A light vote was polled throughout the state on account of a heavy rain.

Governor Davis carried the home ward of Chairman H. L. Remmett, of the Republican state central committee, at Newport, it going Democratic for the first time in 12 years.

The following Democratic Congressmen were elected over their Republican opponents: First District—B. B. Mason, Second—H. S. Brundage; Third—Hugh A. Dinsmore; Fourth—J. S. Little; Fifth—C. R. Reid; Sixth—J. T. Robinson; Seventh—R. M. Wallace.

The Western Trip.

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 2.—Mayor Reed has received a message from Secretary Cortelyou, announcing that President Roosevelt will spend four hours in Kansas City September 22. The President will not make a speech or hold a public reception here, but he will be given over the city sightseeing.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Sept. 2.—President Roosevelt has accepted an invitation to visit St. Joseph on his Western trip.

TRUST EVIL REMEDY

better that some people should prosper too much than that no one should prosper at all. So that the man who advocates destroying the trusts by measures that would paralyze the industries of the country is at best a quack, and at worst an enemy to the Republic."

Referring to the conditions which existed in 1893, the President said: "There was no trouble about anybody making too much money then. The trusts were down, but the trouble was that we were all of us down. Nothing but harm to the whole body politic can come from ignorant agitation, carried on partially against real evils, partially against imaginary evils. These men, if they should succeed, could do nothing to bring about a solution of the great problems with which we are concerned. If they should destroy certain of the evils at the cost of overthrowing the well-being of the entire country, it would mean merely that there would come a reaction in which they and their remedies would be hopelessly discarded."

"It does not do anybody any good, and it will do most of us a great deal of harm, to take steps which will check any proper growth in a corporation. We wish not to penalize, but to reward, great captains of industry or the men who together in a corporation have the business forethought and energy to build up a great industrial enterprise. Keep that in mind. A big corporation may be doing excellent work for the whole country, and we want above all things, when striving to get a plan which will prevent wrongdoing by a corporation which desires to do wrong, not at the same time to have a scheme which will interfere with a corporation doing well, if that corporation is handling itself honestly and squarely. Now, when I am saying ought to be treated as simple elementary truths. The only reason it is necessary to say them at all is that apparently some people forget them."

"I believe something can be done by National legislation. When I state that, I ask you to note my words. I say I believe. It is not in my power to say I know. When I talk to you of my own executive duties, I can tell you definitely what will and what will not be done. When I speak of the actions of any one else, I can only say that I believe something more can be done by National legislation. I believe it will be done. I think we can get laws which will measurably increase the power of the Federal Government, and I believe firmly that in the same time I have to be an amendment to the Constitution of the Nation conferring additional power upon the Federal Government to deal with corporations. To get that will be a matter of difficulty and a matter of time."

"I want you to think of what I have said, because it represents all of the sincerity and earnestness that I have, and I say to you here from this platform, nothing that I have not already stated, and nothing that I would not say at a private table, with any of the biggest corporation managers of the land."

IN THE CAMP OF THE ANTS.

Talks at Springfield on the Philippines and the Army.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Sept. 2.—President Roosevelt was greeted by more than 200 people in Springfield. The Presidential party arrived at 5 P. M., and the party

was driven to the United States Army. The President was keenly interested in the new model Springfield rifle. He carefully examined every detail of the mechanism. Colonel Phipps assured him, in answer to a question, that the model will shoot much more accurately than the old Springfield rifle, and somewhat better than the Krag.

The President was met by a large group of people, and he was driven to Court Square, where about 25,000 people were gathered. Directly in front of the grandstand stood three companies of the Second Massachusetts Regiment, which camped beside the Rough Riders at Santiago. To these the President spoke directly many times. He dwelt particularly on the duty of American citizens to respect soldiers fighting the war of a tropical jungle, and subject to many temptations, taking his subject because Springfield is the home of some of the well-known critics of the Philippine campaign. The President said, in part:

"I thank you from my heart for your greeting, and I know you will not grudge my saying that of all of those present I feel the least pleasure in having here my comrades, the men of your Massachusetts regiment behind and beside whom I served at Santiago. (Applause.)"

"Ladies and gentlemen, the men who went to Cuba were your brothers, sons, kindred and neighbors. The men who served in the Philippines in the uniform of the American Army have been again your brothers, sons and neighbors. Last night I spent at Northfield, and we have Massachusetts now because we were not afraid to expand them, and we are not afraid to expand now. (Loud applause.)"

"Our destiny unexpectedly took us to the Philippines. I do not suppose any of you, when you I, my comrades, were down in Cuba, thought of the Philippines, and did not know much there. I did not. When we got there we found that we had a job to do, and we did it. (Applause.) Now, when I am saying ought to be treated as simple elementary truths. "Our soldiers in the Philippines have been attacked by some occasionally one of them did something wrong. Wherever it has been possible to find them out, the offenders have been punished, and I ask you, when they blame overmuch Uncle Sam's boys in blue fighting for their lives against a treacherous foe in the heart-breaking work of jungle warfare, if our critics remember, in speaking of the occasional shortcomings of the men who did wrong under the stress of such terrible temptation, that we are not altogether immaculate at home. (Applause.)"

"I would be sorry to have any one of our men, even the best of them, Spring of field, judged by the record of its political course. If you paid attention purely to that, you could make it a pretty bad showing for any city in the land. Occasionally soldiers in the Philippines did wrong, but on the whole the men who for three years in those islands have followed the flag of the United States have added a new page to the honor-roll of the Nation."

Afterwards President Roosevelt addressed the Grand Army Veterans at their headquarters, speaking from his carriage. He left for Dalton a few minutes after 6 o'clock.

Worcester, Mass., Sept. 2.—The following itinerary of President Roosevelt on his trip to Tennessee and North Carolina was given out today: The President will leave Oyster Bay the morning of September 5 for Washington, from which point his special train will leave over the Baltimore & Ohio at 7:30 P. M. for Wheeling, W. Va., which will be reached the morning of the 6th. A two hours' stop will be made. The President will arrive at Chattanooga at 8:30 the morning of the 7th, and will spend the day looking over the battle-field of Chickamauga. Monday, the 8th, he will address the convention of locomotive firemen at Chattanooga, leaving at 1 P. M. for Knoxville, which point will be reached at 5 P. M. At 7 o'clock he will leave for Asheville, arriving there at 8:30 the morning of the 9th. At 12:30 he will leave for Oyster Bay, arriving there the night of the 10th.
