The Senttle Papers Think That a Leaf Will Be Turned in at the Finish.

The Scattle papers think that a leaf will be turned in the "dope book" yet, and that their team will land on the top at the finish. They are of the opinion that the team has been badly crippled up on its re-cent trip, and therefore account for the way in which it has shot the chutes down the percentage list. It certainly is a cause for tears to see a team that seemed to have a mortgage on the pennant lose enough of its games to get an insecure hold even on the second place.
