

WILLIAMS IS HISSED

Silver Man Is Turned Down in Massachusetts.

IS REPUDIATED AS A LEADER

Democratic Convention Refuses to Indorse the Kansas City Platform, and Places Leader of Opposition at Head of the Ticket.

BOSTON, Sept. 17.—Acrimony was not wanting for a time in the Democratic State Convention in Tremont Temple today, but in the end harmony was restored, and the ticket was enthusiastically greeted. The ticket was:

Governor—William A. Gaston, of Boston.
Lieutenant-Governor—John C. Crosby, of Pittsfield.
Secretary of State—William B. Stone, of Springfield.
Treasurer—Thomas C. Thatcher, of Yarmouth.Auditor—J. L. Chaffoux, of Lowell.
Attorney-General—John J. Flaherty, of Gloucester.

It might be said that in naming Colonel Gaston to head the ticket precedent was shattered, inasmuch as he was nominated and then given a platform of his own dictation. Not unlike the famous convention of 1896 and 1900, the fight was over the National issues in the platform. The test of strength was enthusiastically met by the party. The platform adopted, on the one hand, and George Fred Williams, the stalwart leader of the Silver Democrats, on the other. In this battle, Mr. Williams was utterly routed, with the result that he is short of all power of leadership. The platform adopted is a repudiation of the Kansas City platform, for Mr. Gaston refused to be the nominee in any way, the declaration of principles could be construed to indorse those things most prominently advocated by the party in the last two campaigns. Mr. Williams was chairman of the committee on resolutions, and proposed planks in which the National questions of trusts, monopolies and corporations were dealt with in strong language. Mr. Quincy wrote a platform which was acceptable to Mr. Gaston, whose political strength was estimated righteously, as it proved, at four to one over Charles H. Hamilton, the other candidate for the nomination. In the committee, last night, Mr. Quincy's platform was accepted by a majority vote of 14 to 7, which was repeated before the convention opened. Mr. Williams prepared a minority report.

Williams Hissed Down.

The convention opened with trouble brewing. It came soon after Mr. Gaston's nomination, when the matter of platform was brought up. The battle from the floor was one of bitter words, during which the delegates objecting to Mr. Williams' platform, and the certain planks in the platform, which he said were placed there at Mr. Gaston's solicitation, hissed and cried him down. Throughout the tumult, the speaker indignantly surveyed the throng, and when order was restored, concluded his speech, to be hissed again as he sat down. The minority report was utterly defeated, and the majority report was adopted by an overwhelming vote. The ticket, as given heretofore, was then completed. Immediately Mr. Hamilton, taking the platform, asked that Mr. Gaston's nomination be made unanimous, which was done, amid cheers.

ALABAMA REPUBLICANS.

Roosevelt is Indorsed for Renomination by a Large Majority.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Sept. 17.—The Republican state convention today indorsed President Roosevelt for renomination in 1904 by a large majority. The new state constitution was adopted, but all responsibility for its enactment disclaimed. The following ticket was nominated: Governor—J. A. W. Smith, Birmingham.
Lieutenant-Governor—James P. Lane, Huntsville.
Attorney-General—W. H. Fimbrecht, Mobile.
Secretary of State—H. J. Carter, Cullman.
Auditor—T. B. McNair, Marshall County.
Treasurer—H. Lee Brown, Conecuh County.
Superintendent of Education—J. C. Gonville, Crenshaw County.
Commissioner of Agriculture—T. H. Morton, Fayette.

The platform reaffirms the Philadelphia platform, favors "the organization of labor for its legitimate protection, and the enactment of laws for the peaceful settlement of differences between organized capital and labor, favors child-law legislation relating to work in cotton mills, condemns the spirit which seeks to arouse prejudice of the people against railroads, and advocates the enactment of laws so regulating the railroads as adequately to protect the interests of the people, but is opposed to any drastic measures."

The platform then indorses the wisdom of the Dingley tariff law and urges a continuance of that policy. Republican legislation to build an inter-oceanic canal is approved. The "graveyard and hospital" of our soldiers and sailors in the Philippines are applauded, and the attacks of the Democratic party upon them are condemned. A high tribute is paid to the late President McKinley.

The platform then expressed confidence in the administration of President Roosevelt, and says:

"We express our faith in his thoroughly American and patriotic ideas, and we believe that his leadership established confidence both in the success of the Republican principles and the continued prosperity and progress of the country, and we therefore favor his renomination to the great office he fills with patriotism and ability."

After the reading of the platform, J. A. W. Smith, of Birmingham, offered a substitute, the same as the original report, except that it omitted all reference to the indorsement of President Roosevelt for a renomination. The substitute was vigorously debated, and the convention was thrown into turmoil. Some of the speakers upheld the substitute, declaring that it was too early to speak out on the campaign of 1904, while others charged that an effort was being made to knife a Republican President. Finally the roll was called and the substitute was defeated by a large majority.

NEW HAMPSHIRE REPUBLICANS.

Roosevelt's Renomination is Favored and Trusts Condemned.

CONCORD, N. H., Sept. 17.—Following the action of the party in Vermont, the Republicans of New Hampshire today warmly debated the question of making changes in the prohibitory law. Those in favor of a change carried the day. The contest for Governor was won by N. H. Batchelder, of Andover, who is prominently identified with the Patrons of Husbandry. Stephen H. Gale, of Exeter, withdrew before the nominations were called for, and Mr. Batchelder was chosen by acclamation. No other candidates are to be nominated by state conventions in New Hampshire. The platform adopted indorses the Administration on all points, and favors

vices the renomination of President Roosevelt. Illegal combinations are condemned, and one plank opposes the indiscriminate destruction of forests.

REPUBLICANS OF CONNECTICUT.

General Revision of Tariff Is Opposed—Roosevelt Is Indorsed.

HARTFORD, Conn., Sept. 17.—Abram Chamberlain, of Meriden, the present State Controller, was today nominated for Governor by the Connecticut Republican Convention, to succeed Governor George P. McLean, who, on account of ill health, declined to be a candidate for another term. Mr. Chamberlain was opposed for the nomination by Livingston W. Cleveland, of New Haven, who, however, was defeated on the first ballot, receiving only 18 votes, while Mr. Chamberlain had 82. Other nominations were as follows: Lieutenant-Governor—Henry Roberts, of Hartford.
Secretary of State—Charles G. Vinal, of Middletown.
Treasurer—Henry H. Gallup, of Norwich.
Controller—W. E. Seelye, of Bridgeport.
Attorney-General—W. A. King, of Wyndham.
Congressman-at-Large—George L. Lillie, of Waterbury.

The platform adopted says: "We heartily approve and applaud President Roosevelt's vigilant care of the country's interest, domestic and foreign. We share his pride in the magnificent work of the American soldier and sailor, and the American administration in the country's new dependencies, and his sentiment against their unpatriotic traducers, and we favor his nomination for the Presidency by the National Republican Convention."

"We believe with Lincoln, Garfield, Blaine, McKinley and Roosevelt in a protective tariff that wisely fosters American industries and safeguards American wages. We oppose a general revision of the tariff at this time, as both inopportune and unconstitutional. If in any schedule import duties are found that have been notoriously perverted from their true purpose to the inordinate enrichment of corporations, monopolistic in fact or in tendency, we look to a Republican Congress to apply, in its wisdom, the needed corrective without impairing the people of the protection."

"We believe with William McKinley and Theodore Roosevelt in the policy of trade reciprocity as the natural supplement of tariff protection, and the key with which to unlock the world's markets for the surplus products of American fields and American mills. Especially we commend the President's efforts to perform a public duty and obtain for this country a lucrative commerce by arranging a judicious reciprocity treaty with Cuba."

"We believe that great aggregations of capital, commonly called trusts, while necessary for the economic conduct of large business and commercial enterprises, should be subjected to such supervision, state or National, as will safeguard public and private interests."

People's Party Nominations.

TOPEKA, Kan., Sept. 17.—Nearly all the nominations of the allied People's Party ticket, made by the initiative and referendum, are now in, but not all those chosen have signified their willingness to serve if elected. Following are the nominations:

Arizona Republicans Nominate.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Sept. 17.—The Republican territorial convention today nominated for Delegate to Congress Robert E. Morrison, of Prescott, ex-United States District Attorney. The only other name presented was that of W. F. Nichols, of Wilcox, Territorial Auditor. But one ballot was taken, the result being 75 to 25.

Colliery Is Burned.

Blase in Scranton Strike District Believed to Be Work of Incendiary.

SCRANTON, Pa., Sept. 13.—The Taylor company washery, in North Scranton, was destroyed by fire, which started at 12:30 o'clock this morning. It is alleged to be of incendiary origin. The washery man declared that he chased four provokers from the premises just before he discovered the fire. The washery has been in operation for a month. This is the third Scranton washery to be destroyed by fire since the strike began.

Rockefeller's Home Burned.

Crossed Electric Wires Causes Loss of \$40,000.

TARRYTOWN, N. Y., Sept. 17.—The residence of John D. Rockefeller at Poonatipo Hills, Westchester County, was destroyed by fire today. The fire is supposed to have started from crossed electric wires. The loss is estimated at \$40,000.

China Soon to Get Railway Again.

LONDON, Sept. 17.—A dispatch to a news agency from Peking says the restoration to the Chinese of the southern Province of Manchuria and the Sui Chwang Railway will occur October 8.

AMERICAN MARINES LAND

TRANSIT ACROSS ISTHMUS OF PANAMA IS TO BE PRESERVED.

Guards Will Be Placed on All Trains Today, and No Trouble Is Expected From Revolutionists.

COLON, Colombia, Sept. 17.—Commander Potter, of the United States cruiser Ranger, will tomorrow morning place guards on the trains running across the isthmus.

As a further move toward preserving transit, the United States ship Cincinnati landed 50 marines today, and also sent ashore a small rapid-fire gun, which was placed on a railroad track, protected by iron plates. A small detachment of insurgent forces was seen near Mindi station early today. The government troops attacked the enemy immediately and drove them back. A colored woman who was in the vicinity of the scene of the skirmish was killed. It is not thought probable that the revolutionists will attempt to interrupt transit on the railroad.

General Salazar, commandant of the government forces on the isthmus, and Acting United States Consul Ehrmann will confer tomorrow. The General was informed that the measure of placing guards on the trains could not be considered as an act of hostility to Colombia, but that it was only taken under the necessity of insuring uninterrupted traffic over the railroad.

Governor Salazar has just received a telegram from Colon, announcing the arrival there of the first 1000 men of General Perdomo's army.

Steamer Brings Reinforcements.

COLON, Colombia, Sept. 17.—The report which reached here this morning of a skirmish between insurgents and government forces near Mindi station, is now learned to have been magnified. No skirmish actually occurred, but government soldiers fired a few shots upon sighting insurgent spies moving between Mindi and Monkey Hill. Monkey Hill is about one mile from Colon. The British steamer La Plata has just arrived here from Sevilla. She brings about 1200 troops. Further reinforcements are expected to reach the isthmus shortly.

CASTRO FORCED TO RETREAT.

Revolutionists Now Have Venezuela in Critical Position.

WILLEMSTAD, Island of Curacao, Sept. 17.—President Castro, of Venezuela, has retreated from Guayana before the advance of the revolutionists. The Venezuelan Government's situation is critical. Recent advices received from Venezuela confirm the dispatches of the Associated Press from Guayana of Friday, September 12. The battle which, as then announced, began September 11, in the vicinity of Tinasquillo, Venezuela, between about 4000 revolutionists, under the command of General Mendosa, Batalla and Rivera, and government forces of about the same strength, led by the Venezuelan Minister of War, General Garrido, resulted in the defeat of the government forces, and not in a victory for the latter, as announced in a dispatch from Torres Cardenas, secretary to President Castro, which set forth that General Mendosa's army had been annihilated September 8 near Tinasquillo. The engagement of that

date was only an advance-guard fight of no importance.

The real battle began September 11 and lasted four days, after which General Garrido retreated toward Valencia, and eventually entered that city September 13, with about 2000 men, leaving the road free for the further advance on Caracas for the revolutionary army. The only other government army in the field is the one which is under the personal command of President Castro.

From all points are reported desertions of government soldiers to the ranks of the revolutionists, and the general impression in Venezuela is that the last important incident of the revolution is approaching.

People Make Glad Over Treaty.

SANTIAGO, Chile, Sept. 17.—The Argentine Commission bringing the protocols of the treaties providing for arbitration between Argentina and Chile, and the limitation of the armaments of the two countries, arrived here from Valparaiso today and was accorded a cordial reception. The protocols will be exchanged September 22. National festivities in honor of the understanding arrived at will now commence. There is great enthusiasm here, and the streets are thronged with joyous people.

Fifty Thousand Boxers Surround City.

LONDON, Sept. 18.—Cabling from Shanghai, under date of September 17, the correspondent of the Daily Mail says that 50,000 Boxers are now surrounding the city, but that their attempts to take the city have so far failed. Without immediate help, however, Cheng Tufu must fall.

CAMPAIGN IN PORTO RICO

The Fight Will Soon Be on in Earnest—Federals in Majority.

SAN JUAN, P. R., Sept. 16.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—On November 4 there will be held an election covering the entire island, at which time a resident commissioner to the United States, five delegates each from each Legislative district, a Mayor for each Municipal district, one Municipal Judge, three school trustees and members of the Council will be chosen. In San Juan two Municipal Judges and two substitutes will be voted for.

While the campaign has not fully opened, today in Porto Rico there are strictly speaking two parties—the Republican party now in power, and the American Federation. Another party has sprung up in the past few weeks

which styles itself Unionists. Its platform is utopian to such an extent that it is not being considered seriously by the other two. Two years ago the Federalists cast no vote at all, finding that it would be useless to go to the polls, as the Republicans would count them out. The Federalists are going to the polls this year and are going to see that their votes are counted as cast. In this determination they have the indorsement of the Governor who has declared that a fair election must be held, whatever the result.

It is difficult to forecast the result at this time, as nominations have not been made, but that the Federalists will carry a number of districts and make a very good showing in the House of Delegates is conceded.

Appeals to the Vatican.

ROME, Sept. 17.—Monsignore Enriquez Peres, procurator of the Spanish Recollecte Fathers in Rome, has presented a voluminous report to the Vatican, contending his order in the Philippines is the victim of much injustice and libel, and claiming its right to remain there and be protected by the Government.
