

SEEK SEATTLE MAN

New York Police Charge Him With Murder.

WOMAN LURED TO HER DEATH

Hooper Young Alleged to Have Killed Mrs. Pultizer in His Flat, Put Her Body in Trunk, and Then Deposited It in Canal.

Hooper Young, an ex-Seattle newspaper man, is charged with the murder of a woman, which is the sensation of New York just now. The police are positive the woman accompanied Young to his room, only to be murdered, her body put in a trunk and later deposited in the Morris Canal. Young is now missing. His father is said to be John W. Young, of Seattle, who is believed to be a son of Brigham Young.

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—The mystery of the murder of Mrs. Annie Pultizer, whose nude body was found in the Morris Canal, near Jersey City, has been cleared up by the discovery that the woman was killed in a flat at 10 West Fifty-eighth street, where her clothing was found. This announcement was made late tonight by Captain Titus, of the detective bureau, who connects the murder with the case of a man named Hooper Young, who has recently been employed in a cheap restaurant.

Titus has learned that the woman's body was kept for some time in the trunk in the kitchen of the flat in which she was killed. Young has not been arrested, and is believed to have fled from the city. He is said to have shipped the trunk to Chicago last night. He formerly worked for the Hoboken Crusader, and the police found his picture taken with a group of employees. This picture was shown to the Hoboken liveryman who once picked out Young as the man who hired a buggy from him on Wednesday night.

The apartment in which the murdered woman's clothing was found, a cheap tenement in a block containing many stables, but within a stone's throw of some of the most splendid apartment-houses in the vicinity of Central Park, South. All day long detectives followed clues. They asserted confidently that they were on the trail of the murderer, and developments tonight proved the correctness of their theory. The first important evidence developed early. It was the identification of the hitching strap and the weight used as a sinker for the body by a livery keeper in Hoboken. These, he said, were placed in a buggy on the request of a man who hired the vehicle from him Wednesday night, and whose photograph he has identified. The horse and buggy were returned the following morning by the same man.

The murdered woman's husband says he saw her last Tuesday night, when she left her apartment for the purpose of purchasing some rolls and fruit. She did not return, and the theory is that she met her murderer, went with him to his apartment, and that then, as the result of a quarrel, he killed her. The theory is supported by facts now known concerning the woman's life. It has developed that this life was not a good one—a fact not denied by her husband. It is now reasonably certain that the murderer kept the body in his room until Wednesday night, when he hired the horse and buggy in Hoboken, and, returning to New York, drove to the Morris Canal, where he threw the body into the water. The keeper of the bridge over which he must have driven to reach the canal saw a buggy answering the description of that hired by the stable boy in Hoboken crossing the bridge between 11 and 12 o'clock on Wednesday night. He could only get a glimpse of the driver, but he says a trunk was tied on behind the vehicle.

Details of the Murder.

Late tonight the police gave out the story of the murder and the history of Young. Detectives traced him to the flat on West Fifty-eighth street, where a young man was found who had been asked by Young to help carry a trunk out of the house on Wednesday evening. The Hoboken police had already heard of the murder woman's connection with Young, whose description they had given by Pultizer of a man who, his wife had told him, had accosted her on Tuesday evening and had asked her to go to his flat on Fifty-eighth street. It is believed that the woman afterward met Young and accompanied him to the flat.

Young's father, the police say, is John W. Young, a promoter, who is now in France. Neighbors say he has lived there with his daughter, Mary Young, until last Spring, when both went away, leaving the flat furnished. They say that Young, Jr., was first seen in the flat about a week ago. He slept there each night. The Young flat is one of seven rooms and bath, and is handsomely furnished. The bedroom next to the dining-room is the one in which it is believed the murder was committed. It is a very small room. Young was seen about 9 o'clock on Wednesday evening, when he appeared in the street in front of the house and carried Alfred Dabney, a lad about 16 years of age, to go into the house and help him carry out a trunk. The boy says he assisted and helped Young carry down a heavy trunk, which Young said was full of books. In front of the house was a horse attached to a light buggy, in which the trunk was placed. Young got in, according to Dabney, and drove rapidly down Sixth avenue.

Young Again Moves the Trunk.

The police say they have learned that on Thursday morning Young returned to the house about 7 o'clock, and that he was seen carrying the same trunk. This time he had the trunk on his shoulder and was carrying it up the stairs into the flat. In the evening between 8 and 9 o'clock Young, it is said, took the same trunk from the house to the office of the Wells-Fargo Express Company, in Sixth avenue, near Fifty-ninth street. There he asked that it be shipped to Philadelphia. He was told that the company did not ship to that point, the police say, and he then said it would go just as well if shipped to Chicago. The trunk was accepted and shipped to that point. The Chicago police have been notified and will watch for its appearance.

After they had gathered all this information the police searched the room leading to the flat, which they found in great confusion. There was every evidence of a struggle on the part of the occupants. In the small bedroom they found a single bed, the sheet of which was spotted with blood, and other stains were found on a cupboard. Among a number of bottles stood a tiny half filled with hydrate of chloral. In the room were found one or two articles of woman's clothing, but they bore no stains. A stock such as a woman wears was later identified by Pultizer as having been worn by his wife on Tuesday night when she was out. In the bathroom were found two vials and a man's nightshirt, still wet, and appeared to have been used to wipe up blood stains and then to have been hastily washed. There was also found an old leather valise, in which were scores of letters, all from young women, and addressed to Young.

"Knock-Out Drops" Used.

Cornet Shooter, who examined the flat, gave it as his theory that the woman

had been murdered by "knock-out drops" in the form of hydrate of chloral, and that the murderer then tried to dismember the body so as to more easily place it in the trunk, but that he had apparently desisted and placed it temporarily in the bottom of the cupboard. Later he placed the body in the trunk.

While in Hoboken, Hooper Young was connected with a paper called the Crusader as business manager. The Crusader ceased publication in June, and Young then moved away. He said he came from Seattle, and that he had run a paper in the West, but whether at Seattle is not known. He is about 35 years of age, about 5 feet 7 to 8 inches in height, dark hair and pale, rather sallow complexion. His hair is dark, and he has heavy eyebrows, standing out prominently. His father is reported to be a man of wealth. He is said to have been concerned in promoting a shipbuilding trust and to be connected with the Equitable Building Association. He is believed to be a son of Brigham Young, the famous Mormon leader, and to come from Seattle.

Nothing is known at present as to the whereabouts of the young man suspected of the murder.

MONEY TO PROSECUTE BOODLERS.

Mayor of St. Louis Asks Assembly to Approve \$15,000.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 19.—Pending the proceedings at Jefferson City brought before the Supreme Court to secure the inquiry on writs of habeas corpus of ex-members of the House of Delegates indicted on charges of bribery and perjury, the grand jury today announced its inquiry into boodle matters until Monday. Circuit Attorney Folk went to Jefferson City tonight to appear before the Supreme Court in behalf of the Sheriff and Jelfer, who were cited in connection with the application for a writ to show cause why the prisoners mentioned should not be released from custody.

At the request of the Circuit Attorney, Mayor Wells tonight sent a special message to each house of the Municipal Assembly, asking for an appropriation of \$15,000 for the contingent fund to be used by Mr. Folk in carrying out the investigation of alleged bribery charges against the members of that body. In his letter to the Mayor, Circuit Attorney Folk said it was not expected that the members of the lower house who have been implicated in or expected to be indicted for participation in the alleged bribery deals would vote for its passage, but it would give them an opportunity to record and show whether it will be necessary for the Circuit Attorney's office to depend upon private subscriptions to carry on the investigation and prosecution. Several members of the present House of Delegates now rest under indictments charging bribery and perjury in connection with the passage of certain street railway and city lighting bills.

Governor Bland today authorized the issuance of rewards aggregating \$1500 for the arrest of certain indicted members of this and past houses who have not yet been arrested.

Stay of Execution for Murderer.

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 19.—Judge Morse, acting on the petition of Attorney Stewart, counsel for Peter Mortensen, the condemned murderer of James E. Hay, secretary of the Pacific Lumber Company, today signed an order for probable cause for appeal to the Supreme Court. This will act as a stay of execution, and as the case will be brought before the Supreme Court until some time in January, the date of Mortensen's execution, fixed for October 11, will therefore be indefinitely postponed.

Enraged Farmer Shoots Hunters.

BRANDON, Manitoba, Sept. 19.—Thomas Law, of the milling firm of Alexander Law Bros., and Miss Sherwin, a social favorite, and two prize chickens on the farm of L. Rowe, 12 miles from Brandon, this morning shot and killed two hunters. This enraged farmer shot and killed the hunters, shooting Miss Sherwin in the stomach and Law in the knee. Rowe kept the hunters from the contents of a bottle of poison, dying in a few minutes. Miss Sherwin is not likely to recover.

Indian Hanged for Murder.

STURGIS, S. D., Sept. 19.—Ernest Lovewell, a half-breed Indian, was hanged today for the murder of George Puck and George Ostrander, at the Puck ranch, on White Owl Creek, in June last. Lovewell was frequently charged with satisfaction over the result of his trial and has never shown remorse.

Prisoner Curses Sentencing Judge.

WICHITA, Kan., Sept. 19.—Tom Duffender, convicted burglar, was this morning sentenced to the Penitentiary for 10 years. He turned to the Judge and said: "May the curse of God rest upon you, you baldheaded tyrant."

Indicted For Killing Texas Ranger.

BROWNVILLE, Tex., Sept. 19.—The grand jury of Cameron County has returned two indictments each against six Mexicans charged with ambushing Texas Rangers last week, and killing Ranger Roebuck.

ESCAPES ON WAY TO GALLOWES.

Prisoner Puts Up a Hard Fight in Jail, but is Soon Overpowered.

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—Peter Herliha was hanged in the County Jail at Hackensack, N. J., today, for the murder of Barney Kanter, a butcher. Before his execution was accomplished Herliha made a desperate fight. When two Deputy sheriffs approached him to strap his arms, he suddenly tore off two brass brackets on the side of his cell, and, getting into the corridor, leaped over a partition. He then tore off a piece of lead pipe, and, crouching in a corner, shouted that he would brain any one that came near him.

By this time the jail was in an uproar. The Sheriff and his deputies were at first puzzled as to how to deal with the murderer and disarm him. It was finally decided to turn a hose on him. This was done, and as Herliha put up his hands to ward off the water from striking him in the face a Deputy Sheriff leaped forward and grabbed the hand of the murderer in which was the lead pipe. Other deputies quickly rushed in. Herliha was finally overpowered and securely strapped. He was then placed in a chair and carried to the gallows. He was lifted from the chair and the noose quickly adjusted. He had anything to say. He replied in a weak voice:

"Good-bye, all. Excuse me."

The drop was then sprung, and Herliha died a criminal. The condemned man during the night asked frequently for whiskey, and when refused he snatched a chair in his cell, and two priests who were with him had difficulty in quieting him.

Wife Murderer Hanged.

CAMDEN, N. J., Sept. 19.—Lafayette Gruff, of Gloucester, was hanged here today for the murder of his wife, Mary Ann Gruff. The crime was committed March 11, at the home of Gruff's aunt, Mrs. Susan Gowie, at Westmont, near here.

Policeman's Murder Averted.

BALTIMORE, Sept. 19.—John Wesley Devine, colored, was hanged here today for the murder of Patrolman Charles J. Donahue, last June. Devine was married three weeks ago, in the jail, to a woman with whom he had been living and who was the direct cause of the murder.

Reading of Stratton's Will Put Off.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Sept. 19.—It was announced today that the will of the late W. S. Stratton would not be read and filed for probate until 9 o'clock tomorrow morning. The presence of a second and later will is talked of, but is doubted, else it would have been filed for probate before this time.

QUEEN OF BELGIANS DEAD

MARIE HENRIETTE PASSES AWAY WHILE AT DINNER.

None of the Members of Her Family Was Present—Death From Attack of Syncope.

SPA, Belgium, Sept. 19.—Marie Henriette, Queen of the Belgians, died here suddenly tonight at 7:50. Neither her husband, members of her family, nor Her Majesty's doctor was present at the time of her death. She was seated at a table eating a light dinner when she was seized with an attack of syncope. Dr. Guillaume, who in the course of the day had remarked upon certain disquieting symptoms in the Queen's condition, was summoned, but Her Majesty was dead before he arrived. Two members of her suite were with the Queen during her last moments.

As soon as the news of the Queen's death became known a large crowd gathered outside the palace. The Queen's death was a great surprise, especially in view of the reassuring reports which were circulated this morning, and which made the announcement of this evening still more of a shock. At the Royal Opera House, where "Hamlet" was being played, the ghost was just about to make his entrance, when the manager of the theater read to the audience a telegram announcing the death of Her Majesty. The performance was discontinued. People crowded the city streets, where extra editions of the newspapers containing long obituary notices of the Queen were eagerly bought. La Reforme sums up the sorrowful life of Her Majesty as follows:

"The Queen Mother, Marie Henriette, who had been crowned in 1895, the death of her son, the Duke of Brabant, at the age of 10 years, caused her grief beyond measure. Later fresh alarms and keen sorrows wrung the mother's heart, when tragic events shattered the happiness of the Princess Stephanie, her daughter. The death of Prince Baldwin, son of the Count of Flanders, brother of King Leopold, was another cruel blow to Her Majesty, and the fire at Laeken Castle, in which a number of treasured relics were destroyed, brought her a further sorrow. The Queen sought, if not to forget, at least to lessen her sorrow by devoting all her energies to works of charity. Her attitude in the face of misfortune was always calm and resolute."

The demonstrations which had been arranged in honor of the visit to this city tomorrow of the Boer Generals Botha, De Wet and Delarey, have been postponed, and all the festivities planned for the occasion have been abandoned because of the death of the Queen.

BANK FRAUDULENT OF BIG SUM.

Shortage of Vienna Cashier Proves to Be \$1,500,000.

VIENNA, Sept. 19.—A further examination of the books of the Vienna Leader Bank shows that the embezzlement of Edmund Jellinek, an official of the cashier's department, who died yesterday, amounted to \$1,500,000. The frauds were effected by the manipulation of checks and by making false entries in the checkbook, somewhat similar to those in the Liverpool Bank case. It has been discovered, however, that Jellinek had \$250,000 in his credit with various Vienna firms, in addition to investments of upwards of \$500,000 in industrial enterprises.

Jellinek, later in the day, was reported to have committed suicide. Adolph Pollok, head of a firm of motor-car builders, in which Jellinek is said to have invested \$500,000, has been arrested on suspicion of complicity in the fugitive's frauds.

HUNGARY HONORS KOSSUTH.

Flags Are Flying and Services Are Being Held for the Hero.

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Sept. 19.—The centenary of the birth of Louis Kossuth

is being celebrated throughout Hungary. Here flags are flying and houses are decorated. A commemorative service in the Protestant Church was attended by two sons of the Hungarian patriot, the prime minister and members of the cabinet. All parts of the country and the Hanover veterans of 1848. At the conclusion of the service an immense crowd proceeded to the cemetery to attend the laying of the foundation stone of a mausoleum to be erected to the memory of the national hero.

General Teur, a companion of the Hungarian exile, was present at the laying of the foundation stone. The fund for the national memorial to Kossuth now amounts to \$250,000.

Steel Trust Bookkeeper in Trouble.

LONDON, Sept. 19.—L. Greig, a bookkeeper in the London office of the Carnegie Steel Company, was arraigned in police court today on the charge of forging checks amounting to \$500 purporting to have been signed by Colonel William Hunsicker, chairman of the Nickel Corporation. The prisoner was remanded. The prosecution stated that the exact amount of the forgeries was not known, but the prisoner admitted it was over \$40,000. Greig paid large business checks that ought to have been sent to the Royal Bank of Scotland, on which all checks are signed for Pittsburgh. Into the London Police Stock Bank, and withdrew the money from the latter by checks purporting to have been signed by Colonel Hunsicker.

American Ways Advocated.

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—In an editorial article today the Times warmly advocates the development of the vacation school system in the United Kingdom upon the lines already successfully followed in America, and elsewhere. The correspondent of the New York Times, in the midst of so much barren discussion upon education, from every point of view, except the good of the children, to find an educational movement so wholly admirable in itself and with such promise of genuine usefulness.

Situation at Cheng Tu Fu Improved.

PEKIN, Sept. 19.—The situation at Cheng Tu Fu, the capital of Szechuen Province, and the scene of the recent Boxer activity, has improved. British and French troops have been ordered to leave the city, and they are expected to return to their own boats with the French Consul there. An investigation made by the Consul Agent into the murder of the missionaries, Bruce and Lewis at Chenchow, Honan Province, August 15, by a mob, has disclosed the fact that military officials of Chenchow are culpable in the matter, because they refused to receive or protect the missionaries.

Opening of South African Claims.

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—Next Monday, a Johannesburg dispatch to the Times by way of London says, has been fixed for the granting of licenses to peg out claims in the Barberton and Pietersburg districts. The chief stretch of country to be claimed lies 100 miles from Pietersburg. The question of transportation is an important one. Nearly all the available animals and vehicles were purchased some time ago. It is feared trouble will occur and a special force of constabulary will be employed.

Kaiser Asks for Corbin's Opinion.

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—American Generals who attended the German maneuvers are not expected in London before October 1, cable the London correspondent of the Tribune. It is stated that the Kaiser has asked Lord Roberts and General Corbin to send him written reports of their opinions of the maneuvers. These reports will, of course, be of a strictly confidential character.

Britain Answers Ray's Note.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—So far only one answer to the State Department's identical note concerning the Roumanian Jews has come to hand. This was from Great Britain, and consisted of a brief acknowledgment, with a promise to look into the subject, which promise appears to have been kept by the prompt issue of an invitation by Great Britain to Germany to open negotiations on the subject.

Alexandra Arrives at Copenhagen.

COPENHAGEN, Sept. 19.—Queen Alexandra arrived here today from England on board the British royal yacht Victoria
