The first came at 9 o'clock in the morning from Johnson No. 2 colliery at Priceburg, where the strikers were holding up a coal train with obstructions on the track and thrests against the train hands. At 6 o'clock at night the crater emitted a huge efforescing cloud, which spread while rapidly ascending, changing from black to gray, and then to silver color, corruscating quickly and suddenly, until it appeared as if a red cauliflower had bloomed on its crest. This caused a glare over the city, but proved harmless. The cruption lasted about 15 minutes.


