

HARD BLOW TO JEWS

Roumania Will Prevent Immigration to America.

HAY NOTE PROMPTS THE STEP

Government Intends to Show a Considerate Spirit for United States by Keeping Its People at Home.

Roumania no longer talks of Yankee arrogance in appealing for better treatment of the Jews in that land, but has made the lot of the persecuted harder by refusing to issue emigration passports. Germany has decided not to join with the United States, and England in making a formal protest against Roumania. It is actuated by financial interests. France has just begun to give the subject serious consideration.

BERLIN, Sept. 25.—The Tageblatt today prints a letter from Bucharest, capital of Roumania, dated September 22, as follows:

"The Washington note came like a ray of sunshine from a storm cloud for the Jewish people, and especially the laboring classes, who conceived the hope that a favorable turn must result from the interference of mighty America. How naive these unhappy people are, eagerly reaching for any straw promising them rescue. But their jubilation has been of short duration.

"The only effect the American note has had so far is an order, according to the Roumanian newspapers, that no more emigration passports be issued without the usual tax of \$4. It is even reported that no emigration passports will be granted. The spirit of the government is: 'We are masters here.' Nevertheless, it is disposed to be polite and considerate toward the United States. It intends to show this by preventing emigration to the United States.

There was much talk here about the Yankee arrogance and the Roumanians laughed in their sleeves as long as the American note was without support, but the news that England had followed with a similar step caused vexation. If the Continental powers act jointly, it is possible that the Roumanian Jewish question may become acute. The government has had much experience in meeting protests in behalf of the Jews."

GERMANY WILL STAND ALOOF.

Will Not Join United States and England in Protest to Roumania.

BERLIN, Sept. 25.—Germany has decided not to associate herself in a formal manner with the American and British protests against Roumania's treatment of the Jews. The German government adopts this attitude, it is understood, independently of other Continental powers. No agreement has been reached in the matter among the Cabinets of the Continent. Germany considers that, as other paragraphs besides article 41 of the very precise Berlin treaty of 1878 have not been insisted upon, for example, Roumanian forts have not been razed to the ground, and Russia is allowing Batoum to remain as it was before the treaty, this is not the time to oblige Roumania to observe any particular provisions of the treaty. Besides, Germany, although sympathizing sincerely with the deplorable situation of the Jews in Roumania, feels unable to interfere in her internal questions. Germany is holding Roumanian securities, and an international storm over the policy to which Premier Sturges, of Roumania, is fully committed might cause her fall, and, as a result, the Roumanian cause would be weakened. Germany, however, is not the time to oblige Roumania to observe any particular provisions of the treaty. Besides, Germany, although sympathizing sincerely with the deplorable situation of the Jews in Roumania, feels unable to interfere in her internal questions. Germany is holding Roumanian securities, and an international storm over the policy to which Premier Sturges, of Roumania, is fully committed might cause her fall, and, as a result, the Roumanian cause would be weakened.

The representative of the Associated Press in Berlin is informed that Germany believes the moral strength of Roumania, and British positions, in connection with the very practical measure taken by great financial houses, will induce Roumania substantially to modify the rigors of the trade law. Germany may possibly supplement these influences by private representations made without taking part in collective action, should the other powers find a common basis upon which to act. In German official quarters, it is not believed to be the slightest possibility of such collective action being taken, Russia and Austria especially being determined not to move in the matter.

FRANCE IS BECOMING AROUSED.

Now Certain Will Support Movement to Put Pressure on Roumania.

PARIS, Sept. 25.—Secretary Hay's note to the powers on the subject of Roumania's treatment of Jews, of which slight notice was at first taken, under the impression that it would lead to nothing, is now attracting much attention. The French press and in official circles here it is practically certain that the French Government will support a movement among the powers to put pressure on Roumania in favor of better treatment of the Jews, and it is believed Germany will take similar attitude. While it is thought the United States will thus be successful in stirring the powers into seriously considering the matter, and that remonstrances may be addressed to Roumania, not much hope is expressed in practical and permanent effect within Roumania from such action. A semi-official agency has circulated the following announcement:

"The French Government has not yet replied to Secretary Hay's note. While it is impossible to forecast the French decision, the impression in diplomatic circles is that, while recognizing the high motive which actuated Mr. Hay, M. Delcasse will not entirely agree with the views advanced in the American note."

ROUMANIA TO SEE OTHERS.

Austria Will Be Consulted With About the Hay Note.

LONDON, Sept. 25.—The Vienna correspondent of the Daily Mail says the Roumanian Minister of Foreign Affairs, M. Bratino, is coming to Vienna to consult Count Goluchowski, Austro-Hungarian Minister of Foreign Affairs, and that remonstrances may be addressed to Roumania, not much hope is expressed in practical and permanent effect within Roumania from such action. A semi-official agency has circulated the following announcement:

PRESS ATTACKS ACTION OF HAY.

Roumanian Papers Accuse United States of Meddling.

VIENNA, Sept. 25.—The Roumanian Conservative organ, La Roumanie, protests energetically in an editorial article against the unjust proceeding of the United States, and contends that neither America nor any other power is more entitled to interfere in the matter of the Jews than in Roumania to demand explanations concerning the Philippine Boers, Poles or Finns. The paper accuses the United States of a desire to meddle in European politics, and complains that it is hard to be ill treated by a state which is one of the largest in existence and which will in 50 years be a prominent factor in the world's politics.

The same paper gives details of the stopping of emigration passports to the Jews, which brought forth an indignant protest from another prominent Roumanian journal. This paper soundly condemns the action of the Minister of the Interior as illegal and unworthy of a civilized country, inasmuch as many emigrating Roumanians have spent their all for passage and are now reduced to misery.

London Still Discussing the Note.

LONDON, Sept. 25.—Secretary Hay's Roumanian note is still the subject of much discussion. The Daily Mail this morning publishes a long article by H. Sutherland Edwards, contending that the Jews in Roumania suffer no disabilities beyond those applying to all foreigners. Their only reason for emigrating lies in the impossibility of earning a living, to the reduction of wages caused by the influx of their persecuted compatriots from Russia.

Special dispatches from Berlin attribute Germany's attitude with regard to Secretary Hay's note to financial matters. Roumanian securities being largely held in Germany. It is anticipated that Austria will display the same unsympathetic attitude.

Russia Will Decline to Act.

LONDON, Sept. 25.—The Odessa correspondent of the Standard says he considers Secretary Hay's Roumanian note not very disconcerting to the Roumanian authorities whose resourceful diplomacy has not been, for many years, as disastrously taxed. Obviously, continues the correspondent, the framing of a reply will be a task of extreme delicacy and difficult for Count Lamedorff, the Foreign Minister, who will send a polite but brief negative, without any explanation or qualification. The Standard's correspondent adds that a majority of the Russian newspapers criticize Mr. Hay's note very favorably.

Press Is Behind the Step.

VIENNA, Sept. 25.—The Neues Wiener Tageblatt publishes a dispatch from Bucharest, saying that Roumania has found means of giving a mild answer to the United States. Nothing has been done to improve the conditions of the Jews, says the Tageblatt, but telegraphic orders have been sent to all local authorities to stop the issue of immigration passports to the Jews. Many intending immigrants have been thus stopped, and a fresh grievance is added to their old wrongs. Roumanian newspapers are urging the government to show that Roumania is master in her own house.

MAKES STATE ENTRY INTO DUBLIN.

Earl Dudley, New Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland, in Capital City.

DUBLIN, Ireland, Sept. 25.—The Earl of Dudley, the new Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland, made his state entry into Dublin today on horseback. He was accompanied by the Duke of Connaught, Commander of the forces in Ireland, and Countess Dudley. The imposing procession traversed the troop-lined streets to the Castle. There were few decorations, the crowds of people were somewhat larger. There was a little cheering, but no real enthusiasm shown.

Responding to an address of welcome read by the Earl of Meath, Lord Lieutenant of the City of Dublin, on behalf of the Lieutenants, Deputy Lieutenants and Magistrates of the city and county, the Earl of Dudley said he hoped that in discharging his duties as Lord Lieutenant of Ireland he would earn the approval of King Edward and the Irish people. The Earl added:

"To the latter I am a stranger, but my earnest endeavor will be not to remain so for long. I hope by traveling through the districts and by other means to become acquainted as far as possible with all classes of the people, and to gain a personal insight into their conditions. Lady Dudley joins me in the hope that our relations with the Irish people will daily increase in sympathy and friendliness."

TO SETTLE IRISH LAND PROBLEM.

Meeting of Tenants and Landlords to Frame Bill is Suggested.

LONDON, Sept. 25.—Following the failure to bring about a conference between the Irish landlords and tenants proposed by Captain Shaw E. Taylor, a prominent landlord of Antrim, Captain Taylor suggests that the members of the landlords and tenants organize and outline solutions of the crisis, and to adjourn while their respective plans are "hammered out on the anvil of public opinion." A second meeting, Captain Taylor suggests, could determine whether a basis of agreement will be possible, and perhaps adopt some broad principles of settlement which could be embodied in a land bill that Parliament would welcome as a solution of the land problem.

Captain Taylor says that John Redmond, chairman of the United Irish League; William O'Brien, Nationalist member of the House of Commons; T. W. Russell, Liberal-Unionist member of the House, and the Lord Mayor of Dublin have consented to attend such a meeting.

Death of Emperor Not Confirmed.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—The rumored death of the Emperor of Korea falls to find confirmation in any official quarter here. The suggestion is thrown out that a break probably occurred through the postponement of the celebration of the Emperor's birthday and accession to the throne. The Emperor will be 50 years old on September 26, and he assumed the throne on October 7, 1897. He had contemplated the celebration of the anniversary of the two events, but the State Department not long ago was advised that this celebration was postponed for a year on account of the prevalence of cholera in Korea. It is assumed that a loose statement of these facts has led to the circulation of the report of the death of the Emperor.

DELAWARE, O., Sept. 25.—Prince Eulwha, or Prince Ye, as he is known publicly, who is attending Ohio Wesleyan University from Korea, was shown a dispatch from Seoul, Korea, in which the correspondent of the Figaro said the Emperor, his father, was dead. Prince Eulwha received the news and displayed no great excitement over the matter. He said he had received no news of his father's death whatever, either from Seoul or Washington.

Fastest Cruiser in British Navy.

LONDON, Sept. 25.—The armored cruiser Drake entered Portsmouth harbor this evening, and reported having steamed 41 knots an hour, the fastest ever made by a British cruiser. The Drake was designed to make only 22 knots an hour, but she has been fitted with a propeller for purposes of experiment, the blades of which are almost circular, and which give the screw a powerful grip on the water.

Noted Church Agitator Injured.

LONDON, Sept. 25.—John Kensit, the noted head of the anti-ritualistic crusade in the Church of England, was seriously injured today, and his eyesight endangered by being struck with a chisel, which was thrown at him after he had addressed a meeting at Birkenhead. He is now in a hospital at Liverpool.

Legislatures of German States Vote for it by Large Majorities.

BERLIN, Sept. 25.—The Legislative Assemblies of Bremen and Hamburg have voted by large majorities in favor of

opening the frontiers to foreign livestock. A long list of cities previously took the same action.

The legislative committee of the National Butchers' Association, answering an Agrarian circular denying that there is a meat scarcity, points out that the swine slaughterings have declined 20 per cent in two years, and that prices have risen 30 per cent. Facts like these place the government in an awkward position. They strengthen the government in resisting the Agrarian demands, but the government is unable to use the facts to advantage, but the attitude of the Ministry has been to treat the rise in the price of meat as a passing phenomenon.

The Socialists are making capital from the situation. The Vorwarts devotes several columns a day to a keen observation of the causes of the meat scarcity, and attributes the principal reason, therefore, to the inability of farmers to supply the home market.

At Stuttgart today a proposition made by the Socialists that the City Council abolish the tax levied at the city gates on meats was rejected.

Prizes Thrift of Americans.

PARIS, Sept. 25.—The Matin this morning publishes an interview with Grand Duke Boris of Russia, who left New York September 18 on the French liner La Lorraine. The Grand Duke expresses the highest opinion of the American people. "There are no idlers in the country," he is credited with saying. "Everybody works, millionaires and the sons of millionaires like all the rest."

Fatal Duel Between Poles.

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Wounded by Royal Hunting Party.

LONDON, Sept. 25.—The Vienna correspondent of the Daily Mail says that during a shooting party organized near Budapest by Count Zichy, in honor of the Grand Duke Nicholas Constantinovich of Russia, eight men were wounded. The Grand Duke was responsible for injuring five of the men, while Count Zichy's brother wounded the three others.

Successor to Professor Virchow.

BERLIN, Sept. 25.—Johann Orth, professor of pathological anatomy in the University of Goettingen, succeeds the late Professor Virchow to the chair of pathological anatomy in the University of Berlin. Professor Orth was for many years Professor Virchow's assistant.

MANY BURIED UNDER LAVA

VOLCANO IN EAST TURKISTAN COSTS 1000 LIVES.

One Town Completely Destroyed and 400 People Killed in Another—No European Victims.

BERLIN, Sept. 25.—A dispatch has been received from Tashkent, capital of Russian Turkistan, reporting a terrible earthquake August 23, the shocks continuing until September 5. One hundred persons were killed at Kashgar, in Eastern Turkistan, 400 in the village of Astyn, and 30 at Jangt, while the town of Akuskielche was completely destroyed.

(Kashgar, capital of the Province of Sinkiang, is situated on the line of the roads leading to Peking, India and the Russian Empire, and is of considerable importance. It has a population of 50,000. The gatekeepers mention the town of Aksu, in Eastern Turkistan, and say it is a center of trade, the foreign traders, about 100 in number, being mostly Russian subjects. The population of the circle about Aksu is given at 180,000. There are about 4000 houses in the town itself.)

ONE THOUSAND ARE DEAD.

The Volcanic Disturbance Is Without Precedent.

ALLAHABAD, India, Sept. 25.—A dispatch to the Pioneer from Kashgar, Eastern Turkistan, says that only a dozen people were killed there in the earthquake, but that the disturbances wrecked many villages in the northern part of the province, the total number of persons killed being 1000. There were no premonitory signs, says the dispatch, but a profound rise in the temperature followed the principal shock. The temperature continued to rise during the subsequent days, which were attended by a repetition of slight quakes. The dispatch says no Europeans lost their lives.

Stromboli Volcano Again Active.

PARIS, Sept. 25.—A dispatch to the Figaro from Rome says the volcano on Stromboli island, off the north coast of Sicily, has been active for several days. A large, conical mass has appeared on the edge of one of the craters, and a fissure at the base of this crater is pouring out lava and jets of flame to a height of 30 yards. A dispatch from Rome dated September 3 said the Stromboli volcano was then in full operation.
