

PRESIDENT SITS UP

Roosevelt Passes the Day in a Wheel Chair.

WOUNDED LEG IS DOING NICELY

Temperature Is Normal, and Bone Specialist Returns to New York— Few Visitors Are Yet Admitted to the Executive's Room.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—President Roosevelt passed an uneventful day, remaining most of the time in his wheel chair, by which means he was able to be moved to various parts of the room. Tonight he is reported to be progressing satisfactorily. There were no visitors during the afternoon and evening except Dr. Long, the regular White House physician, who made his usual call. Dr. Newton Shaffer, the New York bone specialist, who came down yesterday at the President's request, and joined the other physicians in their consultation before the operation, returned to New York this afternoon. No arrangements were made for another visit from the doctor.

Misses Alice and Ethel Roosevelt joined the President and his wife at the White House tonight, the former coming from Tuxedo Park and the other from Oyster Bay. Miss Ethel is to attend school here. After the President's physicians had dressed his wound this morning, the following statement was prepared and issued by Secretary Cortelyou:

"The President's physicians authorized the following statement this morning: 'The condition of the wound is satisfactory. The temperature this morning is normal. The patient slept well, and at present is occupying a rolling chair. He is cheerful and from the beginning has shown no impatience nor restlessness, but has carried out the directions of the physicians with scrupulous care. Since the use of the asphering needle to evacuate the sac on the 23d inst., which left no wound, there has been no operation until yesterday.'"

Surgeon-General Rixey, of the Navy; Surgeon-General O'Reilly, of the Army; Dr. Shaffer, the bone specialist from New York, and Dr. Long were present when the wound was dressed. They were at the temporary White House about three-quarters of an hour. The slight rise in the temperature noted yesterday before the second operation had disappeared this morning, and this was considered especially favorable by the physicians.

The physicians insist today that the President's condition is not alarming. The President himself continues cheerful, and seemingly regards the wound as a trivial matter. The fact that a second operation was necessary evidently caused considerable apprehension in the public mind, as the number of callers who stopped at the temporary White House was larger than on any previous day since the President returned to Washington.

Among the callers today only Governor Crane, of Massachusetts; Secretary Root and Postmaster-General Payne were admitted to the President's bedroom.

ROOT MAY RESIGN.

Secretary of War Desires to Return to Law Practice.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Sept. 29.—Secretary Root is reported to be considering resignation. He left for New York before the report could be denied or verified. According to the rumor the resignation is not to take place until some time next Spring, when Secretary Root hopes to have the many reforms he has originated as Secretary of War certain of being carried to a successful consummation. Among these are the general staff bill, which is not likely to pass at the short session, and the bill to reorganize the militia, which may become a law. With the practical settlement of affairs in the Philippines, and Cuban reciprocity adopted by Congress, which will probably result in keeping Cuba pacified, and the reforms Secretary Root has inaugurated in the War Department thoroughly established, the great work which he was selected to do will in a measure be accomplished. If he resigns it will be only when there is a straight course ahead for the War Department, as President Roosevelt would not be very likely to part with him under any other circumstances. He is one of the strongest men in the Cabinet, and probably the closest to the President.

Secretary Root entered the Cabinet at a great personal loss. As a lawyer of ability, he had an enormous practice in New York. His old associates and employees are anxious for him to resume his former work, and this is given as the main reason why he intends to resign.

Root Denies the Rumor. NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—Secretary Root arrived in this city tonight in answer to a question as to whether there was any truth in the rumor that he intended to leave the Cabinet. The Secretary said: "The rumors about my retirement are false. I have given the matter no thought and do not intend to retire. When I do decide to do so, there will be no rumors. I will simply resign, and that will be all, and the public will hear about it." Secretary Root will return to Washington tomorrow afternoon.

New Oregon Postmasters.

CROKER ON TRIAL.

New York Fire Chief Faces Seven Serious Charges. NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—Edward F. The charges are seven in all, and they include accusations of incompetency, sending in false reports, violation of the constitution of the State of New York, conversion of public property to private use, conduct prejudicial to good order and discipline and conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman.

AGED FINANCIER WHO IS SERIOUSLY ILL.



JAY COOKE.

The name Jay Cooke, who is seriously ill in Ohio, will go down in the history of the Northwest as that of one of the largest and most daring operators and builders of railroads to this region. He became deeply interested in the development of the Columbia River Valley, and in Washington in the financial centers of the East during the years of his activity did much toward stimulating investments and immigration.

When he went abroad it was Jay Cooke's proudest boast that he was exclusive possessor of the largest rock in the world in possession of an individual. His landscape hobby was Castle Rock, in the Columbia River. He purchased the tract of land upon which stands this wonderful eminence, and maintained his sovereignty until financial reverses swept away all his possessions. In 1894 the rock was sold at public auction for delinquent taxes, the delinquency being on account of the intention of Jay Cooke.

Had the great financier continued as a figure on Wall street and as a factor in transcontinental railroad affairs, a winding railway would have been built to the top of the rock. It was his intention to make the top of the rock an observatory, easily accessible, for picnic parties from Portland.

were on a larger scale than any gang in the state ever attempted before. Upward of 100 graves, it is said, have been robbed. The detectives say the negroes were armed with shotguns and equipped with horses and wagons with which to do the work. The bodies were sold to different colleges, which opened their winter terms within the last week.

The revelations made, the detectives say, are not only astounding, but horrifying. They say that a complete investigation will show that even the graves of Crown Hill were desecrated by the ghoul. Cantrell said that he and the other negroes visited Mount Jackson cemetery almost every time any one was buried in the place.

"We pretty nearly cleaned that place out," he said. "I don't believe that I have missed anybody that has been planted there since July."

Cantrell said there were some graves that were not disturbed because the flowers and other articles on top were arranged in such a manner that the gang of college boys was afraid to touch them. The negroes under arrest are Walter Daniels, Sol Gray, Sam Martin, Garfield Buckner, William Jones, Rufus Cantrell and James Dennis. All live in Indianapolis. When the negroes were brought into court all weakened and confessed that they were members of an organized gang of ghoul. Mount Jackson, a cemetery which is located in the town of Mount Jackson, has been left almost empty by the grave robbers. "Rufus" was the password at the medical college, and when it was uttered by the returning ghoul, the doors of the college were always opened without question. The statement that Crown Hill, one of the best guarded cemeteries in the United States, has probably been invaded by the grave robbers, has caused indignation. One of the ghoul said usually took about 25 minutes to rob a grave.

BRIDGEMAN CASE CONTINUED. Indian Agent Charged With Fraud— Will Now Be Tried at Helena.

BUTTE, Mont., Sept. 29.—Morris L. Bridgeman, ex-Indian Agent at the Fort Belknap Indian reservation, who was indicted by the grand jury last week for alleged fraud practiced upon the United States Government while he was in office, did not appear in court today for trial in the Federal Court this morning. Ex-United States District Attorney W. B. Rogers, who has been retained to defend Major Bridgeman, stated that his client was obliged to remain in Great Falls, where his wife is seriously ill. Mrs. Bridgeman was terribly shocked over the arrest of her husband, and has been confined to her bed ever since.

Saw Their Way Out of Jail. DILLON, Mont., Sept. 29.—The Dillon jail was emptied of its occupants today. Two burglars captured at Silver Bow yesterday sawed their way out, together with another prisoner. It appears they were given aid from the outside. Officers are in close pursuit.

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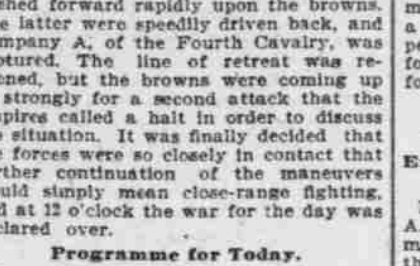
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
