

ANOTHER RISE IN BEANS

MARKET CLOSED EXCITED AND HIGHER. Hops are active and firm with Dealers offering Twenty-two Cents for Choice.

The past week saw a good volume of trade in the jobbing district. Business was not quite so rushing in fruits as it had been, but in other produce and in merchandise very satisfactory trading took place.

The wheat market, after a steady week, closed firmer Saturday, though prices were not appreciably higher. Shippers quoted club at 62c and flourmen at 60c as export values, though considerable shipper's bids were above these rates.

The hop market was active during the week, especially on the closing day. Many sales of 50 and 100-bale lots were reported Saturday, prices ranging from 20c to 22c. Twenty-two cents is being offered for choice hops. Receipts and shipments are heavy.

A telegram to a Portland dealer, dated New York, Saturday, said: "Exporters are buying largely in Germany. The London market is dull, and prices are nominally unchanged, but to effect sales concessions must be made. The New York market is dull, but not notably higher."

There is no general business in the California or Washington markets yet. Of the situation in New York, the Journal of Commerce of September 29 said:

A firm bid quiet market was reported locally, and there were no changes reported from either the coast or up to state. Nothing was reported from London or the Continent. Ad- vices received from Washington reported that the number of barrels of less than 100 lbs. was sold during the month of August amount- ing to 4,561,001 barrels, against 4,733,207 bar- rels for the same month last year. The total for the calendar year to September 1 is 50,745, 191 barrels, against 53,124,524 barrels for the same period last year, or an increase of 1,572, 367 barrels.

The Waterville Times of September 29 says of hops: "Though there does not appear to be any great anxiety on the part of growers to sell at the present offering, a few sales at 22c were made at the time at 20c to 22c. It has developed that while there were many bids in most of the yards, there was a shortage of bids in the mold. This is not the usual result, but it was very fortunate that it was so, for it has made it possible for our growers to bring forward a good sample.

Specific Coast hops were quotable in New York on that date as follows: 1902, 24c to 26c; medium to prime, 20c to 22c; old, 18c to 20c.

The interest in the grocery market centered in beans, three distinct advances being made in the week. Choice quotations were: Large and small white, 4c; Lima, 3c; Bayona, 3c; pink, 3c. Dried peas and lentils are strong. Canned corn and tomatoes are strong at former quotations, and prunes are very firm.

In the fruit and vegetable market, Fall goods are beginning to take the place of Summer varieties. Receipts of peaches, pears and melons are gradually decreasing. A carload of small and cranberries was received. Grapes are plentiful, and sweet potatoes are in better supply.

The poultry market was in bad shape during the last half of the week, with big receipts and a poor demand. A large number of coops were carried over, and unless the inquiry improves today and tomorrow, prices will continue weak and demoralized. Hens remain firm at 25c, but do not go higher because the plentiful supply of Eastern and storage eggs, which are quoted at 22c to 23c. Butter is firm on fancy grades. Cheese was very firm and advanced to Saturday, and will probably go higher.
