BOER LEADERS FLARE UP

DECLINE THE PRESENTATION TO KAISER BY BRITISH.

Germany Is All Wrought Up—Press Scores Burgheers and Some Want Them Kept Away Entirely.

BERLIN, Oct. 9.—It developed today that the Boer Generals declined, in a telegraphic message, to seek presentation to Emperor William through the British Ambassador, and the fact has produced an extraordinary commotion among politicians and courtiers. No later than last Monday, the Foreign Office received a message from the Generals announcing that they had not the slightest objection to applying for an interview through British government channels, and it was even understood here that the government of Great Britain was willing to countenance the interview. Whether this is true or not, the pan-German committee in charge of the Boer reception was confident the Generals would come with proper credentials, and hence have an opportunity for

an audience. Then, on Wednesday came a dispatch saying the Generals were determined not to apply to the British government but would leave the Emperor to summon them himself. This, of course, would have put His Majesty in direct opposition to Great Britain, and the announcement immediately followed that the proposed interview would not take place. The press today attacks the Boer Generals in the style which it has hitherto reserved for Colonial Secretary Chamberlain. Some of the newspapers oppose the Generals being allowed to come here at all, and advocate the suppression of the proposed reception, including girls crowning the Generals with laurel wreaths. Various explanations are given for the Boers' motives. A favorite idea is that Dr. Leyds, who is called the Boers' evil genius, devised the whole thing so as to strike back at the Emperor for refusing to receive Mr. Kruger. The reception committee is advised that the Generals intend to come here as though nothing had happened, and any anti-British demonstration now will certainly be stopped by the police, as official circles are very much annoyed at the Boers' behavior.

SYMPATHETIC STRIKE DECLARED. Workmen Throughout Switzerland Called Out to Aid Street-Car Men.
GENEVA, Oct. 9.—The Workmen's National Committee has decreed a general strike throughout Switzerland in sympathy with the street-car employees here. Troops are held in readiness to deal with and disorder. The strike was proclaimed by the Workmen's National Committee by a vote of 299 to 4. All the men connected with the building trades struck and the newspapers will have to stop publication; but work continues at the gas works and in the bakeries and cafes, and shops are open. The Workmen's National Committee placarded the streets with an appeal to all workmen to leave their work, and announced that before declaring the strike the committee made a last appeal to the street-car company, which refused to receive its delegates. Two additional battalions of infantry and a detachment of artillery have been ordered to be held in readiness for event-

ualities. Toward noon, because of the threatening attitude of the strikers, the authorities ordered a suspension of the strike between the peasant and the local forces, which are now being reinforced. Many persons are reported to have been killed or wounded.

RIOT IS PRECIPITATED.
Closing of Socialist Club Causes Mob to Attack Soldiers.
GIBRALTAR, Oct. 9.—The compulsory closing this afternoon of a Socialist Club within the Spanish lines resulted in a riot in which five of the rioters were killed and several wounded. The mob fired upon the Civil Guard, which was temporarily driven back, but who returned the fire of the rioters and scattered their assailants. The mob after-

ward attacked the house of the Mayor and other dwellings before it was finally dispersed. A battalion of infantry and a squadron of cavalry have arrived here from San Roque.

MINERS OUT NUMBER 60,000.
French Strike Is Accompanied by No Disorders.
PARIS, Oct. 9.—Dispatches from the coal-mining regions indicate the strikers numbered about 60,000 men this morning. The Government has issued rigorous instructions to prevent disorders, processions and the carrying of flags and other emblems and prohibiting also the sale or possession of firearms. No serious trouble has occurred.

Oxford Honors Ambassador White.
OXFORD, Oct. 9.—The honorary degree of doctor of civil law was conferred today on Ambassador White.

Dr. Emma Nickerson Warns.
CHICAGO, Oct. 9.—Dr. Emma Nickerson Warns is dead of pneumonia at her farm in Flushing Township, Genesee County, Michigan. Dr. Warns achieved some publicity through a contest in the Cook County Probate Court between her and the heirs of F. W. Wheeler, a wealthy paper manufacturer of Chicago, for \$30,000. She had attended Mr. Wheeler as

physician through many illnesses, and during his last illness he proposed to give her \$50,000 in bank stock. An assignment was prepared, but he died before signing it. The claim was disallowed by the Probate Court, and an appeal is pending.

Woman Shot by Jealous Lover.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Miss Alice Fisher, a young woman employed in the Government printing office, was shot and killed at noon today by William Dougherty, an employe of the same office. Dougherty then shot and killed himself. Jealousy was the cause. The affair occurred at the home of a friend of the young woman.

Stratton Will Case Postponed.
COLORADO SPRINGS, Oct. 9.—At 2 o'clock the hearing under the writ of certiorari in the Stratton will case was again deferred until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.
