ALL-STAR TEAM NAMED.

Leading Players of the Northwest League Chosen for a Nine.

First baseman—Shaffer of the Helena team.

Second baseman—Anderson of the Portland team.

Third baseman—Andrews of the Tacoma team.

Short stop—Schmeier of the Helena team.

Left fielder—Howells of the Spokane team.

Center fielder—Van Buren of the Portland team.

Right fielder—Weed of the Portland team.

Catcher—Stanley of the Seattle team.

Fitters—Stovall and Hickey of the Seattle team and Dowling of the Butte team.

The above is a selection of an all-star baseball team from the players in the Northwest League. Of the many all-star teams that have been and will be presented, it is doubtful whether any two of them will be the same throughout. This team has been selected after much "fanning" with the followers of the game and upon an impartial judgment of the respective players according to their work in Portland.

"Happy Hooligan" Shaffer, Helena's first baseman, is the peer of any of the initial big centers in the league. He is a great man for fielding his position, with his big bat he is a wonderful hitter. Beside these two points he is an excellent coacher, in fact he is about the only one in the league. Bill Hurley of the Seattle team might come in for more serious consideration if it were not for his dirty work and brutal action on the ball field. That alone is enough to disbar him from any team. But even without these faults he is not the first baseman that Shaffer is, by a long way.

Anderson of the local nine falls into position at second base with ease. In all the league there is not a second baseman like Anderson. He cannot hit with some of them but he is there with the fielding. He is a master hand at bringing about team work and a nine organized from players in this league would not be complete without him.

Jay Andrews, manager of the Tacoma team, is a great third baseman. If it were not for the fact that he has been worried to the verge of nervous prostration by his duties as manager of the Tacoma team he would easily be the star of the league. As it is, he is a heavy man with the stick and at many times plays a brilliant fielding game. He is after every chance, and in this way he is credited for many errors. Donohue is

also a good man at third but his hitting is weak.

The short stop, Claude Schmeier, the Portland boy on the Helena team, has it on the record of the players by a narrow margin. Kane, of Butte, and McCarthy, of Tacoma, are both good men at this position, but Schmeier plays a better fielding game and is a better hitter than either one.

For the outfield the choice will most likely vary more than with the infield positions. Howells, of Spokane, in left; Van Buren, of Portland, in center, and Weed of the home team in right should make a strong outfield. The hitting ability of these men is not as strong as it might be, but the fielding of all of them is magnificent. All are fast men and cover a great deal of territory. Weed has not been in that position very much this year, but he is the best man that ever stepped into the right garden in this league.

Max Stanley, of Seattle, is the man for back-stop. He has made the best record of any of the catchers. He can play well behind the bat, throw to second, and hit like a fend. Sullivan, of Helena, is also a good man, and would be second choice.

The selection of box artists would be Stovall and Hickey, of Seattle, and Dowling, of Butte. Stovall is the best of the bunch, and besides being a pitcher he can handle the bat in good shape. Dowling, of Butte, is a south paw of exceptional ability if he can keep in form. Hickey is another south paw, who has developed into a worker, and his work is about all that could be wished for.

WRITING INK.

Changes in Fashion—The Great Consumers—Our Inks the Best.

"For all ordinary writing purposes," said a man acquainted with the ink trade, "colored inks, once used to some extent, have now been almost entirely superseded by black ink. They are still made, and in many colors, and red ink is still, as ever, a standard for various special uses, such as counting-rooms. Then various other colored inks are sometimes also used in counting-rooms, as in the preparation of statements or exhibits, in which, for purposes of convenience, the several divisions are made each in a separate color. But for the ordinary purposes colored inks, as violet, have gone almost wholly out of use. Black is the thing."

"Among the inks for special uses might be mentioned violet ink, made for writing on black paper, and especially employed for writing cards for window displays and like purposes. Violet inks are largely comprised between the blacks and the blue-blacks; the former putting on black as it leaves the pen, and the latter putting on blue and turning black. There is now used in this country more blue-black than black, and the proportion of blue-black is increasing.

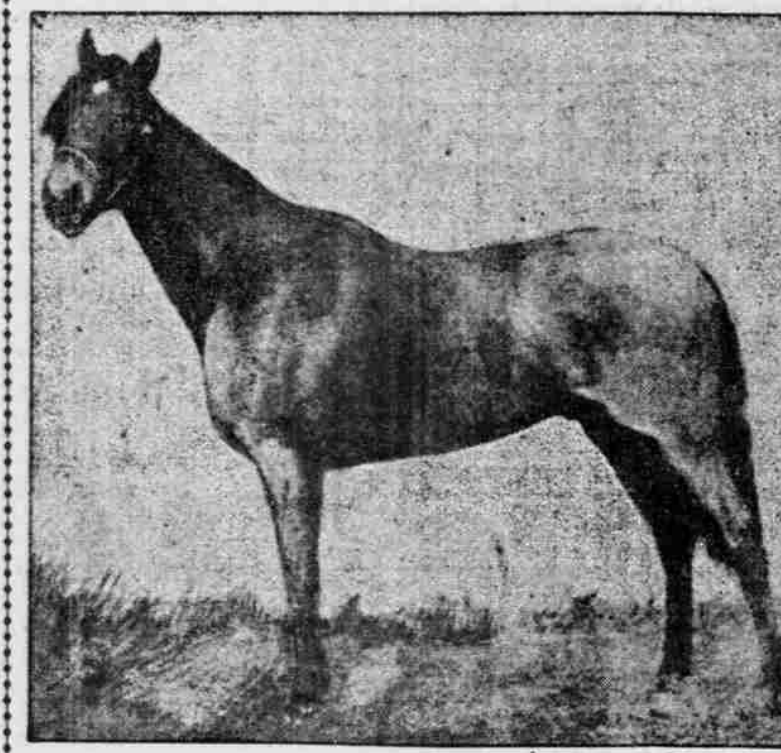
HELENA TEAM WINS ONCE MORE; SCORE, 5 TO 3.

Schmeier hit a high fly that Muller muffed when he had it in his hands, and Slagle walked over the home plate for tally No. 4.

The remainder of the game was spent in trying to catch up, but it was no use. Portland scored once the last of the second, and in the sixth, but the combination was too strong for them, and they couldn't win.

Withbeck allowed seven hits, struck out three Helena men, and did not give up a single home run. Slagle replaced Thierly in the third, and allowed four hits while he was on the slab. Thierly gave the same number, and issued two passes to first.

Slagle made two three-baggers, and Sammy one, which brought in the run in the sixth. Beyond this, the batting was limited to short hits and scratches.

Passes Through Portland.

The Pacific University football team, accompanied by Coach T. L. McPadden and Manager C. H. Williams, passed through Portland yesterday en route to the inland Empire, where games will be played with Whitman College, University of Idaho and Washington Agricultural College.

The game with Whitman will be played today in Walla Walla, and on Monday the Forest Grove players will try conclusions with the University of Idaho at Moscow. Next Thursday the final game of the tour, with Washington Agricultural College, will be played at Pullman. Coach McPadden has been with the Pacific team for 10 days, and has succeeded in rounding the players into fairly good form. When seen yesterday morning he said: "Our eleven is a light one, averaging perhaps 154 pounds. We will have to play hard to make a good showing

against the inland Empire colleges, as all of them have strong teams this year. Even if we don't win a game on this trip the experience which our men will gain will undoubtedly be of great help to them in their games later in the season."
