The week closed satisfactorily in the whole-sale markets. Trading has been good in nearly every line and few designs have cause to com-plain. Receipts of California fruit fell off when the San Francisco stamers tied up, but the loss was partly made up by bringing in produce loss was partly made up by bringing in produce by express. 
