Colombia May Find Its Canal Objections Ignored.

TWO WAYS OPEN TO UNCLE SAM

Panama Company's Right Can Be Purchased and Property Improved Without Question, but Colombia Will Be Dealt With.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—The status of the Colombian canal concessions is that both sides are waiting for a decision of the Colombian government as to whether Minister Concha shall proceed under his original instructions to present to the State Department the Colombian response to the department's proposal for a treaty.

When the response arrived in Washington two days ago, the Minister promptly notified the State Department. In view of the recent developments, meaning events that had happened on the Isthmus since the note started from Bogota, September 16, he regarded it his duty to withhold it until he had conferred with his government. As the State Department had in some way come to know that the Colombian response would, if submitted, go far toward settling the matter of this Government's attitude toward a canal treaty, this delay was very annoying. But as the Minister had his own notion of duty in the matter, it was expected that he would stand firm over his head to the authorities in Bogota.

Accordingly, a cablegram was sent to United States Minister Hart at the Colombian capital, notifying him of the action of the Colombian Minister here. No specific complaint was made, but it was desired to make sure that the Colombian government knew that the note had been held back.

The matter of objection is regarded by our own officials as an attempt to link the negotiations for a canal treaty, pure and simple, with the discussion of the questions of correctness of the attitude of our naval officers on the Isthmus. It is expected that the delay will not be for over a few days, and that the result is not satisfactory, this Government will still be bound by the terms of the Spooner act to proceed toward the construction of an Isthmian canal, and the only question to be decided is as to the method.

There are two ways open, even in case of an adverse attitude on the part of the Colombian government, namely, either the United States Government to proceed without delay to complete the treaties with Nicaragua and Costa Rica necessary for the construction of a canal in those countries, or—and this latter course would be adopted with reduced cost—the Government might purchase outright the franchise of the French Panama Canal Company and go on resolutely with the construction of the Panama Canal, taking the ground that it would have a right to improve its own property without reference to any other government, and taking no further notice of Colombia.

Secretary Hart, in his cablegram, calls who talked about canal matters. The first was Mr. Cromwell, counsel for the Panama Canal Company, who is here to ascertain the needed step to be taken by the United States Government in view of Attorney-General Knox's opinion respecting the canal title. As this seems to depend for the moment on the issue of the negotiations with Colombia, the Secretary would be advised with reduced cost. The Government might purchase outright the franchise of the French Panama Canal Company and go on resolutely with the construction of the Panama Canal, taking the ground that it would have a right to improve its own property without reference to any other government, and taking no further notice of Colombia.

MANY POSTOFFICES ADVANCED.

Presidential Appointments for Past Year Establish a Record.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—A total of 2270 Presidential appointments were appointed last year, according to the annual report of J. L. Bristol, Fourth Assistant Postmaster-General, issued today. This is the largest number appointed in any one year in the history of the postal service. The increase was due mainly to the expiration of commissions during the year, and the advance of many fourth-class offices to the President's list.

REVENUE PLEA FOR STATEHOOD.

Governor Brodie Points Out Needs of Arizona in His Annual Report.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—Governor Brodie, of Arizona, in his annual report to the Secretary of the Interior, renews the plea for statehood, and makes the following recommendations: "That under the Newlands-Hansborough act the claims of Arizona for Government aid in irrigation be fairly and carefully considered and extended so as to include in the territory the first of the great irrigation systems under that act; states to rejuvenate the depleted forest area; increase in Indian school facilities, in the salary of the Governor, in the appropriation for the Arizona National Guard, a proposition to improve the Colorado River and to construct a levee from Yuma to the Mexico line to prevent the overflow of cultivated lands by the annual freshets; and appropriations for purchasing sites and erecting public buildings in Arizona cities."

IN PLACE OF ADMIRAL SAMPSON.

Names of Prominent Naval Officers Substituted in Pralzo-Honey Case.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—The question of substituting some other name for that of Admiral Sampson in the case of the United States vs. William T. Sampson, Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court last Monday, came up in the court again today, when James H. Hayden, counsel for the defendants, submitted a petition by Mrs. Sampson, an administratrix, and also one by Rear Admirals Evans, Taylor and Cotton, Captains Chadwick and Eaton, Commander Lucien Young and Lieutenant-Commander Alexander Sharp, Jr., that their names be substituted as parties to the case in place of Admiral Sampson, deceased. The case involves the distribution of prize money growing out of the capture of the Spanish cruiser Infanta Maria Teresa, and in the course of Monday's proceedings the Chief Justice took occasion to remark that the name of Admiral Sampson or some one else might be substituted.
